The Wyoming State Library celebrated its 150th birthday at the legislative reception. The cookies were provided by the WYLD Network.




The event drew dozens of legislators.

What can teachers and librarians do to integrate computer science? What type of computer science support does your district need? If you've ever asked these questions, **WySLICE** is for you!



EXECUTIVE ORDER 9066 AND HEART MOUNTAIN INTERNMENT CAMP

President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed **Executive** Order 9066 on February 19, 1942. This event led to the internment of thousands of Japanese-Americans during World War II.

Under the order, the U.S. relocated approximately 120,000 men, women, and children of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast and held them in American concentration camps across the country. One of those was Heart Mountain Internment Camp near Cody, Wyoming.

The Wyoming State Library has created an online exhibit providing a vast amount of information about life in the camp, gleaned from the Heart Mountain Sentinel. Visit the exhibit in Wyoming Places, and read the Sentinel online in the Wyoming Digital Newspaper Collection.

FIGHT CENSORSHIP: UPDATED **RESOURCES FROM THE OIF**

Book challenges have been a hot topic in news and politics lately. The American Library Association (ALA) Executive Board and eight divisions recently released a statement affirming its opposition to widespread efforts

to censor books in U.S. schools. ALA's Office for Intellectual Freedom (OIF) has tracked 155 unique censorship incidents between June 1, 2021, and September 30, 2021.

With the high volume of challenges right now, OIF has made available a clearinghouse of resources on its Fight Censorship page.

ADDRESSING CHALLENGES TO **PROBLEMATIC AUTHORS**

Librarians face an increasing number of book challenges, but today the objections are increasingly reaching beyond the books themselves, with the focus shifting to authors' personalities. This can be based on activities that often go beyond the scope of what they commit to the printed page.



The first invention ever patented in Wyoming was U.S. Patent No. 67898 - Improvement in Cartridge-Belts.

February 11 was National Inventors Day — a day to celebrate America's resourcefulness and imagination. Celebrated on Thomas Edison's birthday, this day was set by Ronald Reagan in 1983 to laud all innovators old and new.

CHRIS MURRY NAMED DIRECTOR OF **WWCC HAY LIBRARY**

Chris Murry is the new Director of Library Services at Western **Wyoming Community** College's Hay Library. He comes to WWCC from Sheridan College, where he had been Public Services Librarian since the fall of 2019.



Originally from the Washington D.C. area, Chris spent many years in Pittsburgh working as a philosophy adjunct and in book stores until he transitioned to librarianship. He earned his MLIS from the University of Pittsburgh in 2018.

"With only a few years as a full-time librarian under my belt, I knew it would be a great challenge and responsibility to assume a managerial role," he said. "I've been very happy since moving to Wyoming, and I'm glad to have such an amazing opportunity within the state."

Chris sees enrollment and retention as a concern everywhere, so libraries must innovate in how they reach students with services. He plans to continue work begun at Sheridan with the Open Educational Resources workgroup.


RUSA TO HOST FIRST VIRTUAL FORUM

Grants & Awards

Rocky Mountain Power Foundation Community Improvement Grants

DEADLINE: March 15, 2022

The foundation will award grants of up to \$10,000 (with most ranging between \$2,000 and \$5,000) in support of proposals in support of education/STEM. Projects will be supported that have a bearing on communities served by Rocky Mountain Power or Pacific Power, including in Wyoming.

John Cotton Dana Award

DEADLINE: March 18, 2022

The John Cotton Dana Award is one of the most prestigious awards given to libraries and honors outstanding library public relations. Up to eight \$10,000 awards will be provided by the H.W. Wilson Foundation in 2022. Libraries of all types and sizes are encouraged to submit entries for a 2022 John Cotton Dana Award. Entries should highlight a strategic communications campaign from the past year.

Pat Carterette Professional Development Grant

DEADLINE: March 18, 2022

The grant provides monetary support to participate in continuing educational event(s). The American Library Association Learning Round Table (LearnRT) will award up to \$1,000 to an individual to attend a professional development event.

