The Honorable Chief Justice Blume, who was present in the Senate at this time, administered the oath of office to the President-elect, the Honorable Frank O. Horton.

Whereupon, the President addressed the Senate as follows:

“Gentlemen of the Senate:

“I am not unmindful of the signal honor that you have bestowed upon me and I thank you for it and I am already beginning to understand the great responsibility that you have placed upon my shoulders. I pledge the best that I have in me to the end that your judgment may be vindicated and I further pledge to administer the office of President of the Senate in a fair and impartial way. In return, I ask your whole-hearted co-operation, deepest understanding and loyalty, which I know you are willing to give me, so that we may

make out of this, the Senate of the Twentieth Legislature of the State of Wyoming, one of the most useful bodies, for the good of the State, that Wyoming has ever had. In order that this may be brought about, it will be necessary to maintain all of the dignity with which this body has ever been clothed. I particularly charge you older members of the Senate to lead in this responsibility, so that the newer members may know and help carry on.

"If you wish tolerance for your own views, then extend tolerance in like measure to the views of others. The late E. A. Whitney, of Sheridan County, the founder of the so called Whitney Memorial Fund, which has been of such great value to northern Wyoming, had as his motto and philosophy of life, which he caused to be engraved on his tombstone, the following:

"What a man really believes seems to him to be really true, but that does not make it so except to his mind."

"It seems to me that briefly and very much to the point this motto should act as our motto during the session.

"If we are to make this a more useful body, I ask you to bring to the Senate all of those common sense business principles, which you have found necessary to employ in your own business. In order to make this body a success, a strict business organization is absolutely necessary. We must delegate authority, if we would rid ourselves of all unnecessary detail, and in delegating authority, we must in like measure insist upon the efficient discharge of that thing delegated. In choosing committees, the peculiar fitness of each member, to properly consider the subject matter referred to him, will be taken into consideration. If each member of each committee will accept seriously his position and not permit any matter referred to his committee to be reported out, without a definite recommendation of some kind, then the members of the Senate will soon learn to respect the judgment and decision of the committee, which will make unnecessary long discussion in the committee as a whole and, therefore, greatly expedite the business of this body.

Under escort of the Joint Committee, His Excellency, Frank C. Emerson, Governor of Wyoming, appeared before the Joint Session and addressed the session as follows:

MESSAGE OF GOVERNOR FRANK C. EMERSON

Mr. President of the Senate,
Mr. Speaker of the House,
Members of the Senate and House of the Twentieth State Legislature of Wyoming,
Mrs. Mathews and Gentlemen:

It is my pleasure to appear before you this morning in response to the direction of Section 4, Article 12 of the State Constitution wherein the Governor is called upon at the commencement of each session to communicate to the Legislature by message, information of the condition of state and recommend such measures as he shall deem expedient. In the brief time I will take it will be my endeavor to provide you with such salient information as may be at my command concerning matters of state appealing to me as of such importance as to justify discussion.

Finances

Your keen interest I am sure will be manifest in relation to matters of finances. I am glad to report that the present condition of the State Treasury is comparatively good and that we are headed in the right direction.

Upon September 30th, 1928, the General Fund had warrants payable and outstanding aggregating \$289,718.65 as compared with \$808,706.82 outstanding September 30, 1926. These amounts show the overdraft upon the General Fund on the respective dates, had all warrants been paid. It is evident from the increase of nearly \$200,000 in the overdraft between the same dates in 1926 and 1927 that the state tax levy of 1926 was not sufficient to meet the expense of government in excess of the amount of income from other sources. The reduction of about \$520,000 in the overdraft between September 30th, 1927 and September 30th, 1928 constitutes a significant showing. Upon December 31st, 1928 the overdraft in the General Fund had been further reduced to the amount of \$166,145.54. The desirable objective of placing the State upon a cash basis as to its running expenses seems to be in sight.

Appropriations

In arriving at recommendations for appropriations for the next biennial period I have been ruled by the consideration of the utmost economy consistent with the efficient administration of the different offices, departments and institutions. Requests for appropriations in the sum of over \$4,100,000 were confined to a total amount of about \$3,123,000 in the recommendations. It may be said that with little exception the requests presented by the different departments and institutions were reasonable. Expenditures to cover same would have been well advised if the amounts of money involved were within our means.

Even though a large reduction from the requests is shown in the recommendations, the total of recommended appropriations exceeds by \$298,000 the appropriations of the Legislature for the present biennium. This increase of 10% may seem of concern by I believe that an analysis of the fundamental showings of the Budget will convince you that the increase is justified and the proposed expenditures within the reasonable means of the State.

