# HOUSE JOURNAL.

#### FIRST DAY.

Hall of the House of Representatives, Cheyenne, Wyoming, January 13, 1903.

The members of the House of Representatives of the Seventh State Legislature of the State of Wyoming were called to order by the Secretary of State, Hon. Fenimore Chatterton, at twelve o'clock noon, pursuant to law.

On motion of Mr. Cooper of Converse, Mr. Black of Uinta was elected temporary Speaker by acclamation, and Messrs. Cooper of Converse and Cook of Laramie were appointed a committee to escort Mr. Black to the chair.

Secretary of State Chatterton introduced Mr. Black of Uinta as temporary Speaker. Mr. Black briefly thanked the members of the Seventh State Legislature for the honor they

conferred upon him.

On motion of Mr. Gray of Converse, Mr. Cooper of Converse was made temporary Clerk, and a committee, comprising Mr. Gray of Converse, Mr. Stoner of Uinta and Mr. Salisbury of Crook, was appointed to escort Mr. Cooper to his desk.

On motion of Mr. Rowen of Carbon county, the Speaker was authorized to appoint a committee on credentials, to com-

prise one member from each county.

The Speaker appointed as such committee the following: Messrs. King of Albany, Sessions of Big Horn, Russell of Carbon, Gray of Converse, Salisbury of Crook, Graham of Fremont, Smith of Johnson, Cook of Laramie, Robertson of Natrona, Hardin of Sheridan, Bugas of Sweetwater, Stone of Uinta and Bowker of Weston.

Recess.

Members of the House were called to order at 12:30 by the temporary Speaker, when the committee on credentials made the following report:

On motion of Mr. Rowen of Carbon county, a committee of three was appointed by the Speaker, with instructions to wait on the Hon. Samuel T. Corn, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and inform him that the House members were ready to take the oath of office.

As such committee the Speaker appointed Messrs. Matson

of Laramie, Preston of Sweetwater and Rowen of Carbon.

The committee, having performed its duty, reported to the House the presence of the Chief Justice S. T. Corn, and his readiness to administer the oath of office, whereupon the following named members took and subscribed such oath ac-

On motion of Mr. Matson of Laramie, a recess was taken

until 2 p. m.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 p. m. the House was called to order by the temporary Speaker, who declared the election of officers the next order of business. Mr. Matson of Laramie placed in nomination as Speaker of the House the Hon. Jerome S. Atherly of Albany county. The nomination was duly seconded by the delegations of every county in the State, and by Mr. Uhler of Crook county in behalf of the Democratic members of the House, and Mr. Atherly was elected by the unanimous vote of all the members present.

Messrs. Gregory of Albany, Snow of Laramie and Sleeper

of Big Horn were appointed by the temporary Speaker to escort Mr. Atherly to the chair.

Temporary Speaker Mr. Black introduced Speaker-elect

Atherly to the members of the House.

Mr. Atherly then addressed the members of the House, thanking them for the honor done him, and especially placing emphasis on the trust he felt reposed in him by thus returning him for a second term. He outlined his policy and promised the fairest of treatment to all, and asked the support and cooperation of all the members of the House in serving the State's best interests.

Messrs. Hardman of Uinta, McGrath of Fremont and Bowker of Weston were appointed by the temporary Speaker to wait on Chief Justice S. T. Corn and request his presence for the purpose of administering the oath to the Speaker-elect.

The committee having performed its duty, reported to the House the presence of Chief Justice Corn and his readiness to administer the oath, whereupon the Hon. Jerome S. Atherly took and subscribed the oath of office as Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Wyoming.

On motion of Mr. Deming of Laramie, the temporary Clerk was instructed to cast the ballot of the House for the Hon. Joseph A. Black of Uinta for Speaker pro tem. The Clerk cast the ballot of the House, and the Speaker declared the Hon.

Joseph Black duly slected Speaker pro tem.

On motion of Mr. Bugas of Sweetwater, Mr. Robert Smith was placed in nomination for the position of Chief Clerk of the House, and, on motion of Mr. Rowen of Carbon county, the Clerk was instructed to cast the ballot of the House for Mr. Smith.

Mr. Gray of Converse nominated H. N. Perrine for the position of Assistant Chief Clerk, and, on motion of Mr. Graham, the Clerk was instructed to cast the ballot of the House for Mr. Perrine.

On motion of Mr. Deming of Laramie, the Clerk was instructed to cast the ballot of the House for the caucus nominees, who were duly declared elected by the Speaker for the respective positions as follows: Chief Enrolling and Engrossing Clerk, Harry L. Pascall of Albany county: Assistant Enrolling and Engrossing Clerk, Miss Bessie Moodie of Crook county: Journal Clerk, Miss Minnie Haas of Laramie county; Sergeant-at-Arms, A. R. Whitely of Laramie county: Chaplain, Rev. W. N. Dunham of Laramie county: Messenger, Peter Nicholson of Carbon county: Watchman, W. P. Carroll of Laramie county: Doorkeeper, Mr. Edward Blacker of Uinta county: Page, Richard Gray of Converse county: Janitor, T. S. Garrett of Albany county.

The Speaker appointed Messrs. Hardin of Sheridan, Maxwell of Albany and Smiley of Carbon a committee to wait

upon Chief Justice Corn and request his presence for the pur-

pose of administering the oath to the officers-elect.

The committee having performed its duty, reported to the House the presence of Chief Justice Corn and his readiness to administer the oath, whereupon the above named officers of the House, excepting Edward Blacker, Doorkeeper, being present, each took and subscribed the oath of office as administered by Chief Justice Corn.

The Speaker instructed the officers to take their respective

positions.

On motion of Mr. Deming of Laramie county, a committee of three was appointed to confer with a like committee from the Senate to wait upon His Excellency, the Governor of Wyoming, and inform him of the organization of the House and their readiness to receive any communication he may desire to make.

The Hon. Messrs. Deming of Laramie county, Cooper of Converse and Smiley of Carbon county were duly appointed

on such committee by the Speaker.

On motion of Mr. Matson of Laramie county, the rules of the House of the Sixth Legislature were adopted until such time as other rules should be adopted.

Recess.

The House being again called to order, the committee to confer with the Senate committee reported that the Senate was not ready to appoint a like committee.

Recess.

The House being called to order, a communication was received from the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company, and was read, as follows:

# BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND MEMORIALS.

ALL BILLS AND OTHER PAPERS TO BE ENDORSED.

5. All bills, resolutions and other papers, before being presented to the Chief Clerk, shall be endorsed with their proper titles and the name of the member who introduces the same.

#### MANNER OF INTRODUCING BILLS.

6. Upon the introduction of a bill the Speaker shall announce "The first reading of the bill," and the Chief Clerk shall immediately read the same. The Speaker shall refer the same to the appropriate standing committee, but the House may, on motion, direct to what committee any bill shall be referred, provided, that after first reading all bills shall be considered as having been referred to the joint committee on printing for the purpose of being printed only, without any motion to that effect, unless otherwise ordered by the House.

7. After a bill has been reported back to the House by the committee to whom the same was referred it shall be placed on the general file, and in its regular order and at the proper time it shall be taken up and considered by the House in the committee of the whole, and after the committee rise and report the bill shall lay over one day before it shall be read the second time.

# "ENGROSSED AND READ A THIRD TIME."

8. The final question on the second reading of every bill, resolution or paper, originating in the House and requiring three readings previous to being passed, shall be: "Shall the bill be engrossed and read a third time?" And upon every such bill or paper originating in the Senate the question shall be: "Shall the bill be read a third time?" And unless objections be made thereto, the Speaker may so order in each of said cases.

#### QUESTION ON PASSAGE OF BILLS.

9. Upon a third reading of a bill the question shall be stated thus: "This bill (naming it by number and title), having been read three several times, the question is, 'Shall the bill pass?'"

# RESOLUTIONS GRANTING MONEY OR REQUIRING SIGNATURE OF THE GOVERNOR

10. All resolutions to grant money out of the contingent fund or any other fund, or requiring the approval and signature of the Governor, shall be introduced and disposed of in the same manner as bills.

#### THREE READINGS.

11. Every bill shall receive three several readings, previous to its being passed, and the Speaker shall give notice whether it be the first, second or third, which readings shall be on three several days, unless the House otherwise direct by a two-thirds vote. The first and second readings shall be by title only unless otherwise ordered by the House.

#### NO AMENDMENT AFTER THIRD READING.

12. After the third reading of a bill or resolution no amendment shall be in order, except to fill blanks, without the unanimous consent of the House, provided, always, that any bill or resolution may be re-committed at any time previous to passage, and if any amendment be reported on such commitment the bill or resolution shall be again considered by the House in committee of the whole and read the second time as before, after which the question for its engrossment and third reading shall be put to vote.

#### JOURNAL ENTRIES.

13. The titles of bills and only such parts thereof as shall be affected by the proposed amendments shall be inserted in the journal.

#### AMENDMENTS.

14. No bill shall be amended until after it has been reported upon by a standing or select committee or the committee of the whole.

#### MAY CALL FOR READING OF PAPERS.

15. When the reading of a paper is called for it shall be read unless the same is objected to by some member, in which case the question shall be determined by a vote of the House and without debate or amendment.

#### ENGROSSMENT.

16. When any bill or joint resolution shall be ordered to be engrossed, the same shall be considered as having been referred to the committee on engrossment, who shall at once, without further order, take charge of the bill or joint resolution and cause the same to be correctly engrossed.

#### PRIVILEGED REPORTS.

17. The committees on engrossment, enrollment and joint printing shall have leave to report at any time when the House is in session.

#### CALL TO ORDER WHILE SPEAKING.

18. When a member is called to order while speaking he shall forthwith take his seat until it shall be determined whether or not he is in order, except he be permitted to explain; and if a member be called to order for words spoken in debate the exceptionable words shall be immediately taken down in writing by the chief clerk, so that the Speaker and House may be better able to judge of the matter.

19. A member raising a point of order may be allowed five

minutes in which to state his grounds.

## MAY SPEAK TWICE ONLY TO THE SAME QUESTION.

20. No member shall speak more than once to the exclusion of other members who have not spoken; nor more than twice to the same question on the same day without leave of the House.

#### SHALL BE REDUCED TO WRITING, IF DESIRED.

21. All motions (except to adjourn, postpone or commit) shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Speaker or any member.

#### WITHDRAWAL OF MOTION.

22. If no member objects, any motion under consideration may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment, or ordering of the yeas and nays, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House.

