LIBRARY USE ON SNAPSHOT DAY 2023

Wyoming libraries are busy, serving their communities day in and day out. Each year after Wyoming Snapshot Day, we gather <u>statistics</u> on physical and electronic library use.

WYLD libraries

On Snapshot Day, Tuesday, October 24, 2023, WYLD libraries circulated 11,965 items, including 4,855 children's items; issued 99 new library cards; added 584 items to their catalogs; made 3,196,729 items available to Wyoming's residents in their collections; and saw the WYLDcat statewide library catalog accessed by 2,516 users for 19,592 views and 18,712 searches. WYLD includes more than 100 Wyoming libraries: all public and community college libraries, and many school and special libraries.

Public libraries

In Wyoming's 23 public library systems, from

data collected annually by the Wyoming State Library, we estimate that on an average day there are 5,095 visits to public libraries, 578 people using a library computer, 1,029 reference questions answered, 599 children and teens attending programs, 41 meeting room uses, and 694 wireless internet sessions.

GoWYLD

<u>GoWYLD</u> electronic resources include research databases, e-content, learning courses, and more. On October 24, there were 286 visits to the GoWYLD.net A to Z databases list with 784 total views of the GoWYLD LibGuides — 55 different guides were accessed; 3,680 total digital checkouts by 2,593 unique users in the OverDrive/Libby Wyoming Virtual Library — 1,314 e-books, 1,869 e-audiobooks, and 497 e-magazines; and 4,485 sessions, 16,160 searches, and 1,055 retrievals in the Gale Databases. <u>See more stats</u> from GoWYLD.

ARTS COUNCIL ANNOUNCES CREATIVE AGING PROJECT GRANT RECIPIENTS

The Wyoming Arts Council (WAC) has announced that three Wyoming libraries were among the <u>recipients of the Creative Aging</u> <u>Project Grant</u>. Campbell County Public Library, Lincoln County Library, and Sheridan Fulmer Public Library all received funding. The grants have been awarded to Wyoming-based teaching artists and arts and cultural organizations in order to develop and implement multiple 8-week Creative Aging programs through August 2024. The programs are designed to provide arts education and social engagement opportunities for Wyoming's older adults.

PARK COUNTY LIBRARY OPENS NEW MOOSE MEETING ROOM

The Park County Library has <u>opened its new</u> Moose Meeting Room, made possible through the support of the Friends of the Cody Library group. The room is a modular pod designed to accommodate a variety of needs. The room features seating for four, an occupancy sensor that ensures energy efficiency, ultra-quiet ventilation, a built-in Powerbox that keeps cables in place and ensures devices stay charged, and sustainable soundproof construction made from recycled PET. This modern and eco-friendly meeting room is a testament to the library's commitment to providing innovative spaces for its patrons. The Moose Meeting Room provides an ideal environment for meetings, study sessions, and collaborative projects.

TWO LIBRARIES SELECTED FOR SMITHSONIAN EXHIBITION

Wyoming Humanities has announced the six sites, including two Wyoming libraries, selected for the statewide tour of the Smithsonian Institute's exhibition, Spark! Places of Innovation. The exhibition takes visitors on a journey through time and place across America to discover the stories of people who lived, worked, played, collaborated, adapted, took risks, solved problems, and sometimes failed all in the pursuit of something new. The themes addressed are technological, social, artistic, and cultural/heritage innovation.

Among other stops, the exhibition will appear in Douglas at the Converse County Public Library from July 5 to August 20, 2024, and in Cheyenne

Wyoming students in grades 4-12 are invited to read, be inspired, and write



PATENTS FOR YOUR HOLIDAY BAKING




Filled Cooky Cutter invented by Wilma L. Lewis of Douglas, Wyoming, in 1953.

With autumn drawing to a close, it's time to appreciate the upcoming holiday baking season. Like many people, during the winter months, we stock up on our favorite baked goods. No Thanksgiving table is bereft of a pie and Christmas cookies are a beloved tradition. This tradition is long lived and ever evolving. <u>On the</u> <u>WSL blog</u>, we looked at three patents from days gone by that bring innovation to holiday staples.

The first invention, for a <u>Filled Cooky Cutter</u>, is from 1953. Invented by Wilma L. Lewis of Douglas, Wyoming. With this invention one could make apple pie cookies or any variation of a filled cookie without having to crimp and cut the edges of the dough separately. 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The New Approach, April 1989

The Wyoming Digital Newspaper Collection has added five prison newspapers to its database. Titles include *Best Scene*, *J-A-B-S*, *Wyoming State Honor Farm*, *Wyoming Pen*, and *The New Approach*. These newspapers span from 1915 to 1992 and were all written, edited, and published by those in the prison system.

Topics range from entertainment pieces to local news. Local news from these articles include prices, agricultural information, and government and school events. On the entertainment side, newspapers include opinion columns, poetry, and short stories.

Grants & Awards

Youth Garden Grant 2024

DEADLINE: December 15, 2023

Supports school and youth educational garden projects that enhance the quality of life for youth and their communities. In early 2024, 50 organizations will be awarded \$500 in funding and a collection of gardening supplies for their youth garden program.

<u>Rocky Mountain Power Foundation</u> <u>Grants</u>

DEADLINE: December 15, 2023

The foundation will award grants for addiction, disability resources, disaster relief, domestic violence, first responders, food insecurity, healthcare accessibility, homeless support, mental health, public safety initiatives, veteran organizations, wellness, and preventative care. Grants generally are less than \$10,000 with most between \$2,000 and \$5,000.

Walmart Community Grant Program DEADLINE: December 31, 2023

Grants of \$250 to \$5,000 will be awarded in support of local nonprofit organizations within the service area of individual Walmart or Sam's Club stores for projects that benefit the community at large. Eligible nonprofit organizations must operate on the local level or be an affiliate/chapter of a larger organization that operates locally and directly benefit the service area of the store from which they are requesting funding.

Save America's Treasures Collection Grants

DEADLINE: December 19, 2023

Save America's Treasures is a National Park Service grant program in collaboration with the Institute of Museum and Library Services, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the National Endowment for the Humanities. This grant program supports the preservation of nationally significant historic properties and collections and requires a one to one match.

Latino Poetry Project

DEADLINE: January 5, 2024

Grants of \$1,200 are available to libraries and other public institutions for programs exploring Latino poetry and its ongoing relevance to American national life. Grants may be used for honoraria for local poets and scholars, travel expenses, actor/performer fees, publicity and promotion, refreshments, or other costs associated with programs.

<u>Stephen T. Riedner Grant for Life</u> <u>Enhancing Library Programs for People</u> <u>Living with Dementia</u>

DEADLINE: February 23, 2024 Citation and a grant of \$2,500 each to two libraries to support the creation of new services and/or new programming to directly serve those living with dementia. Applications that describe only existing services or programming are not eligible for this grant. Applicants do not need to be a member of ALA.

County Launches Clickable History Map

The Park County Archives has launched Wyoming's first GIS searchable database that links hundreds of historic photos and information from an interactive online map. The project uses geographic information systems technology to map out historic places in the county. Clicking on the different icons on each map will reveal information and photos about the places from the county's archives.

Digital Collection of Colorado-based Japanese American Newspapers

The Colorado Historic Newspapers Collection has made multiple additions to their digitized newspapers, making it the largest online collection of Japanese newspapers published in Colorado. These newspapers along with the Granada camp newspapers, also included in CHNC, provide a unique look into Japanese immigration, incarceration, and community life in Colorado from 1911 to 2007 – nearly 100 years.