State Budget

In our approach to questions of state finance it should be the endeavor to always keep in mind the fundamental underlying principle of government that may be expressed by the thought that the government is made for the people and not the people for the government. To those of us who serve as public officials it might often be desirable to have additional means at our command for expenditures that would improve our facilities or make our places more pleasant. If such outlay would seem of an essential nature and materially aid us in affording service to the State, the outlay should be made. Unless we could clearly see such a result the outlay should usually be avoided. It is in this attitude that the State Budget has been prepared.

The preparation of the Budget has been a real undertaking. Practically every item of expenditure has been scrutinized in order that essentials might be recognized and non-essentials eliminated. The Summary of Budget Data classifies the expenditures of various agencies of state government into the five broad divisions of General Administration, State Institutions, Administration of Justice, University of Wyoming, and State Highway Department.

General Administration

The general administration of State government through its thirty odd offices and departments devoted to the conduct of the business of the State, the promotion and protection of its industries, and the welfare of its people, is shown as estimated to have cost about \$1,557,000 for the biennial period which will close March 31st of this year. The Governor's recommendations propose appropriations of about \$1,559,000 for the next biennium. In view of the continuing and progressive expansion of the business of the State it is significant to note that the increase recommended is only in the sum of about \$42,000 or about 2½% increase over the appropriations for the present biennium. The increase in recommended appropriations cannot therefore be attributed to lack of economy in the Gen-

eral Administration of the affairs of the state. In fact a further study I believe will demonstrate that not only is there economy in operation but that the wise expenditure of additional funds made available for certain departments will increase the revenues of the State so that the investment will be returned many fold.

As illustration the Budget will show an increase of about \$28,000 in the amount of the appropriations recommended for the Secretary of State, State Geologist, and Board of Equalization. The Geologist leads with an increase of \$17,000 over the appropriations for the present biennial period. The principal cause of this increase arises from the fact that supervision over mineral production from state lands is proposed to be placed in charge of the State Geologist. Oil has been for several years by far the greatest producer of revenue for the State of Wyoming. By additional inspection and supervision it is believed possible to increase the revenues from oil and provide additional production and conservation of this great resource of the State. The appropriation for the Geologist has also taken into consideration the possibility of additional aid and encouragement to the development of the extensive mineral resources of the State.

The office of Secretary of State is another source of large revenue. The principal cause of the increase for this office arises from the intention to employ two full-time automobile inspectors in order that the State may be assured of the largest possible revenue from the automobile license tax and the enforcement of the law that is proposed to pass for the regulation and taxing of trucks and busses. Expenditures that will provide substantial increased revenues will be recognized as most desirable.

The Board of Equalization is charged with the responsibility of administering the revenue laws of the State and in this capacity as Public Service Commission has broad powers in relation to public utilities. A nominal increase for the activities of this department cannot be questioned.

The other two departments classed under the heading of General Administration to secure recommendations for substantial increases are those of Education and Public Health. The State will always gain by providing all reasonable amounts of money to improve its educational system. The increase recommended for the Board of Health applies to Maternal and Child Welfare work and a discussion of the advisability of a reasonable outlay for such purposes is quite unnecessary.

The increases for the five specified departments caused the total increase recommended for the purpose of General Administration. Through cooperation with the Governor in his endeavor to combine economy with efficiency in the conduct of state affairs, many departments have confined their requests to amounts less than appropriated for the present biennial period.

State Institutions

Coming to the expenditure proposed in connection with the several Charitable, Penal, and Reform Institutions of the State, we find recommendations for expenditures in the sum of about \$973,000 for the next biennial period as against estimated expenditures of \$739,000 for the present period. Here is an increase of the rather large amount of \$234,000 or about $\frac{1}{3}$ over the appropriations for

the present biennium. The reason for this increase will clearly justify the proposed expenditures. Wyoming may be proud of its several State Institutions. They are now well managed by competent directing heads and as a whole the physical plants and general conditions obtaining are of a good order. However, additional demands are being made upon them. The growth in population at the several institutions calls for enlargements of quarters that cannot be denied. The increase shown for recommended appropriations is caused nearly entirely by items of Capital Outlay made necessary by additions to several of the institutions.

It may be further interesting to note that the two institutional undertakings that have been added to the State's burden during recent years, in themselves call for appropriations of over \$218,000 for the next biennium, or an amount that is well along towards the total amount of increase in the entire State Budget.

Administration of Justice

Little increase is shown in the cost of Administration of Justice. The increased salaries for Judges went into effect prior to the appropriations for the present biennium and contingent appropriations have heretofore been of such amount as to provide sufficient funds for the competent conduct of our courts.