#### WHEN QUESTION IS UNDER DEBATE.

23. When a question is being debated, no motion shall be received, except:

1. To adjourn.

2. To lay on the table.

3. For the previous question.

- 4. To postpone to a certain date.
- 5. To commit.

7. To postpone indefinitely.

And these several motions shall have precedence in the above order.

#### MOTIONS TO RECONSIDER.

24. When a motion has been once made, and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall be in order for any member of the majority to move for the reconsideration thereof on the same or succeeding day; and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn. But no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after a bill, reso-

lution or report, upon which said vote was taken shall have gone out of the possession of the house. It shall be in order for a member who voted with the majority to give notice that he will on that day or the next succeeding day move a reconsideration, and in such case no such bill, resolution or report shall be taken out of the possession of the House until it shall have been finally disposed of, but the giving of such notice shall not prevent any other member who voted with the majority from moving a reconsideration at any time within the time limit of this rule, and the motion once made and disposed of cannot be renewed. There shall be no reconsideration of the motion to adjourn, lay on the table, suspend the rules, indefinitely postpone, and to reconsider.

## THE PREVIOUS QUESTION.

Any member may move the previous question, and if it be seconded by three other members, the previous question shall be put in this form: "The previous question is demanded." The object of this motion is to bring the House to a vote on the pending question without further discussion, and if the motion fails, the discussion may proceed the same as if the motion had not been made; if carried, all debate shall cease, and the Speaker shall immediately put the question to vote-first on proposed amendments in their order, and then on the main question, without debate or further amendment; provided, that a motion to adjourn and a call of the House shall each be in order after the "previous question" has been sustained, and before the main question is put, but no other motion or call shall be in order, except to receive the report of the sergeant-at-arms, or to dispense with the proceedings under the call; and all motions and proceedings authorized by this rule shall be decided without debate, whether on appeal or otherwise.

#### FILLING BLANKS.

26. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and the longest time shall be put first.

#### DIVISION OF QUESTION.

27. Any member may call for a division of the question, which shall be divided if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition shall remain for the decision of the House. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost shall preclude neither amendment nor a motion to strike out and insert.

#### CALL FOR THE AYES AND NOES.

28. When a question is being taken, or about to be taken, it shall be competent for any member to call for the ayes and noes, which shall be entered on the journal, and the names of the members shall be called in alphabetical order as printed on the slips for the use of the Chief Clerk.

## SHALL VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED.

29. Every member shall vote who may be within the bar of the House when the question is put, unless for special reasons he be excused. A motion to excuse a member from voting shall be made before the call of the ayes and noes is commenced, except by unanimous consent of the House. Any member wishing to be excused from voting may briefly and pertinently explain his reason therefor, but when the ayes and noes are being taken the call shall not be interrupted for any purpose whatever.

# PROTEST AGAINST ACTION OF THE HOUSE.

30. It shall be in order for any member or members to protest against the action of the House and have such protest entered briefly in the journal.

## REMOVAL OF OFFICERS.

31. Two-thirds of all the members of the House voting for the removal of the Speaker, or any officer of the House, shall be sufficient to vacate the chair, or such office, as the case may be.

#### APPEALS.

32. A majority of all the votes of the members present shallbe sufficient to sustain an appeal from the decision of the Speaker.

#### CALL OF THE HOUSE.

33. A call of the House shall only be ordered, or a vote taken thereon, upon the demand of five members, one making the motion and four others seconding the same by rising. Upon a call of the House, the names of the members shall be called by the Clerk, and the absentees noted. After which, the names of the absentees shall again be called. The doors shall then be shut and those for whom no excuse or insufficient excuse is made may, by order of those present, be taken into custody as they appear, or may be sent for and taken into custody by the sergeant-at-arms wherever to be found, or by a special messenger, to be appointed for that purpose.

#### PARLIAMENTARY PRACTICE.

34. No motion shall require a second in order to bring it

before the House, except as provided for in these rules.

35. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Reed's Rules of Order shall govern the House in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the rules and orders of the House and joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

36. Smoking shall not be permitted on the floor of the House

while the House is in session.

37. No person shall be admitted within the bar of the House except the federal and State officers, members or ex-members of Congress, and members of the State Senate, unless by special invitation on the part of the House, but a majority may authorize the Speaker to have the House cleared of all such persons.

#### MEMORIALS TO CONGRESS.

38. Memorials to Congress or to the President of the United States must be considered in committee of the whole before being adopted.

# COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

RULES OF THE HOUSE TO BE OBSERVED.

The rules of the House shall be observed in the committee of the whole, so far as they may be applicable, except that the yeas and nays shall not be taken, nor the previous question allowed, and there shall be no limit to the number of speeches.

#### MOTION TO RISE.

40. A motion that the committee rise shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES.

No standing rule of the House shall be rescinded, changed or suspended, except by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present.

On motion of Mr. Black of Uinta county, the rules were

adopted as read.

On motion of Mr. Cook of Laramie county, the Chief Clerk was instructed to extend to the Hon. Fenimore Chatterton, Secretary of State, the unanimous vote of thanks of the members of the House for his careful consideration and the provisions made for their comfort.

By request, Mr. Bristol was excused from the afternoon

session.

Recess.

The House again being called to order, the committee on joint rules reported that the rules were being typewritten, and requested that the Page be sent for them.

The Speaker pro tem was here called to the chair.

On motion of Mr. Preston of Sweetwater county, Mr. Bugas of Sweetwater county was excused for the day.

Mr. Matson of the committee on joint rules submitted the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

Your committee on joint rules begs leave to recommend the adoption of the following joint rules for the Seventh State Legislative Assembly.

# Joint Rules for the Senate and House of Representatives.

- I. In every case of amendment to a bill, joint resolution or memorial, agreed to in one house and dissented from in the other, if either house shall request a conference and appoint a committee to confer, the other house shall appoint a like committee, and such committees shall meet at a convenient hour, to be agreed upon by their respective chairmen, and shall confer upon the differences between the two houses and shall report as early as convenient the result of their conference to their respective houses for action.
- 2. When a message shall be sent from either house it shall be announced at the door by the doorkeeper, and shall be delivered to the chair by the person by whom it may be sent.
- 3. Messages shall be sent by such persons as a sense of propriety in each house may determine to be proper.
- 4. Notice of the action of either house to the other shall be on paper, and under the signature of the Chief Clerk of the house from which such notice is to be conveyed.
- 5. A standing committee, to be known as the joint committee on printing, composed of five members, two of whom shall be from the Senate and three from the House of Representatives, shall be appointed, the presiding officer of each house selecting the members to which the house is entitled.
- 6. Every bill, joint resolution or memorial which shall have passed both houses, shall then be duly enrolled by the Enrolling Clerk of the house in which it originated. It shall then be referred to the committee on enrolling, who shall carefully examine it, compare it with the engrossed bill and any amendment or amendments that may have been passed after it was engrossed, and shall correct any errors that may appear in it. They shall then report the result of such examination to the house in which the bill, joint resolution of memorial originated.
- 7. After an examination and report each bill shall be signed, first by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, or by the Speaker elected or appointed pro tem, then by the President of the Senate or by the Vice President.
- 8. When a bill, joint resolution or memorial shall have been thus signed, the chief clerk shall endorse on the back thereof a certificate specifying in which house the same originated. It shall then be presented by the enrolling committee of the house in which the same originated to the Governor of the State for his approval. After having performed said duty the committee shall report to the house in which the paper originated the day and hour of presentation to the Governor, which facts shall be entered upon the journal of said house. Said committee is further empowered to report at any time to either house any matter committed to it.
- 9. When a bill, joint resolution or memorial which shall have passed in one house shall be rejected by the other, notice thereof

shall be immediately given to the house in which the same shall have been passed.

- 10. When a bill, joint resolution or memorial which has been passed in one house shall be rejected by the other it shall not be brought in again during the same session without a notice of three days, and leave of a majority of that house in which it shall be renewed; but the same bill, joint resolution or memorial shall not be presented more than twice in either house.
- 11. Each house shall transmit to the other house all papers on which any bills, joint resolutions or memorials shall be founded.
- 12. When any bill, joint resolution or memorial shall be introduced in one house, notice thereof shall be immediately transmitted to the other house.
- 13. Any standing committee of the Senate acting with the corresponding committee of the House, may by vote of the two houses act together on a joint committee for the preparation and introduction of bills of general interest, and such bills may be introduced simultaneously in both houses.

On motion of Mr. Matson of Laramie county, the rules were adopted as read.

On motion of Mr. Atherly of Albany county, a recess was taken until 1:30 p. m.

# AFTERNOON SESSION.

House reconvened at 1:30 p. m.

#### GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CHEYENNE, WYOMING, January 13th, 1903.

Gentlemen of the Senate and House of Representatives:

The general conditions in Wyoming, at this time, are exceedingly favorable; and, as a result, the State's affairs, under careful management, are moving along smoothly and satisfactorily; and in my judgment, no radical changes in our policy or methods are required.

In presenting this address to you, I shall briefly detail results that have been accomplished in the various departments, with such recommendations as experience has shown may be necessary in simplifying and making more effective the laws and regulations

now on our statute books.

The supreme effort of the administration of the past four years has been to maintain our State government and our public institutions with a proper dignity, at the same time practicing those principles of economy and thoroughness that have reduced our necessary expenditures to a minimum. As a result of this policy, our largely increasing revenues have been more closely collected and covered into the State treasury than ever before; our expenses of office administration have been reduced; our tax levy has been materially cut down; our debts have been paid as they mature and still we have an abundance of unencumbered money in our treasury.

I would respectfully suggest that you consider with careful deliberation all legislation proposing large appropriations; especially for new work, so that for the next two years our expenditures shall not be excessive, and we be enabled thereby to again reduce the State tax levy.

#### SECRETARY OF STATE.

The business of this office has made a most remarkable and satisfactory showing during the past two years. The wisdom of our past Legislatures is evidenced by the results that have been derived from incorporation and other fees earned by this office, during the above period, which aggregate the splendid sum of \$42,599.70. This large increase of business in the office of the Secretary of State has created an extra amount of labor which, as in other departments of the State government, necessitates an increased number of assistants in this office.

The Secretary of State's report is replete with valuable suggestions which are worthy of your consideration.

The result of the distribution of the pamphlet, "The State of Wyoming," so ably edited by the Secretary of State, has been highly beneficial in attracting the attention of prospective settlers to our resources and the advantages offered here for settlement and I hope that he may be given authority to issue a new volume in 1903, with a sufficient appropriation to cover its cost.

