
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Library Journal Honors Park County Library

Park County Library's main building in Cody recently received national recognition with an <u>Honorable Mention</u> in Library Journal's Best Small Library in America 2023 competition.

"Anyone that has visited the Cody Library is struck by the beauty of the library building and the location of the library," said Library Director Karen Horner. "But what really makes the Cody Library stand out is the patron experience received once someone enters the library and the awareness of the extension of that experience out in the community wherever we go to deliver outreach." <u>Read more</u> from Karen on our blog.

Park County Library System's community of just over 10,000 has limited access to quality internet, meeting spaces, and health and business resources. To help fill those gaps, Cody Library prioritizes its community's wellness through a wide range of tools and collaborations.



These include the library's Health Resource Center, with a collection curated in partnership with the Cody Medical Foundation, and an Outreach Garden, which provides hands-on education and nature literacy. Well-used meeting rooms, a café that employs special needs adults, wellness and nature backpacks to check out, and a seed library, among many offerings, allow Cody Library's staff of 10 to deliver a wealth of support and services — and eliminating late fees and expanding open hours removes traditional barriers to service.

LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION GRANT APPLICATIONS DUE OCTOBER 9

The Wyoming Library Multi-Purpose Community Facility Program (WLMCF) launched on Thursday, August 24. The application and grant guidance are available on the <u>program website</u>. Applications will be due by 3 p.m. MDT on Monday, October 9.

\$12.6 million will be granted to Wyoming libraries; public, community college, and university libraries are eligible. WLMCF is funded by a grant to the State of Wyoming through the U.S. Department of the Treasury Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund.

UW LIBRARIES NAMES ALTERNATIVE TEXTBOOK GRANT RECIPIENTS

University of Wyoming Libraries <u>recently</u> <u>awarded alternative textbook grants</u> to six faculty members to implement open educational resources (OER) in their classes for the 2023-24 academic year.

The open course materials and textbooks resulting from the grants are projected to save UW students more than \$30,400 per semester. Grants are awarded to instructors who adopt, adapt, or create new open textbooks or other learning materials for their courses.


School Libraries

The Campbell County Public Library (CCPL) in Gillette is welcoming two <u>Wyoming Book Awards</u> authors this fall.

Utah author Brandon Mull will visit 5th grade students September 26-28 and present at CCPL on Thursday, September 28, at 7 p.m. Mull's books include "Fablehaven," Beyonders," and "Candy Shop Wars." His titles have been nominees on both the Indian Paintbrush and the Soaring Eagle book award lists.

Kentucky author Ruta Sepetys will visit junior high students October 9-13 and appear at CCPL on Wednesday, October 11, at 7 p.m. Sepetys is the author of the 2022-2023 Soaring Eagle 1st place winner, "I Must Betray You," as well as other young adult titles such as "Between Shades of Gray," "Salt to the Sea," and "Fountain of Silence."

SHARE UNIQUE HISTORICAL MATERIALS ONLINE WITH CVL COLLECTIONS

Small and rural libraries, museums, and archives in Colorado and Wyoming can use <u>CVL Collections</u> to share their unique historical collections online with their communities and with the <u>Digital Public Library of America</u>. This service is free for smaller collections through the <u>Plains to Peaks Collective</u> DPLA hub.

Colorado State Library staff will work with you to create an online database branded like your institutional website, and help you exhibit your digital collection. They provide free project management services, training, and ongoing support, as well as complimentary hosting for the Omeka content management system and free storage up to 10GB. They offer <u>reasonable</u> pricing if you exceed that storage limit. WYOMING HUMANITIES OPENS NEW ROUND OF GRANTS

Non-profit organizations across the state (including libraries!) can apply to Wyoming Humanities for a <u>new round of grants</u> of up to \$10,000. Wyoming Crossroads Grants are part of an initiative to apply humanities perspectives locally to help the state realize growth out of change. These grants will support various public humanities projects related to either programming or publications.

<u>Catalyze Challenge</u>

DEADLINE: September 22, 2023

Grants to plan, pilot, and implement innovations that provide learners aged 11-22 with learning opportunities and pathways to fulfilling careers.

Engage Beyond Our Walls

DEADLINE: September 29, 2023

An IMLS-supported project currently recruiting 20+ public libraries and/or their community partners to co-create neighborhood experiences tied to local history, community voices, and cultural landmarks. Selected applicants can unlock \$300 in project funding, access to easy tools, and training from national leaders. A Zoom information session will be held Thursday, September 21 at 12 p.m. MDT.

Frances R. Dewing Foundation DEADLINE: October 1, 2023

Supports innovation in early childhood education. Emphasis is placed on new, untried, or unusual projects and programs that, if successful, could have a snowball or ripple effect benefiting the larger educational or local community. The foundation provides seed money, generally ranging from \$1,000 to \$25,000.

Americans and the Holocaust Traveling Exhibition

DEADLINE: October 14, 2023

Public and academic libraries are invited to apply to host the Americans and the Holocaust traveling exhibition. Selected libraries will receive the 1,100-square-foot exhibition on loan for five to six weeks, a \$3,000 allowance to support public programs, expenses paid for a library staff member to attend an orientation workshop, publicity materials, programming resources, ongoing support, and more.

Digitizing Hidden Collections: Amplifying Unheard Voices

DEADLINE: November 1, 2023

Grants for digitizing rare and unique content stewarded by collecting organizations in the U.S. and Canada. The program is designed to support efforts to digitize materials that deepen public understanding of the histories of people of color and other communities and populations whose work, experiences, and perspectives have been insufficiently recognized or unattended. Requests must range between \$50,000 and \$300,000.

Wish You Well Foundation DEADLINE: Ongoing

Focuses on supporting non-profit organizations in the United States that teach adults the literacy skills they need to communicate, grow, and thrive within their communities. Typical awards range from \$200 to \$10,000. They do not fund youth programs.

A.R.T. Library Program

DEADLINE: Ongoing

Program offers free art books to public libraries, schools, prisons, and reading centers in the United States and territories. Participants should self-define their community as economically or geographically underserved.