University of Wyoming

For the University of Wyoming an increase of \$35,000 in direct appropriations has been recommended as against a request for increase of \$87,000. The additional funds as recommended for direct appropriation are necessary if the University is to be continued upon its present high standards. The increased amount has been essential in order that funds may be provided to replace the decrease in receipt from the tax levies of $\frac{1}{2}$ mill that finance in part the maintenance of the University. By reason of the material drop in state valuations for the year 1928 the receipts from the state tax levy will be diminished by at least \$20,000.

Economies

While we may recognize the wisdom of the increases proposed in the Budget we still have to foot the bill. How this is to be done without increase in taxes is the question. Two ways are open and a joiner of the two is the solution. Cut down expenses of operation and increase the revenues.

Wyoming is not overburdened by unnecessary offices, boards, or commissions. Most of these now in operation are rather necessary for the proper conduct of the various affairs of the State. There are, however, certain economies that may be effected by assigning to present established agencies duties and functions now performed by special officers or departments. During the present biennium certain offices have been eliminated by the assumption of duties involved by other officials. The State Engineer competently served as Interstate Streams Commissioner and thereby a saving of many thousand dollars annually has been effected through an elimination of cost attaching to a special Commissioner. The offices of State Highway Engineer and State Highway Superintendent have been combined and provide for material saving in highway funds. Other adjust-

ments have been made in the interest of economy where efficiency of operation was not sacrificed.

In my message to the 19th Legislature attention was called to the possibility of a joiner of the Board of Live Stock Commissioners and the Board of Sheep Commissioners. It is now my opinion that it would be well to organize the Department of Agriculture so that this agency could serve all the branches of our agricultural and livestock industries from the standpoint of state government. It would seem advisable both for the sake of efficiency and economy to combine all offices and departments having to do with regulatory laws pertaining to agriculture and livestock under one board of control. A State Board of Agriculture made up of representatives of the cattle industry, the wool growers and farming interests could effectively, efficiently and economically administer the work now being done by the Department of Agriculture, the State Board of Livestock Commissioners, the State Board of Sheep Commissioners and the State Veterinarian. If further centralization should be deemed wise, such a board might include the State Chemist and State Entomologist, both of which offices are rather separate and distinct at the present time except as nominally affiliated with the State University. After a careful study of State Departments of Agriculture in other states we find that twenty-seven states out of forty-three having State Departments of Agriculture, have already successfully combined all regulatory work pertaining to agriculture under one board. The following western states are now operating under this plan and report that efficiency and economy have been the result: North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Washington, California, Utah and Arizona. It is thought that from such a joiner of departments a saving of at least \$20,000 per year could be effected and that the work as a whole could be carried on more effectively than under the present situation.

The office of Commissioner of Child and Animal Protection could be absorbed by the administrative department of the State Board of Charities and Reform. The said Board would profit by the services of a parole officer to consider placements from the several institutions of the State which grant paroles. This function could well be combined with the duties of the protection of children. The protection of animals could well be placed in the hands of the State Veterinarian. The joiner of the office of the Commissioner with the office of the Board would afford another instance whereby economy and greater efficiency could be gained.

It might not be amiss to call attention to the load carried by the five elective officers of the State. In addition to the administration of the affairs of their several distinct departments of government, these officials are called upon to serve upon many important State Boards. In most other states a separate board handles state land matters, a separate board carries on the business of farm loans, and often a separate board conducts the business of the charitable, penal and reform institutions. In Wyoming these important activities are all handled by the boards composed of the five elective officers. By reason of the great importance of the petroleum industry to Wyoming the duties incumbent upon the State's elective officials are heavy and of much consequence. It is not suggested that any change in organization be effected but it might be of interest to you

to know that the demands upon the Governor are such that he has found much difficulty in preparing this hurried message for your consideration.

Revenues

Legislation to provide for additional revenues from several different sources will be proposed for passage by this legislature.

The question of collecting a property tax upon motor vehicles at the time of registration has long been discussed but opinions have differed as to the means of securing a law that would be both fair and effective. At the present time a considerable part of the automobiles owned in Wyoming are escaping property tax. Of 6,400 cars in Laramie County last year the number of 2,500, or about 38%, failed to pay a property tax although registering for the license tax. This condition of affairs should certainly be remedied through the enactment of an effective measure.