#### STATE TREASURER.

The report of the State Treasurer has been printed as provided by law, and it is therefore unnecessary that I should refer in detail to it.

I beg to congratulate the State on the remarkable showing that has been made in our finances. On September 30th, 1900, we had a credit balance in the General Fund of \$23,385.96; on September 30th, 1902, the Treasurer's report shows a credit balance of \$86,562.89, a net gain of more than \$63,000; and this has been notwithstanding the fact that the tax levy for the General Fund has been reduced from 35% mills in 1900 to 3 mills in 1902.

I desire also to call your especial attention to the investment of permanent land funds, in county and school district bonds, which has been so industriously made by the State Treasurer during his term of office. The amount of bonds held by the State on the date of his report, September 30th, 1902, was more than \$72,000, and since then, this amount has been increased to \$101,310, which, as the bonds carry an average rate of interest of 4 8-10 per cent per annum, will yield, approximately, \$4,900 a year, all of which goes to and will be disbursed for educational and charitable purposes.

#### STATE AUDITOR

The report of the State Auditor has been printed, and you will find a copy of it before you. It gives a full and complete history of our financial affairs, and it is not necessary to refer especially to that which you will find plainly set out in it.

The Auditor makes one recommendation, however, that I desire to call your special attention to, and that is the recommendation of the State Board of Equalization that the Legislature be particularly requested to take decisive action looking to a complete revision of the equalization and assessment laws of the State.

The increase in our large taxable valuation in the last two years has been gratifying but it is not what it should be, and I therefore recommend that the entire revenue law of our State be revised to meet conditions as they exist with us today.

The assessors should be required to list the property of a tax payer after personally questioning him, under oath, as to each item in the schedule, in order that all personal property, as nearly as possible, may be assessed, at its actual value.

If this should be done, and the aggregate valuation largely increased, the tax levy can be so reduced that the result will be no more burdensome to the taxpayer than it is now under our im-

perfect system, and the showing of the State at large would be of great benefit to our credit while the lowering of the tax levy would be a strong inducement to conservative people who desire to embark in business enterprises within our boundary.

I would earnestly recommend that the State Board of Equalization be given the duty of equalizing land values in the different counties of the State as, under our present system, there is a great

disparity of values covering the same class or grade of land.

The coal lands of this State, owned by companies or individuals, upon which productive mines are being operated, do not pay their proportionate share of the taxes of the State. Some regulations should be devised equalizing the values of productive coal lands belonging to mining companies or individuals, with other property in this State, either by an assessment ad valorem, or by complying with the provisions of Section 3, Article 15 of the Constitution of Wyoming, which provides for a tax upon the gross output of mines.

# STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

From this report it will be seen that our public schools are in a flourishing condition; that the number of enrolled pupils is

rapidly increasing, and the standard maintained is high.

Our public schools are the bulwark and strength of our State and country; and, although the amount that our people pay for their support is about equal to the aggregate of all the expense of supporting our State institutions and maintaining our State government, it is money well spent, and is returned to us in an elevated and educated citizenship.

The free text book law now in force for more than three years, has proven a blessing and meets the almost universal com-

mendation of our people.

# THE BOARD OF LAND COMMISSIONERS.

The revenue derived from the leasing and sale of our State lands is amazing, and far exceeds the most sanguine expectations of those who framed the constitutional and statutory provisions for conducting the affairs of the Board.

The law requires that four meetings of the Board shall be held each year; but the immense business before it has necessitated, during the past two years, more than 150 meetings, some of

them continuing through several consecutive days.

From the rentals and sales of land during the two years ending Sept. 30th, 1902, there was received by the register of the Board and covered into the treasury \$230,091.71, as against \$159,919.57, for the two years ending Sept. 30th, 1900, and \$70,391.51 for the two years ending Sept. 30th, 1898.

The area of school and selected lands under lease by the State Sept. 30th, 1902, was 2,302,501 acres, as against 1,860,225 acres Sept. 30th, 1900, showing an increase during the past two years

of 442,275 acres. The average valuation of leased land in 1900

was 81 cents per acre and in 1902, 83 cents per acre.

The necessary labor connected with the administration of the affairs of the Land Board is now much in excess of their ability to properly perform it, together with their other duties. Experience has shown the Board that there are many other duties necessary to a thorough conduct of the Board's affairs; such as viewing land in controversy between two or more citizens desiring to lease; viewing land where applications for sale have been made—lands that we have reason to believe contain valuable deposits of coal, oil or precious metals; lands from which timber is being unlawfully cut; and lands that are being occupied or used by those who have made no application to lease and who are paying the State no rental therefor.

For these reasons, and many others, it is necessary that the position of special agent of the Board of Land Commissioners be created by the Legislature—the appointment to be made by the Board, with power of removal; and appropriating \$1,800 per annum for salary, and a reasonable contingent fund to cover necessary traveling expenses; and I would respectfully recommend that this be done.

#### ARID LANDS.

The Carey Land act was a novel and courageous idea, made effective by national legislation, with the object of encouraging and protecting those who desired to invest large sums of money in the reclamation of large arid wastes.

It was an experiment that was looked upon by many of our most practical people as a very doubtful utility, but the results are

proving the wisdom of its enactment into law.

Up to the present time, 210,359 acres of absolutely desert land have been segregated; contracts made for the building of canals for its irrigation; some of the canals completed and the land occupied and placed under cultivation by actual settlers; and the prospect is that the remainder will soon be watered and ready for settlement.

There is no expense to the State connected with this department except the salary of the Chief Clerk, as all other expenses are

covered by the entry fees coming from the settler.

The fund derived from these fees will now rapidly increase as the settler is required to pay the State 25 cents per acre when he applies for his title and 25 cents per acre more when he obtains his patent from the State.

There is now on hand in this fund \$1,047.49.

# THE STATE BOARD OF CHARITIES AND REFORM.

This Board is composed of the five State officers, and its report comprises a history of the entire conduct of the public institutions of the State and deserves your closest examination and scrutiny. The Board has made every effort to handle the affairs of the State institutions as nearly along business lines as it has been in their power to do; and we feel that the cost of maintenance in every case, has been as moderate as possible, they ever bearing in mind the dignity of the State and the exercise of a gracious humanity to those whom circumstances have committed to their charge.

# THE WYOMING PENITENTIARY.

The expense of conducting the penitentiary of this State and supporting the convicts, during the past two years has been at a cost much in excess of that of any previous year in the history of the State. This result has been brought about by two causes; the first is the unexpected increase in the number of convicts over the estimate on which the Board based its calculations in its report to the legislature two years ago. From the average increase of past years the Board estimated the average daily attendance for the years 1901-02 at 170, whereas, it ran in 1901 to 176 and in 1902 to 207 average daily attendance.

This unexpected increase was a matter of some alarm to me; and not believing that penal crimes were multiplying so rapidly among our own citizens as this would indicate, I addressed a communication to the Warden of the State Penitentiary, asking him to ascertain from his record the citizenship of those committed to that institution during the past two years. To my extreme gratification I found that only 29 per cent of the total were residents of the State of Wyoming, the remaining 71 per cent being transient characters, having been brought into the State largely as common

laborers upon railroads and other public works.

The second item that has increased the cost of maintaining this institution was consequent to the moving of the prisoners, under the act of Legislature, from Laramie to Rawlins, and the increased per diem allowed to the lessee for their maintenance. For the two reasons given, the expense of maintaining the penitentiary, will, before March 31st, 1903, exceed the estimate by about \$10,000, for which a deficiency appropriation must be made.

All the buildings that the Board was required to construct, pursuant to an act of the last Legislature, at the Rawlins penitentiary have been completed, but the general capacity of the institution is largely inadequate to meet the increased demands made upon it; and, either the penitentiary main building will have to be enlarged, or the arrangement continued of taking a portion of the prisoners to the old penitentiary at Laramie.

This institution has been visited from time to time by the members of the Board and carefully inspected; and it is found that the prisoners are humanely treated and cared for, and that a good

condition of health prevails among them.

On January 13th, 1903, there was a total of 206 prisoners confined in the penitentiary at both Rawlins and Laramie, and, of them, about twenty will be released before the 31st of March,

prox., which will reduce the number so that then, and perhaps for some time to come, all can be easily accommodated at Rawlins.

After carefully studying the conditions, I am glad to believe that the undesirable, transient class of people, above referred to, are leaving our borders; and, as a result, penal crime will now show a material decrease.

# DEAF, DUMB AND BLIND.

The deaf, dumb and blind children of the State are being tenderly cared for and well taught at institutions in our neighboring states at public expense.

# JUVENILE DELINQUENTS.

The juvenile delinquents are kept in public institutions in Colorado, under a stipulated contract, where they are periodically visited by the State Board of Charities and Reform.

They are well clothed and fed and humanely treated; and I am glad to report that a great majority of them make industrious young men and women after their release.

## THE WYOMING GENERAL HOSPITAL.

During the past two years the west wing of the Wyoming General hospital has been completed and put into use; the necessary barns and outbuildings have been constructed and a nurses' dormitory erected which will soon be ready for occupancy, all of the work being done at a cost largely within the appropriation made by the Legislature.

We are exceedingly proud of this institution, and it is doing a wonderful amount of good for a large class of our citizens who are unable, in case of misfortune, to take care of themselves. It has been managed with such care and attention that its maintenance cost the State, in the past year, the net sum of only \$767.82.

With the installation of the additional heating apparatus, which will occur in the early summer of this year, I believe that this institution will be so complete in all its appointments that no further improvements involving the expenditure of any considerable sum will be needed for a long time to come.

# WYOMING HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

The new building attached to the Wyoming State Hospital for the Insane, the erection of which was authorized by an act of Legislature, has been completed in the most satisfactory manner; it is now occupied and has given great relief to the former congested condition of the asylum.

The number of patients in the asylum is slowly increasing; and while the cost of maintenance has increased somewhat in the aggregate, the cost per capita has decreased, and is lower, I believe, this year than it has ever been before.

Charges have been made by newspapers, alleging incompe-

tency and improper methods in the management of this institution. The State Board of Charities and Reform made a most thorough investigation of the affairs of this institution, taking a very large amount of testimony, which has been reduced to writing and is now on file in the office of the Board, which entirely disproved the charges made.

The asylum is in a satisfactory condition; well managed and

the health condition of the patients is excellent.