AARP Community Challenge

DEADLINE: March 22, 2022

Provides small grants to fund quick-action projects that can help communities become more livable for people of all ages. This year, applications will be accepted for projects to improve public spaces, housing, transportation, and civic engagement; support diversity, equity, and inclusion; build engagement for programs under new federal laws; and pursue innovative ideas that support people age 50 or older.

McMurry Library Endowment Individual **Grants for Continuing Education**

DEADLINE: March 31, 2022

Want to attend a conference or workshop to build your library skills? Take an online course? Start working toward that library media specialist endorsement or master's degree in library science? Funds are available to those working or volunteering in Wyoming libraries through the Carol McMurry Library Endowment Individual Grants for Continuing Education. Applications are accepted six times during the year. The next deadline is March 31, 2022, for continuing education events starting no earlier than May 1, 2022.

The Pilcrow Foundation Children's Book **Project**

DEADLINE: April 1, 2022

The Pilcrow Foundation provides new, quality, hardcover children's books to rural public libraries across the United States. A library's

local sponsors can contribute from \$200 to \$400, which the Foundation matches on a 2-to-1 ratio. Thus, a library can receive up to \$1,200 worth of children's books. The Foundation provides a list of more than 500 quality hardcover children's books from which grant recipients can select books best suited for their communities. Application deadlines are April 1 and October 1, annually.

Believe in Reading Grants

DEADLINE: Ongoing

Believe in Reading targets successful literacy programs which serve populations that show out of the ordinary needs, such as geographic areas with low reading scores and high poverty levels. Believe in Reading will supply funds only if they are earmarked for literacy, not just a general campaign. Reading must be the prime activity.

News in Brief

U.S. Surgeon General Issues Advisory on **Youth Mental Health Crisis**

U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy issued a new Surgeon General's Advisory to highlight the urgent need to address the nation's youth mental health crisis. The Advisory on Protecting Youth Mental Health outlines the pandemic's unprecedented impacts on the mental health of America's youth and families, as well as the mental health challenges that existed long before the pandemic.

Showcase Your Best Marketing Pieces by Applying for the Core PR Xchange Awards

Applications are open for the 2022 PR Xchange Awards. This competition recognizes the very best public relations materials produced by libraries in the past year. Entries are evaluated on content, originality, and design by a team of experts in public relations, graphic design, communications, and marketing. This competition is unique in the way it evaluates a library's individual promotional materials, not an entire marketing campaign. The deadline to apply is April 15.

Children in Trauma Bibliography

The Children in Trauma bibliography was created by Dr. Megan McCaffrey, assistant professor in the Division of Education at Governors State University. Categorized by theme, the bibliography includes books that address traumas such as domestic abuse and bullying; general grief and loss; illness, anxiety, and depression; pandemics; poverty; and more.

American Library Association Announces 2022 Youth Media Award Winners

The American Library Association (ALA) has announced the top books, digital media, video, and audio books for children and young adults - including the Caldecott, Coretta Scott King, Newbery, and Printz awards. ALA awards guide parents, educators, librarians, and others in selecting the best materials for youth. The awards encourage original and creative work.

FCC Affordable Connectivity Program **Outreach Toolkit Available**

The Affordable Connectivity Program was created by the FCC to help households struggling to pay for internet service. As part of that effort, the FCC is mobilizing people and organizations to help raise awareness about the ACP. This toolkit is available for public use; materials may be downloaded and customized.

Serving Underserved Communities: EDI in Action

This year, the Library Service to Underserved Children and Their Caregivers Committee is providing support and resources, like presentations, chats, and monthly blog posts. Over the past 18 months, they have developed vibrant toolkits to help connect library communities with resources for different underserved populations.

First-Ever Best Graphic Novels for **Children Reading List Announced**

The American Library Association's Graphic Novels & Comics Round Table (GNCRT) is thrilled to introduce the 2021 Best Graphic Novels for Children (BGNC) Reading List. This reading list highlights the best graphic novels for children aged 5 - 12 years old, published in late 2020 and through 2021, and it aims to increase awareness of the graphic novel medium, raise voices of diverse comics creators, and aid library staff in the development of graphic novel collections.