A bill has now been prepared which provides for the payment of the property tax to the agency collecting the license tax, upon the basis of levies of the previous year. Whether this idea should prevail, or whether in its wisdom the legislature should adopt some other plan, it is my opinion that the fundamental idea of collection of the property tax at the same time as the collection of the license tax upon motor vehicles, should be placed in effect by some form of legislation that would seem to best serve the purpose.

A bill has been prepared to cover busses and trucks operating within the State. In the provisions of the bill a tax is applied to this means of transportation based upon the miles traveled and the capacity of the vehicle. All trucks and busses doing a public business of the nature that would require them to obtain a certificate of convenience and necessity from the Public Service Commission would be taxed under the proposed act. This is a most important measure as under the present law heavy busses and trucks have been freely operated upon our highways to the detriment of the highways and without proper contribution to the State. Your careful consideration of the proposed law is requested.

Legislation proposing a tax upon stocks, bonds, mortgages, monies and other securities will be proposed in this legislature. The question of taxing such intangibles is indeed a broad one. Under our present tax laws all intangibles are subject to the same tax as other property. They have escaped tax because their owners have almost universally refused to reveal their holdings of such investments. This situation is caused by the fact that if the usual rate of tax levy is applied to intangibles, it would wipe out, and in some cases even exceed, the earnings from the investments. The bill as drawn to cover intangibles will carry the provision of the nominal tax of .5 of a mill. If, in the wisdom of the Legislature, an intangible is passed, there should proceed with it the repeal of the statute which exempts mortgages from taxation. With such exemption upon our statutes all national banks can escape taxation if they should so elect.

One of the great advantages of an intangible law would be to place the taxing of state and national banks upon the same basis. A considerable revenue would also accrue to the State under an intangible law if the county assessors would use due diligence in securing returns upon the holdings of intangibles. I am withholding rec-

ommendation in relation to the passage of a law to tax intangibles but I do commend the same to the thoughtful study and consideration of this Legislature.

Leasing State Lands

The leasing of state and school lands was intended from the first to be carried on under a plan that would secure the greatest revenue for the State. This is evidenced by the provision of law which states that "The State Board of Land Commissioners and also the State Board of School Land Commissioners shall severally lease all state and school lands belonging to the State in such manner and to such parties as shall enure to the greatest benefit and secure the greatest revenue to the State."

The law has been so amended as to lead to the adoption of a system of leasing state and school lands that is inconsistent with the evident purpose of the fundamental idea which was intended to prevail. The present law regulating the leasing of state-owned lands for agricultural and grazing purposes may have been deemed proper when enacted but at the present time does not meet the requirements of the original grant in that it does not permit the State to lease its lands for the rentals the citizens of the State are willing to pay. At the same time the provisions of the law invite constant and violent controversies before the Commissioner of Public Lands and the State Board of Land Commissioners. As a result the cost of conducting the business has increased in a great number of cases to the extent that the rentals for the first, second and third year are consumed in endeavoring to adjudicate the so-called preference right created by statute.

Since 1921 there has been a constant diminishing of income with a relative increase in the cost of administration, and under the present financial condition, to all outward appearances, the cost will continue to increase as the competition becomes keener. Little work has been done toward the classification and appraisal of the lands and the State Board of Land Commissioners has attempted arbitrarily to fix the rates for agricultural and grazing purposes. When fixed at near the value commensurate with the rates charged for private lands or even on a tax basis for lands of similar character, violent opposition has often developed, with the result that the rates for the past few years have been so low under the preference rights created by statute that in most instances a state lease amounts to a subsidy in favor of the particular holder at the expense of the entire tax paying public of the State, and as it so happens in many instances, at the partial expense of those engaged in the same occupation, residing in the same neighborhood and with a willingness to pay what a lease would be actually worth. Without question this condition should not be permitted to continue and some action should be taken to equalize the rights of the citizens of the State. It is therefore recommended that the present system be changed so as to grant leases to citizens of the State who are willing to pay the highest annual rental for the use of the land, such offers to be made in the form of sealed bids accompanied by the first year's rental, together with payment for the estimated value of the improvements on such lands if owned by another than the applicant, reserving the right, however, of the old leasee to re-lease such lands at the highest bid offered.

All leases should be made to expire upon a given date of each year and all rentals become payable on a given date at least two months prior to the annual due date, with the provision that failure to pay such rentals on or before the due date after notice, should constitute an absolute forfeiture. The present system of giving bonds to secure such payments should be eliminated.