The Superintendent is very anxious that forty acres of land, lying near the buildings, be purchased as an extension to the asylum farm, and that an appropriation of water be secured for its irrigation.

I believe that this would be a matter of economy to the State and of much benefit to the patients, as light, out-of-door work has a salutary effect on the health of many of the inmates, and has a tendency to keep them in good physical condition.

# THE SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' HOME.

The United States Inspector of Soldiers' and Sailors' Homes, after inspecting the Wyoming institution, officially reports that it is among the best managed in the United States. It is certainly a most fitting acknowledgment of the services of those who fought the battles of our country, that our State should tenderly care for them in their old age and infirmity; and we feel that this is being done in Wyoming in as thoughful and thorough a manner as by any other state.

In accordance with the instructions of the last legislature, a neat and comfortable hospital has been attached to the premises, at an expense within the appropriation for that purpose.

The State Board, after frequent inspections, is pleased to report that everything that it is possible to do for the comfort of the old soldiers, is being done, and that the food that is provided for the members of the Home is abundant and of the best quality.

The maintenance of the Home has cost the State in the past year the net sum of \$2,877.81, which is certainly most moderate, considering the comforts with which the veterans are provided.

There is an increasing number of old and dependent men with dependent wives, who are applying for admission to the Home, and there are no quarters for their accommodation; and the Board recommends that it be given authority for the construction of some small cottages or dormitories, on the grounds adjacent to the Home, for the use of the married members and their wives and for soldiers' widows.

This work can be done gradually, as necessity demands, using the balance of the money that is now reported on hand for building purposes, and from the moneys accruing from the fund known as the "Erection of Public Buildings at Capitol Land Income Fund," if the Legislature shall direct that this be done.

# THE THERMOPOLIS HOT SPRINGS.

Since the last session of the Legislature, the State Board of Charities and Reform has carefully inspected the Thermopolis Hot Springs, and have leased certain privileges connected with the Springs, the rentals from which now amount to \$600 per annum.

The Board has contracted for a water supply for the purpose of irrigating the lands on the south side of the Big Horn river; and for a free public bath house, which will be a substantial and convenient building and which is now approaching completion.

The wonderful waters of these mineral springs, which are almost identical with those in Carlsbad, Germany, are attracting much attention, and have produced some wonderful cures, and the State will be justified in spending a reasonable sum in the care and improvement of this reservation.

#### STATE UNIVERSITY.

This is an institution in which the citizens of Wyoming may feel a laudable pride. Its standard of scholarship is high; its curriculum progressive and complete, and its faculty is able, painstaking and conscientious.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the University has been printed and will be presented to you, and from it you can learn the condition of the institution's affairs, financial and other-

wise, which I consider exceedingly gratifying.

After the completion of the Science Hall, it became apparent that it would be absolutely necessary that a heating plant be provided to heat all the buildings in the University, as the original heating plant in the University proper was insufficient in capacity and had become worn and partially obsolete.

After a consultation with the Trustees, it was decided that it was best to go forward and install a modern and complete plant, for the heating of all the buildings on the University grounds. This has been done, and the Trustees ask for an appropriation to pay for this work; and, also, to make provision for an Armory Hall which could be used for a gymnasium.

I would recommend that provision be made to grant both of these requests, provided that it can be so arranged that the amount to be raised by taxation for this purpose shall be spread over a

number of years.

#### STATE LIBRARY.

Wyoming possesses a library of which she may well be proud. It is composed of 7,630 law and 3,309 miscellaneous works, besides several thousand volumes containing a complete record of the proceedings of the United States Congress and the various Executive Departments from the very foundation of the Government under the Constitution; also a large number of valuable documents pertaining to the General Government and the States; and, as the library is rapidly increasing in size, it behooves the State to exer-

cise the most stringent care in the preservation of such valuable

property.

No appropriation, whatever, was made for the purpose of buying books in the interval between 1890 and 1897, about which time certain lands were donated for the support of the library, the

rentals from which were available for purchases.

The Justices of the Supreme Court, who are the legal custodians of the library, tried to provide for the purchase of certain necessary books out of their contingent, during the period between 1890 and 1897, but their resources, however, were found to be inadequate to meet the cost of the volumes which they were compelled to purchase, and the result was that a debt amounting to several hundreds of dollars was contracted. Since that time other books have necessarily been purchased, and the income from the rental of the lands has never been sufficient to pay for them and also pay the accounts in full of booksellers against the State.

The retiring Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, who is probably more familiar with the history and needs of the State Library than perhaps any other person, suggests that an appropriation is necessary to meet the amount owed on the purchase of books.

I would therefore suggest that an appropriation of \$1,000 be made for the benefit of the Library—this sum to be used in paying the amount now owing for books, and the balance to be expended to complete certain series of law books, which the Chief Justice assures me, are indispensable to the usefulness of the Library.

This appropriation, I am informed, would place the Library in such a condition, that, with the revenues derived from the land income fund, it would be well supported and no demands would necessarily be made on the State in future, for further appropria-

tions.

The Chief Justice also recommends that the contingent fund of the State Librarian be increased from \$900 to \$1,600, as the amount heretofore appropriated is insufficient to cover drayage, express charges on books, postage, printing, and the wages of the necessary assistance required in the conduct of the Library.

The Library has been ably catalogued and cared for and is in

excellent condition.

#### THE STATE ENGINEER.

The report of the State Engineer has been printed, he paying

the cost of publication out of his contingent fund.

The department of the State Engineer is a very important branch of our State government; and one which, under all circumstances, should receive the hearty support of the people of this State.

The water laws of Wyoming are conceded to be the best adapted to the conditions which exist in the so-called "Arid region" of any state in the Union; and they are being copied by the Legislatures of other states where similar conditions to those in Wyoming exist.

We can not be overcareful in maintaining our water laws as they are, and improving them whenever it may be possible to do so; thus perfecting, in the early days of our State's history, the title to water as attached to land.

Wyoming is destined to ultimately become an irrigated empire, supporting a varied and numerous population, the principal source of whose wealth will be derived from the cultivation of the soil, in conjunction with her live stock interests. In that day water will be immensely valuable; and it is absolutely essential to the future welfare of the State that no cloud shall rest upon water titles.

The State Engineer's office, in connection with the Board of Control, has accomplished more field work in the last biennial period than ever before since its operation. This is evidenced by the fact that the present report shows that there has been collected in the past two years by the State Engineer the sum of \$4,748.05 in fees, which materially offsets the expense of maintaining his office.

Some changes should be made in the manner of compensating water commissioners, in order that they may more effectively and

satisfactorily perform their duties.

# THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

The Board of Control has for one of its principal duties the adjudication of water rights of the various streams of our State; and the importance of this work can not be overestimated.

On account of meager appropriations by past Legislatures for the use of this Board, the waters of some of our most important streams have not yet been adjudicated, and it seems to me an imperative duty on the part of the State to provide means for the immediate settlement of water questions that involve the interests of so many of our citizens and taxpayers.

I looked upon this question as so important that I requested the Board of Control to go forward with this work, notwitstanding their lack of funds, and they have made material progress in the last two years, and have been able to settle many irritating contro-

versies.

In order to do this, they have had to exceed their appropriation; and, with the work that is laid out for their March meeting, they will require a deficiency appropriation of about \$2,000, which, I hope, will be granted without any question; and I trust that after a careful consultation with the State Engineer and the Secretary of the State Board of Control, that a reasonable sum will be given them for the necessary work in the coming two years.

When the waters of our streams have all been thoroughly ad-

judicated, this expense to the State will almost cease.

# ATTORNEY GENERAL'S REPORT.

Much interesting data in reference to the judicial affairs of the State will be found in this report. The Attorney General recommends that our laws be so amended that a district attorney and a court stenographer shall be appointed for each judicial district in this State; and that any fees collected by said stenogra-

phers shall be covered into the State treasury.

This is a suggestion which merits your most earnest consideration, as systems similar to the one proposed by the Attorney General have been adopted by many states and they have universally proven efficient and satisfactory.

#### THE STATE EXAMINER.

It is difficult to estimate the value of this office to our State, counties, cities and school districts, under the able and thorough

administration of his duties by the present encumbent.

Our policy of paying all officers and public servants fixed salaries or stipulated amounts for their services, and covering all fees into the State or county treasury, with thorough examination and checking of accounts is, I believe, the most advanced step that can be taken toward honest, pure and economical government.

No defalcations whatever have occurred in the various branches of our State and county governments during the past four years, and many errors and discrepancies have been discov-

ered and promptly corrected during that time.

The report of the State Examiner is voluminous, and contains an array of statistics relating to the material affairs of our body politic, and the banks of our State, that are most gratifying and instructive; and the recommendations that he makes are worthy of

vour earnest consideration.

The banks of the State, as shown by the Examiner's report, are all sound and well managed, and show an enormous increase in deposits, which indicates a condition of great prosperity among our people. I commend to your consideration his suggestion that the time has arrived in our financial affairs, when provisions should be made for the incorporation of savings banks and loan and trust companies.

It must be a matter of pride to the citizens of our State, that our method of keeping public accounts is attracting the attention of many of the older states, and many inquiries are being made with the express view of adopting the system that has been so

successful with us.

The work of this office has so largely increased, and the importance of it is so great, that I would recommend that the salary of the Examiner be increased from \$1,800 to \$2,000 per annum.

#### INSPECTION OF COAL MINES.

I submit herewith the reports of the State Mine Inspector for the years 1901-02. These reports are replete with interesting and valuable information and statistics; and it must be a source of great pride and satisfaction to the people of the State of Wyoming to note the remarkable activity in this industry. Wyoming produced in the past year but a little short of 5,000,000 tons of coal; and it has been conservatively estimated that nearly 15,000 of our citizens are employed either directly or indirectly in mining and transporting the product of our coal mines.

To illustrate: The State Mine Inspector figures that the coal mined in the State in the past year, if loaded in standard railroad cars, would make a solid train of nearly 1,800 miles in length.

The business of coal mining in Wyoming has entirely outgrown the expectations of those who framed the laws which now regulate and govern the inspection of the conduct of our mines.

Mr. Noah Young, who has for many years been Coal Mine Inspector in this State, has filled his position with industry and credit, but, during the past few years, it has been beyond his power

to fully comply with all the provisions of the law.

The statute requires that he make a personal examination of every coal mine in the State at least once in every three months; and it is his further duty to see that detailed and correct maps or charts of the underground workings of each mine shall be made for his guidance. It is further provided that he shall receive monthly reports from each mine, and it is his duty to keep a record of such reports, so as to be enabled to furnish correct statistics concerning this great industry.

The law also requires him to act as chairman of boards of examination, the duty of which is to pass upon the qualifications of those who aspire to the position of mine boss, and this duty alone,

occupied 165 days of his time during the past year.

It is also his legal duty to repair to the scene of all fatal accidents that may occur in the coal mining industry in his jurisdiction, and to investigate the cause and to assist in fixing the responsibility. He spent some seventy-five days in the performance of this duty during the past year, there having been twenty fatal and fourteen non-fatal accidents.

There is no class of our citizens who are entitled to or who require more stringent legal regulations for the safety of their lives and limbs than the coal miners, and those employed in the coal mines of our State. It is the duty of the State to throw every precaution around the conduct of the mines, so far as is posssible, to keep them in a safe and wholesome condition, and provided with an abundance of ventilation.

In order to do this with reasonable efficiency, Wyoming should increase the number of its inspectors, so that more time and more attention could be devoted to these purposes; and I would therefore recommend, that the law be so amended as to provide for two inspectors in the place of one. I would suggest that Laramie, Albany, Carbon. Sweetwater and Uinta counties be made "Inspection District No. 1," and that all the other counties be made "Inspection District No. 2;" and that authority be given for the appointment of an inspector in each district, whose salary shall be the same as that of the present State Inspector.

I would suggest that the office of both inspectors shall be in

the Capitol at Cheyenne, and that a clerk be appointed, at a reasonable salary, whose duty it shall be, to be in attendance daily in the inspectors' office, and who shall serve as a joint clerk for both inspectors, and shall be under their direction and control.

I would also recommend that the inspectors be given a contingent fund sufficient to cover their necessary traveling and office

expenses.

I would respectfully call your attention to the reports of the State Mine Inspector for the past two years, as they are worthy of your study and consideration.

# STATE GEOLOGIST.

This department of our State government, which was instituted by an act of the last State Legislature of this State, has given satisfactory results, and has met with the general approval of those who are engaged in developming the mineral resources of

Wyoming.

Much successful prospecting has been done by miners in this State in the past two years; and several properties have developed into what bids fair to become great and paying enterprises; and a number have been sufficiently opened up, to attract capital from other sections, so that our citizens have been able, in many instances, to make sales of mining properties at very handsome figures—the money derived from these transactions going almost entirely into the pockets of Wyoming people.

It is therefore an industry which should receive all the encouragement that we are giving it, as it promises to very largely in-

crease and develop in the next few years.

The State Geologist has been very industrious in the prosecution of his duties, and has, by request, examined and made reports on twenty-two properties for which he received fees amounting to

\$700, which were covered into the State treasury.

When he could devote the time to it, he has with great care, examined various mining districts, and made casual examinations of mining properties for his own information, and for the benefit of the public; thereby enabling himself to intelligently and truthfully reply to inquiries coming from those who desire to make mining investments within our boundaries.

# STATE GAME WARDEN.

At his own expense, the present State Game Warden has printed his report, and it is full of valuable information and suggestions. Our game laws, like other laws made for the government of our people, are frequently broken but, with the facilities at the command of the State Game Warden for the enforcement of the game law, I believe that he has been very successful in the execution of his duties.

Laws for the protection of game and fish can never be successfully executed until public sentiment is strong in that direction; and I trust that every member of the Legislature and every

citizen of this State may become so zealous in their execution and will take such a personal interest in bringing to justice those who violate our laws, that the protection of our game may be assured.

When this condition of public sentiment shall prevail, it will not be a difficult matter to increase the number of these beautiful wild animals, allowing at the same time the privilege to kill a limited number to each citizen and licensee.

I earnestly ask you to consider the recommendations made by the State Game Warden in reference to changes in our law; and, in addition to what he recommends, I would urge that a close season on antelope for five years and on moose for ten years be established.

#### STATE VETERINARIAN.

A large proportion of our most thrifty and prosperous citizens are dependent upon the live stock industry; and it behooves our people to establish and put in force stringent rules and regulations for the prevention and suppression of diseases among our cattle, sheep and horses.

The State Veterinarian has been busily engaged most of the time in trying to stamp out disease, especially, among our horses and cattle, which in some neighborhoods has obtained a strong foothold. This has been the case especially with mange or itch

among cattle and with glanders or anthrax among horses.

We have established quarantine regulations and in the duty of executing them in some neighborhoods, particularly along the borders of other states, we have had to bring about several arrests and prosecutions, with the most satisfactory results, as by these means we have shown our neighbors that they cannot ignore with impunity the provisions of statutes intended for the protection of the live stock interests in this State.

If any changes shall be made in our inspection laws, they should be toward strengthening them, it being one of the bounden duties of government, to protect by all means at its command,

the interests of those who pay the taxes and maintain it.

No matter how stringent the law may be, it is worthless unless thoroughly executed; and the means at the disposal of the State Veterinarian, as a contingent fund during the past two years, have been inadequate to meet the necessities of the situation, and I

would recommend that this fund be made \$600 per year.

In order to provide funds with which to defray the expense of the Veterinarian, in visiting several localities in the State, during the past five months, upon the demand of citizens whose horses were suffering with glanders in the most violent form, I borrowed for his use, for this purpose, \$450 from the First National Bank of Cheyenne, which amount I trust that your honorable bodies will provide payment for.

# THE BOARD OF SHEEP COMMISSIONERS.

The report of the Sheep Commission shows a very gratifying condition in the sheep industry; and I am glad to say that this

board has conducted its affairs with economy and efficiency. The members of the commission have found it almost impossible to eradicate diseases among sheep, under our State inspection laws, as the State does not feel justified in paying salaries for county inspectors, and, unless we are able to adopt and execute more stringent and effective methods than are in force at present, it will be impossible to eradicate disease from among our sheep, and to keep them in such condition that the government will allow them to be shipped out of the State to market.

The Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States, working under the Agricultural Department, has placed many inspectors in this State, who with great thoroughness, examine all flocks before they are loaded in cars for shipment to other states, and they have done their work with such efficiency, that the Board of Sheep Commissioners of Wyoming have asked the Department, through its western agent, Mr. George S. Hickox, if it was not possible to arrange matters so that all inspections of sheep should be made under the direction of the government inspectors.

The board has received a favorable reply—conditioned upon our Legislature so amending our inspection laws, as to allow the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States the right of inspection, quarantine and condemnation of diseased animals, with full power to call upon constables and other peace officers in the

enforcement of their authority.

I would earnestly recommend that this be done, as means will thus be provided by the United States, without cost to the State, for the suppression and extirpation of pleuro-pneumonia, scab and other contagious diseases among domestic animals, in Wyoming.

### STATE BOARD OF LIVE STOCK COMMISSIONERS.

Most beneficial results have come from the inspection of cattle under the direction of this commission; and I believe that much attempted theft has been prevented by the thoroughness in

which this duty has been performed.

Wyoming inspectors at the live stock markets have inspected during the past two years 205,394 head of cattle, among which were many estrays, some of whom bore the brands of small ranchmen, in which case the money has been returned to them whenever ownership could be proven. In addition to this there has been covered into the State treasury, from the estray fund, arising from the sale of animals whose owners could not be traced, the sum of \$2,222.19 during the past two years. It will be seen that this department is nearly self-supporting, and provision should be made by the Legislature to continue it in the future as it has been conducted in the past.

### NATIONAL GUARD.

This organization, at the present time, is composed of one battalion of infantry, consisting of six companies, one troop of cavalry and one battery of artillery, aggregating 374 men.

They are well organized and equipped and would be ready, in case of necessity, for service on very short notice. The great value of the National Guard to the United States was evidenced at the opening of the war with Spain in 1898, when, in an incredibly short space of time, an army drawn from their ranks was mobilized to support and maintain the dignity of the flag.

At no time in the history of our country has the standing of the National Guard been so high as now, and our people should feel a laudable pride in giving this branch of the military arm of the Nation, as thorough and effective support as our means will con-

sistently allow.

The high regard that the general government has for this service is demonstrated by legislation that is in progress of enactment by the Congress of the United States, providing for joint en-

campments of the Regular Army and the National Guard.

In case of an encampment, the general government will give the members of the National Guard attending it, the regular pay of an officer or a private, pay their transportation, and provide for all commissary supplies. The great majority of those composing the National Guard in Wyoming, are young men who cannot afford to give up their employment, even temporarily, for the sum of 52 cents per day; and I would suggest that a conditional appropriation of \$2,500, to be available in case of an encampment, be made to cover their per diem of a dollar a day for their services, in addition to the amount paid them by the government.

We have now on hand considerable stores of clothing, equipment and ammunition, which have been inventoried and cared for by the Adjutant General in person. He now suggests that an armorer be provided by law to perform this duty, which undoubtedly can be arranged for by a small appropriation for that purpose.

### SPANISH AMERICAN WAR MEDALS.

Pursuant to my recommendation, the Legislature of 1901 appropriated the sum of \$750, to provide medals for the Wyoming Volunteers who served with honor in the Philippine campaign.

An artistic and durable design was finally selected and appropriate medals were cast in San Francisco. Each was suitably inscribed with the name of the recipient, and each enclosed in a handsome case.

Of the 300 men entitled to medals, 251 have received them. When the Wyoming troops were mustered out of the service, a number of men disappeared, and, up to the present time it has been impossible to locate all of them, although a strong effort has been made to do so.

Applications continue to be received at the Governor's office from men seeking medals, and as fast as the honorably discharged men are heard from, medals are sent to them by registered mail.

Of the \$750 appropriated to provide medals for the volunteers, \$617.50 has been expended, leaving a balance on hand of \$132.50.

### BACK PAY FOR VOLUNTEERS.

Section 742 of the Revised Statutes of Wyoming provides that militia men, when called out by the State shall receive \$2 per day for the first fourteen days. The various Wyoming volunteers who are members of the militia prior to their muster in to the United States Volunteers were therefore entitled to the difference between \$2 per day and 52 cents per day—the latter being the amount paid them by the government, for the number of days from their enrollment to the date of their muster into the Volunteer service.

Under these provisions, and in accordance with an act of Congress of March 3rd, 1899, the State of Wyoming received the sum of \$5,063.60 from the United States as back pay for the Wyoming troops. Of this sum \$3,765.81 has been paid to the men entitled to receive it, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,297.79. There remain yet about 75 men who are entitled to back pay for their services and these will be paid as soon as they can be located and their claims presented.

### WYOMING HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND MUSEUM.

A great deal of the preliminary work has been done and the foundation well laid for a museum, to perpetuate for future time much interesting matter, which at a later date it might be impossible to obtain.

The Wyoming State Museum is largely the result of the efforts of Hon. Robert C. Morris, who has been indefatigable in his labors to establish it, and in connection with it a historical record of the early days of Wyoming.

It is well worth the while of every member of the Legislature to visit this interesting collection.

#### THE STATE BOARD OF PHARMACY.

In connection with this Board, I desire to impress upon you the fact that its members have worked without pay and without money; and, in view of the tremendous handicap under which they have labored, they have accomplished much.

It is absolutely essential to the welfare and safety of the people of this State, that none but druggists of recognized education and ability should be allowed to prepare or compound drugs, to be sold to our citizens. The health and perhaps even the lives of a community may at times depend upon prescriptions filled at a pharmacy, and no unlicensed or irresponsible persons should be permitted to perform such duties.

In order that the Board may attain a greater efficiency, purchase stationery necessary for correspondence, its requisite seal, and carry out the objects for which it has been created, I earnestly recommend that an appropriation of \$200 be made for its use, and with this I believe that this service can be made self-supporting in the future.

### PARDONS, COMMUTATIONS, AND RESTORATIONS.

During the period from October 1st, 1900, to December 31st, 1902, I have granted 36 pardons. Of this number, eight were juvenile delinquents committed by the courts of the State to reformatory institutions. There were three restorations to citizenship.

### CAPITOL COMMISSION.

By an act of the last State Legislature, there was levied for the years 1901-02, a tax of one-eighth of a mill for the purpose of raising funds to erect and furnish a residence for the use of the Governor of this State; and, by a provision in that act, this building was required to be completed and ready for occupancy on the first day of November, 1902.

The Capitol Commission, however, found it impossible to comply with the last provision on account of lack of funds, but they have purchased a site in the city of Cheyenne, and procured plans for the building of a structure that will be a credit to the State.

As this matter has progressed so far, I would recommend that a sufficient appropriation be made by this Legislature to enable the Capitol Commission to contract for the erection of a Governor's Residence, and providing for its completion by November 1st, 1903.

The Commission has done much in the past two years in improving and decorating the Capitol building, which is in most excellent condition.

### FISH HATCHERIES.

Reports from the fish hatcheries maintained by the State of Wyoming show that through their instrumentality, the streams of this State are being continually replenished by small fry, which, when grown, furnish an enormous supply of food for our people, besides providing a sport which is a great attraction to our own citizens and to people from outside our borders, and which induces them to visit us and spend their money among our people.

Many of the streams in this State that in their natural condition were devoid of game fish, have been stocked through the agency of the fish hatcheries; and I believe that Wyoming now ranks on a par with any of her sister states in the successful propa-

gation of game fish.

### STATE POOR FARM BUILDING COMMISSION.

It has never been found necessary to organize the State Poor Farm for the benefit of paupers; and the property purchased by the State for that purpose has, under the direction of Poor Farm Commissioners, been rented, and from this source a sum of \$1,800.63 has accumulated which is now in the hands of the treasurer of the Commission.

### THE LOUISIANA PURCHASE EXPOSITION.

The Louisiana Purchase Exposition, which will be held in 1904, at St. Louis, must commend itself to everyone interested in

the advancement and development of Wyoming, as a considerable portion of the State of Wyoming was included in the territory known as the Louisiana Purchase.

Alongside this sentimental reason for having a comprehensive and attractive exhibit from this State at this great Exposition, may be placed the conservative estimate of the material benefits to be derived from thus judiciously advertising the innumerable re-

sources of Wyoming.

A year ago, when it was proposed to hold this exposition in 1903, it was evident that it would be impossible to wait for the assembling of the Legislature before taking the proper preliminary steps to arrange for an exhibit, I appointed the following commission, viz.: Robert H. Homer, of Albany County; E. A. Slack, Laramie County; F. Salathe, Natrona County; H. C. Beeler, Weston County, and Aven Nelson, of State University, subject, of course, to your approval.

This commission met on January 29th, 1902, and perfected its organization by electing the following officers: E. A. Slack, President; R. H. Homer, Vice President; H. C. Beeler, Secretary. No treasurer was elected, but Hon. G. E. Abbott, State Treasurer, was requested to act as custodian of the funds of the Commission.

As there were no funds available to meet the immediate and necessary needs of the Commission, such as stationery, postage, etc., I borrowed \$139.70 for the use of the Commission, from the First National Bank of Cheyenne, and I would ask that you make an appropriation to refund this money.

Some time after the appointment of the Commission, the managers of the Exposition decided to postpone holding it until 1904; and, after being advised of this decision, no further action was taken by the Commission, and all expenditure of money ceased.

Realizing the importance to the State of a proper exhibit of our mineral, agricultural and other resources, at the St. Louis Exposition, I strongly recommend that you make a liberal appropriation for that purpose, and authorize the appointment of a Commission of sufficient number to take charge of the matter of collecting the different exhibits, and arranging for their proper display.

I herewith transmit petitions signed by many of the teachers in our State, requesting that provision be made for an educational exhibit at the St. Louis Exposition, worthy of the high character

and standing of our public schools and State University.

The State of Oregon is urging Wyoming to make an appropriation in order that this State may be represented at the Lewis & Clark Centennial Exposition, which will be held in the city of Portland in 1905, and the request of its officers merits your consideration. I submit herewith documents and papers which I have received bearing upon this subject.

### THE WOLF BOUNTY.

The wisdom of the Legislatures of the past, in appropriating money to exterminate predatory wild animals, is demonstrated by

the well authenticated fact, which is vouched for by stockmen generally throughout the entire State, that there has been in the past few years, a gradual decrease in the number of wild animals, such as wolves and coyotes, that prey upon and devour live stock, es-

pecially the young.

During the two years ending Sept. 30th, 1902, the sum of \$24,349 was paid out by the State of Wyoming as bounties on the pelts of predatory wild animals. The report of the State Auditor shows that 4,143 wolf and 11,908 coyote pelts have been presented as evidence of the destruction of that number of animals. Deducting \$94 for blanks, a balance was left at that date out of the \$40,000 appropriation amounting to \$15,557.

The importance of these figures can but be apparent to every stockman, as they indicate that the pests of our live stock industries are being gradually exterminated. In order that this gratifying condition may continue and even improve, I most urgently recommend that such an appropriation as will successfully accomplish this result be made to carry on this work for the next two

vears.

On the first day of January, 1903, there was left in the wolf bounty appropriation fund, the sum of \$13,775. This sum, together with an appropriation of \$20,000 by this Legislature, will create an ample fund, in all probability, to more than cover all bounties on predatory wild animals during the ensuing two years.

### STATE ARBITRATION.

The Sixth State Legislature authorized the appointment of a committee of three for the purpose of investigating the question of the compulsory arbitration of disputes arising between capital and labor, with the further end in view of recommending to your honorable body some plan for suitable legislation bearing upon this important subject. In pursuance of this authority, I appointed on the said committee Senators C. A. Guernsey, G. N. Griffen and Representative Richard Butler.

It is with exceeding regret that I am compelled to report that, owing to the departure of Mr. Griffen, one of the members of this commission, from this State, nothing has been accomplished during the past two years, although considerable literature is accessible in the State Library and in the hands of individuals, showing the results that have been accomplished along similar lines, in New

Zealand, Australia and other parts of the world.

Our position in the sisterhood of states is exceedingly favorable for the adoption of some plan for the arbitration of the differences between capital and labor, as, because of our youth, the relations between capital and labor are, in a general way, healthy and amicable, and the feelings of each for the other have never been strained to the perilous intensity so common in older states.

In Wyoming the utter lack of class prejudice and the usual willingness of both employer and employe to meet on a common platform affords the most favorable auspices for the initiation of

compulsory State arbitration, and I believe that all classes in Wyoming will look upon such legislation as beneficial to the commer-

cial growth and development of the State.

I would therefore recommend that a special committee be appointed early in the session, for the consideration of this important matter, and, if possible, that they may introduce a definite and comprehensive measure for the consideration of the Legislature.

### PUBLICATION OF REPORTS.

There is nothing so essential under a republican form of government as that the people shall be kept fully informed as to how their affairs are conducted, and how and for what use the public revenues are expended. This cannot be accomplished except by

the publication of the principal reports.

Under the present laws, no appropriation or provision is made for the printing of any reports excepting those of the Treasurer and Auditor, whereas the reports of the Secretary of State, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and Ex-Officio Register of the Land Board, the State Board of Charities and Reform, and the State Examiner, contain information as interesting and instructive as the two former.

This information any citizen is entitled to have if he desires it, but it is impossible for him to get it unless the reports are printed.

I would therefore recommend that a specific sum, which shall be reasonable in amount, be appropriated providing for the printing of 500 copies of each of the said reports, and that the same provision be allowed for printing the reports of the said officers and board for presentation to the Legislature of 1905, so that Legislators may then have at the beginning of their session, the necessary information before them to assist them in their duties.

### VOTING OF RAILROAD EMPLOYES.

We have in this State a class of legal voters, consisting of a considerable number of our most industrious and faithful citizens whose business, one way or another, is connected with the railroads, either in the railway mail service or as railroad employes.

Their duties take a very large number of them from their home on election day, thereby depriving them of exercising the dearest right of an American citizen—the right of suffrage.

The unfairness of this deprivation must be apparent to all, and I would therefore recommend that a law be passed giving to those employed on railroads in any capacity, whose duties take them away from their voting precinct on election day, the right of voting at some other point within the State, where their duty calls them, and providing that special blanks shall be furnished at railroad voting precincts, so that their votes may be sworn in, and their ballots returned in sealed envelopes to the place of their residence, there to be counted in the election returns.

The privilege has been granted in some other states and it seems to me that it is a matter of justice and propriety that we

should make provisions so that this class of our citizens, who are compelled to absent themselves from their voting precinct, shall not be deprived of their right of suffrage.

### OBITUARY.

Upon me devolves the painful duty of reporting to your honorable bodies the decease of Hon. L. D. Jackson, Representative-elect from Uinta County, immediately after his election.

Mr. Jackson was for many years a resident of Uinta County, and was well known and highly esteemed as a citizen and as a man.

By his death the community in which he lived loses an active and estimable citizen, and the legislative body to which he was chosen is deprived of the services of an able and valuable member.

### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, I am proud to inform you that all the State and appointive officers under this government have performed their duties as prescribed by law, and with one exception, have been able to keep their contingent and office expenses within the appropriation made by the last Legislature; and so you will be asked to provide for but one small deficiency.

The various boards have done the same with the exception of the Board of Control, and the Board of Charities and Reform in their maintenance of the penitentiary—the cause of which de-

ficiency has already been explained.

I would respectfully urge upon your honorable bodies the most careful deliberation over all matters coming before you; es-

pecially those involving the expenditure of public funds.

The highest province of government is to provide for every public necessity of its people, with all possible economy, but without practicing that parsimony which may make the best of laws inoperative and the most honest effort to execute them futile.

I cannot close this message without expressing my profound thanks to the State officers who have faithfully and diligently performed their duty during the past four years. They have been untiring in their efforts to successfully apply mature, business methods to the affairs of the State, and I believe with satisfactory results.

I wish also to thank the heads of departments, chief clerks and all employes in the various offices, who have performed their duty with fidelity and zeal, often when necessity demanded working overtime without a murmur.

The blessings of a benificent Providence have rested upon our people since your last meeting; prosperity, peace and happiness prevail within our borders, and I trust that His hand may guide you in your councils and deliberations to the end that wisdom shall be shown in all your acts.

#### INTRODUCTION AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

Cheyenne, Wyoming, November 1, 1902. In the accompanying report it has been the aim of the Librarian to show the additions to the State Library for the biennial period ending September 30, 1902. The total number of books in the Law and Miscellaneous Library are given, but I am unable to accurately show the total in the General Library, which consists largely of United States and State publications. These exceed in number all other books in the library. I have also been obliged to leave out of this report the number of pamphlets and maps which have accumulated during the last thirty years.

I take pleasure in renewing the recommendations of my

predecessor regarding the necessity of a new catalogue, not only for the State Law Library, but to include the Miscellaneous and General Library. Such a catalogue would be of great value to the people of the State, inasmuch as it would give a knowledge of the many important and valuable works contained in the library. I trust that the Honorable Legislature will deem it advisable to provide for the printing of such a catalogue.

I desire to call the attention of the Legislature to the large number of the Compiled Laws of 1876 and the Revised Statutes of 1887, which are stored in the basement of the capitol and are in charge of the State Librarian. These should be sold for what they will bring, but the present laws on this subject will not permit the Librarian to dispose of them at a

reduced price. It will be seen that some legislation should be enacted on this subject.

In justice to the people of the whole State, I desire to recommend the passage of a law establishing a traveling library system in connection with the State Library. Even if not more than one thousand volumes were at first available for this purpose, it would be of great benefit to the citizens of many towns in the State. Books might be shipped to any community which would enter into bonds for the return of the volumes without cost to the library. The traveling library is an important feature in library work in many states. Iowa, Kansas, Wisconsin, New York and other states have established this system with good results. The State Library is and should be for the use and benefit of the whole people, and this can only be made practicable by the traveling library system.

In explaining the workings of the traveling library, it should be mentioned that small, strong boxes are provided, which will hold about fifty books each. These boxes have one or two partitions, and the books are so packed that when the box is placed upon end and the cover, which is on hinges, is

opened it becomes a bookcase.

The books should be sent out in a systematic manner, so as to economize on freight charges, which are always paid by the borrower. The system may be illustrated thus: Select, say, five boxes and ship them to Laramie, where they will be taken in charge by the person authorized by the local association to receive them and pay the freight. These books are to be kept at Laramie for a certain length of time, as per regulations of the State Librarian, after which they will be shipped to Rawlins, the freight between the two points being paid by the second borrower. In due process of time the books are shipped to Rock Springs, and last to Evanston, from which point they are returned to the library. Local freight having been paid four times on these books, it is believed that the company will return them to the State capitol without charge. Other parts

of the State can be covered by this library system in the manner described, and thus a greater portion of the people can be reached. It is too late in the day to urge the importance of furnishing to the people good reading matter. In a way the rising generation, that is the young men and the young women, are the wards of the commonwealth.

#### BOOKS RECEIVED.

#### THE LAW LIBRARY,

During the past two years the Law Library has received 535 accessions, and now contains a total of 7,630 volumes. An effort has been put forth to improve the method of loaning books so as to prevent the volumes from becoming scattered.

Keeping in view the best possible service to the patrons of the library, the Judges and the attorneys, it was finally determied, after considerable study, to adopt a system of accounts which included a double check on each volume loaned. First, a receipt is taken for each book, and at the close of the day these receipts are entered into a register. This register is alphabetically arranged, commencing with the states; other books following. To illustrate the system, we will say that a borrower has on his receipt five state reports, one Alabama, one Pennsylvania, one New York, one New Jersey and one Missouri. Each of these reports would be charged to the account of its state, and the register would then represent every book absent from the shelves, and at the same time give the name of the borrower.

When the books are returned a rubber stamp is used and the word "returned" is stamped on the line opposite the name of each volume so returned. This system has proven satisfactory and has in many instances been of real service in showing at a glance the location of a much needed book.

The one trouble of the Law Library is that books are liable to become scattered, and this sometimes in spite of the best efforts of the Librarian. During my first year I put forth every effort to bring together stray volumes which seemed to have been out a long time. Some of these were found with little or no trouble, while others were hard to trace, but with the assistance of Chief Justice Potter and some of the District Judges, as well as a number of attorneys, something more than

two hundred valuable law books were found and returned to the library.

### MISCELLANEOUS LIBRARY.

The Miscellaneous Library was created by an act of the Legislature of 1897, and it has already a fine collection of reference and other books. During the past two years 839 volumes have been added to this department, making a total of

2,309 volumes in the Miscellaneous Library.

With the assistance of Mr. Robert C. Morris, a card catalogue has been added to this library, and the work of classifying, indexing and cataloguing other books, pamphlets and maps is now going forward as fast as other duties will permit. The Dewey Decimal System has been selected for this work, and it is confidently believed that it will meet every requirement when once fully completed.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS.

### LIBRARY IMPROVEMENTS.

During the past two years the library has been in a somewhat congested condition, there not being room for additions which were being made from month to month. To overcome this the Capitol Commission is now fitting up the north basement under the library for an overflow room, and will build a stairway to connect with the main floor of the library. When completed this basement room will serve to receive all freight and to open boxes, thus saving the main floor from the litter incident to such work. Inexpensive stacks will be put in to hold such books as will not be in constant use.

#### LIBRARY HISTORY.

The law establishing the library was passed by the Second Territorial Legislature and was approved by Governor John A. Campbell, November 16, 1871. The first Librarian was John Slaughter, who was appointed before the adjournment of that Legislature. Mr. Slaughter held the office of Librarian more than twenty-nine years; that is, until March 2, 1901, when he was succeeded by myself. At the time I took charge of the library Mr. Slaughter was appointed Assistant Librarian. This appointment was in consideration of his long service to the Territory and State.

Santa Fe, New Mexico, January 22, 1903. Legislative Assembly of the State of Wyoming, Cheyenne, Wyoming:

Joint Memorial No. 2.

To the Legislative Assemblies of the States of Arkansas, California, Kansas, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, South Dakota, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming:

Your memorialist, the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico, most respectfully represents that on the second day of February, A. D. 1848, by the treaty of Gaudalupe Hidalgo, entered into between the United States and the Republic of Mexico, the territory embraced within the territories of New Mexico was ceded to the United States.

That by that treaty the government of the United States solemnly pledged the people of the ceded territory that the

same would be incorporated into the Union of the States, and the people thereof admitted to the enjoyment of all the rights of citizens of the United States.

That the national conventions of the Republican and Democratic parties have repeatedly pledged the support of their representatives in the United States Senate and House of Representatives to the admission of the Territories of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona to the sisterhood of States.

That the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States has, in compliance with the treaty obligations of the United States and the political obligations of its members, passed a bill (H. B. 12, 543) to enable the people of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona to form constitutions and State governments, and to be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original States.

That this bill has been transmitted to, and is now pending in that honorable body, without final action having been taken thereon.

The said bill embodies the hopes and aspirations of the people of New Mexico, who are well fitted to assume the form of government provided for in said bill, as is evidenced by the fact that New Mexico has made as much educational progress during the last decade as any other part of the nation, and has a common school system the peer of any in the nation.

That within her boundaries there is taxable property to the value of more than two hundred million dollars.

That she has a sufficient population, who have manifested their devotion and loyalty to the government of the United States by furnishing more soldiers of the defense of the government, according to the population, in both the Civil and Spanish-American wars, than any State or Territory in the nation.

In the opinion of your memorialists, the people of Oklahoma and Arizona are likewise entitled to the blessings of statehood which will be secured to them by passing said bill; and because the people of the Territories of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona have inherent right to such admission by virtue of the principles enunciated in the Declaration of Independence, because such admission is vouchsafed them by the policy pursued by the government of the United States in the admission of nearly all the States to the nation, at a time when they were less fitted to assume self-government than are Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona, at the present time; because a territorial form of government is intolerable and obnoxious to a free and ambitious people; because it is an incongruity under American institutions and would be maintained only as long as absolutely necessary to prepare its people for selfgovernment; because it is a denial of the right of the people to take part in the affairs of the nation which requires allegiance and support from it, and because capital has not complete confidence in such a form of government and reluctantly

lends its aid to the development of its resources.

We, therefore, most respectfully petition your honorable body to memorialize the Senate of the Congress of the United States to pass, at the earliest date possible, consistent with the rights of and courtesies due to every one of the members of that body, said bill (H. B. 12, 543), now pending in that body and popularly known as the omnibus bill.

And we further respectfully petition your honorable body that you, by suitable resolutions, request your representatives in the Senate of the United States Congress to aid the prompt

passage of said bill by their voice and vote.

And it is Hereby Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico, That the President of the Council and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of this Legislative Assembly be directed to transmit a certified copy of this memorial to the Legislative Assemblies of the States hereby memorialized.

# Report of Select Committees.

The select committee, appointed to inspect the various State institutions visited during the time of the recent trip, submitted the following report:

Cheyenne, Wyoming, January 30, 1903. To the House of Representatives of the Seventh State Legis-

Gentlemen:—The committee on buildings and institutions beg leave to submit the following report, concerning the various institutions visited during the recent trip made by the Legislature:

State University, Laramie, Wyoming.

We, your committee, are glad to report that the buildings

under the control of the State Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming are in excellent condition. Neatness and cleanliness are observed in the rooms and halls, and the buildings are carefully looked after and cared for. The new Science Hall is a model of its kind, and is carefully designed and constructed to meet the requirements of such an institution. The money expended by the State in the construction of this building has been well and carefully expended, and it is the opinion of this committee that the State has received its full value. The construction and workmanship is the best that could be. obtained, and the Board of Trustees and those in authority are to be congratulated upon the excellent results they have obtained by the expenditure of the legislative appropriation. Owing to the short time at the disposal of your committee, we could not determine accurately the necessary repairs required at the institution.

## Fish Hatchery, Laramie, Wyoming.

Your committee found the Fish Hatchery buildings in good condition, everything being neat and orderly and in first-class shape. We have no recommendations to make in this connection, other than those made by the Superintendent.

## Hospital for Insane, Evanston, Wyoming.

We, your committee, find that the buildings at this institution are better kept than at any institution it has ever been our good fortune to visit. Every portion of this institution was in proper order, being clean, neat and comfortable. The management of this institution cannot be improved, and the State Board of Charities and Reform is to be commended for their wisdom in retaining the present efficient Superintendent.

We found everything in good condition and in order for the care and comfort of those who are unfortunate enough to become inmates. The charges of the State are carefully housed and cared for with the utmost kindness. The new building erected by the State has been designed and constructed so as to provide as much room with proper sanitary conditions as it was possible to secure with the limited amount of money at the disposal of the State Board of Charities and Reform.

We will respectfully call the attention of the Legislature to the floor in the old building at this institution. We found it in a poor condition, and it should, as soon as convenient and possible, be replaced by a new one. The plumbing is also in need of repairs, and should receive attention as soon as sufficient funds are available. The entire inside of the old building should be repainted and plastered. In order to preserve the old building it is necessary that the roof be repaired, as your committee noticed several places where the water had run through and damaged the walls to a considerable extent. With these needed repairs, the building will be in proper con-

dition and shape for many years to come, and these matters should be attended to as soon as possible, for any further delay will only add to the future cost of putting it in good condition.

## Wyoming General Hospital, Rock Springs, Wyoming.

This institution is now in the best condition it has ever been, being fully equipped with modern conveniences and apparatus for the care and attention necessary to the alleviation of pain, and those who have been victims of unfortunate accidents and have not the means at hand for their proper treatment. Cleanliness, so essential in the care of the sick and maimed, was found on every hand, order and neatness prevailed in all the wards and rooms. The new building now under way will provide comfortable quarters for those who have the care and treatment of the inmates of this institution.

In the construction of the additions and buildings in connection with the hospital, it is the opinion of this committee that the State Board used their best judgment in the expendi-

ture of the funds at their disposal.

At this institution one of the most noticeable needs is the surrounding grounds. The surrounding grounds belonging to the hospital should be graded and put in a neat and orderly appearance. Some sort of an arrangement or appliance is necessary in order to give the State property an ample water supply, both for the use of the hospital and for fire protection. Your committee is unable to say just the kind of apparatus that should be furnished, but that it is absolutely necessary has been demonstrated by past experience.

## State Penitentiary, Rawlins, Wyoming.

This we find to be a model prison in every way. The general health and care of the prisoners therein confined is much better than in other similar institutions, as shown by various State reports. The food is sufficient and of good quality. The cell house, kitchen, bakery and all out buildings are kept in the best order and manner that is possible. The lessee and warden have done everything within their power to carry out the ideas and directions of the State Board in the management of this institution. It is a surprise to the committee that the State Board has accomplished so much as they have for the sum of money expended. The improvements, additions and repairs made to the penitentiary have been carefully and economically made, and the State is to be congratulated upon the efficient manner in which our present State officers have done this work.

At the penitentiary one great improvement should be attended to as soon as convenient. The grounds within the enclosure should be graded and furnished with a fire plug. At present, should fire break out, the only fire plug that could be utilized is outside of the enclosure, and no one will admit the

advisability of turning the prisoners loose in order to combat what might prove a disastrous conflagration. If a fire plug is placed within the enclosure, the prisoners will be able to con-

trol any fire that might be started.

The ceiling of the engine or furnace room would be much safer if it was covered with corrugated iron, and your committee would respectfully suggest that this be done. The kitchen is in need of a new floor as soon as there are sufficient funds on hand to supply the same. It is also suggested that a wire fence be erected around the grounds. The plastering in the building should be repaired and all the walls be painted with at least two coats of paint.

One thing that was very noticeable to your committee was the lack of furniture in the reception room. At all the institutions we visited the reception room was furnished in a neat and substantial manner. We would respectfully recommend that suitable furniture be supplied to the penitentiary authorities, in order that the reception room may be made

presentable and comfortable.

We, your committee, desire at this time to extend our sincere thanks to the State officers for the efficient and economical manner in which they have expended the money appropriated for the construction, repairs and improvements made at the various public institutions under their control. It is the opinion of this committee that the State Board has used its best judgment in the work undertaken and done. It is the sense of the committee that more has been accomplished with the money appropriated than was contemplated by the last Legislature.

ming:

On behalf of the Second Wyoming Industrial Convention, the undersigned respectfully memorialize your honorable

body and represent and say:

That the Shoshone or Wind River Reservation in Fremont county, State of Wyoming, contains about two million eight hundred thousand acres of land; that, under the system of allotments prescribed by Congress and the Departmental procedure pursuant thereto, only about one hundred and thirty-six thousand acres of these lands would be necessary to be assigned and allotted to all of the Indians entitled thereto, the number of said Indians not exceeding about sixteen hundred and eighty; that it is of vast importance that these allotments should be made and completed speedily to the end that the residue of the State lands, to-wit, about two million five hundred thousand acres, be thrown open to settlement, development and cultivation by actual settlers and homeseekers in our State.

We, therefore, respectfully recommend and urge the appointment of a committee of your honorable body to make a special investigation into the proceedings thus far taken in the matter of such allotment, for the purpose of urging upon the government the necessity of completing the same as soon as possible.

# Reports of Select Committees.

The statutory committee, appointed for the purpose of examining the accounts of the State Auditor and State Treasurer submitted the following report:

urer, submitted the following report:

Report of the auditing committee, appointed under the provisions of joint resolution No. 1, to examine the accounts of the State Treasurer and State Auditor from October 1, 1902, and also to examine all vouchers chargeable to the several contingent funds of State officers from April 1st, 1901:

The State of Wyoming, Seventh State Legislature, Legislative Chambers, Cheyenne, Wyoming, February 16, 1903. To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

Gentlemen:—Your committee, appointed pursuant to House joint resolution No. 1, to examine the accounts and

records of the State Treasurer and State Auditor from October 1st, 1902, have the honor to report as follows:

We have examined the accounts of the Honorable State Treasurer, covering all business transacted by the said officer from October 1st, 1902, to and including February 5th, 1903.

The account of all receipts issued during the said time were found to correspond with the amount of cash the Treasurer has charged himself with and every item for which credit has been taken, a State warrant properly issued or bond interest coupons or cancelled bonds were presented.

All receipts issued were carefully footed and the respective funds to which the same should be credited have been carefully checked and are correctly entered upon the Treasurer's books. All warrants paid have been segregated as to the respective funds to which they are chargeable and were also found correctly entered.

A segregated statement of the receipts and disbursements of the office from October 1st, 1902, to February 5th, 1903, together with a trial balance and reconcilement with the ac-

counts of the State Auditor, is submitted herewith.

There is also submitted a statement of the delinquent taxes due from the respective counties to February 5th, 1903. This statement is quite flattering and shows a general decrease in the amount of this account. There was due the State January 28th, 1901, delinquent taxes and interest previous to 1901, \$24,149.85, while on January 5th, 1903, the amount due on delinquent taxes and interest previous to 1903 was \$14,698.67. These figures do not embrace the delinquent taxes for the year 1902, becoming delinquent January 5th, 1903. The willingness of the counties to pay their proportion of State taxes promptly is commendable and in some respects indicates closer tax collections.

Your committee have examined the bonds purchased for an investment of the Permanent Land Fund by the State Treasurers and we believe these investments to be first-class in every respect. They are all county and school district securities, issued within the State, and bear interest at rates ranging from four to six per cent. per annum. Practically all county school bonds issued in this State are purchased by the Treasurer, thereby giving to the taxpayers the benefit of low interest rates and the return of their interest moneys for educational and charitable purposes.

Your committee have also made a technical examination of the accounts of the Honorable State Auditor, covering from October 1st, 1902, to February 5th, 1903. For every warrant drawn and charge made there were found vouchers properly audited and regularly entered of record.

The triplicate receipts issued by the State Treasurer and filed with the State Auditor were found to compare in amounts and funds with the State Treasurer's record and the amounts with which the State Treasurer stands charged upon the Auditor's books, plus the amount of warrants outstanding, equals the amount due to the State as appears of record from the Treasurer's records.

We examined all vouchers upon which warrants were issued from October 1st, 1902, to February 5th, 1903. An examination was also made of the vouchers presented for payment against the contingent funds of State officers from April 1st, 1901. The items charged in these accounts are for legitimate expenses of the several departments, and where expenditures have been made by an officer receipts accompanied the vouchers.

The law provides that every officer having a contingent fund shall keep an account thereof, showing when, to whom and for what purpose any portion of such fund has been expended. Many of the officers have complied with these requirements, but the lack of compliance on the part of all has occasioned much extra labor in the preparation of the tabulated statements of disbursements. We respectfully recommend that every officer or department having a contingent fund for any purpose be required to keep an itemized account, properly classified, of all expenditures from such fund, and file with the State Examiner on or before January 15th in each odd numbered year an abstract of all expenditures to January 1st in such year. Such abstract to be for the use and information of the Legislative auditing committee.

Said warrant or warrants to be paid by the Treasurer of such city or town as other warrants are paid."

All persons other than butchers, who occasionally slaughter meat cattle to sell for beef or for their own use, shall exhibit the hide or hides of such cattle, at the time and place the beef is used or offered for sale, and all such persons shall keep the hide or hides of such animals slaughtered for a period of twenty days, subject to inspection by any person; Provided, That if the hide or hides be sold before the expiration of twenty days hereinbefore required, a receipt, witnessed by one or more bona fide resident taxpayers of the State for said hide or hides, must be produced, and said receipt shall enumerate the brand or marks upon the said hide or hides."