The entire system of laws relating to state and school lands should be codified and the Board of Land Commissioners empowered by its own rules and regulations to carry into effect the provisions of the code. Some of the other western States have been faced with the same conditions as exist in the State of Wyoming and have met the situation successfully by adopting a leasing system similar to the principles suggested in the foregoing paragraphs. If made applicable in this State most of the controversies before the Commissioner of Public Lands and the State Board of Land Commissioners would cease, all of the people of the State would be placed upon an equal footing and the State would secure in financial return from its state land leases such amounts as its citizens judge the leases to be actually worth. The cost of administration would be reduced under such a plan and it is estimated that the income from state leases would be increased approximately \$100,000 per year. Such a system would also permit the leasing of about 600,000 acres of land from which the State has been unable to secure any revenue.

The plan suggested for amending the mode of leasing state and school lands and the proposal to codify the entire system of laws relating to such lands is recommended for favorable action by this Legislature.

Agriculture

Agriculture is of growing importance to Wyoming. Both in the sections where irrigation is practiced and in the regions adapted to dry farming, the last two years have witnessed substantial progress. In the period between 1926 and 1928 the gross value of the production of agricultural crops, dairy products, and poultry have increased from about \$38,500,00 to over \$42,000,000. The expansion of the sugar beet industry during this period was especially noteworthy, the total value of production rising from less than \$3,000,000 to over \$4,700,000. Certain sections of the State have been found to be especially adapted to growing different varieties of beans, with the Great Northern an outstanding specialty. The production increased one hundred percent during the two-year period and the gross value of this farm crop for the year 1928 was over \$1,200,000. The growing of such crops as sugar beets and beans always leads to better farming methods and crops of these kinds therefore have especial significance in relation to the advancement of agriculture.

Dairying is continuing to make rapid progress in the State while the output of fine turkeys has soared to a production value of one and a quarter million. Dry farm products of wheat, barley, rye, corn, seed potatoes and other crops adapted to dry farm methods have also shown substantial increase. Better agriculture methods, improving marketing facilities, and continuing betterment of transportation advantages are all tending to place Wyoming upon a sound basis in the development of its agricultural resources. The State should encourage the farmer and lend its aid in every reasonable way to this most basic of all industries.

The State Department of Agriculture and the Extension Department of the University are valuable agencies in relation to agricultural development and are entitled to continuing support. Nominal increase have been allowed for appropriations to provide additional facilities for these Departments in carrying on their important work. Your earnest consideration is commended to any reasonable legislation that may be advantageous to our agricultural development.

Livestock

For more than a half century livestock has been an outstanding industry in Wyoming. During most of this period it has been the leader and never has it lagged far behind. The period between 1919 and 1926, however, found lean years for the cattle man, and he had difficulty in conducting his business without loss. Only too often the balance was on the wrong side of the ledger. Fortunately the past two years have gone far to change this situation and the recovery from the depression of the several years has been most encouraging. From an amount of about thirty million dollars in 1926 the industry has increased its valuations to over forty-seven million dollars in 1928.

While the quoted figures indicate reasonable prosperity in the livestock industry, it is not without its serious problems. Predatory animals continue to be a menace to the flocks and herds of the State. An appropriation of \$30,000 for the next biennium has been recommended to finance a continuing wage of battle against the wolf, coyote, bobcat and other animals of like characteristics. With the addition of funds available from the Federal Government and the receipts from the furs of captured animals, the amount that will be available for the destruction of predatory animals during the next biennium will approximate \$80,000.

Changing conditions in relation to range control have given rise to many questions. Often it has been necessary for the stockman to increase his holdings of land in order to provide sufficient pasturage for his stock. This has resulted in increasing taxes and expense of upkeep not encountered in the days of more open range. Now comes the proposal of the Federal Government to lease the present open range, as provided by unentered and unoccupied public lands, for grazing purposes. I am convinced that this proposal should be strongly resisted as in my opinion it would accomplish no purpose of sufficient value to warrant its adoption. Upon the other hand it would mean more expense to the stockman and would lead to additional regulatory control in the State by the Federal Government.

Reorganization Department of Agriculture

It has been proposed in another section of this message that the activities of the Board of Livestock Commissioners, of the Board of Sheep Commissioners and of the State Veterinarian be coordinated and placed within the jurisdiction of the Department of Agriculture. All of these agencies have mutual interests to foster and protect, and not only would a considerable saving be made in the expense of operation, but it would appear that the work as a whole of these allied interests could be handled in a more efficient manner.

Farm Loans

The State Farm Loan Act has been the means of extending sound financial aid to thousands of Wyoming farmers and stockmen. It should continue to function upon a helpful and business-like basis. The present revolving fund of seven million dollars appears of sufficient amount to allow the Act to operate to the extent of handling all proper loans for which application is made.

The total number of loans in force as of January 9, 1929 was 2,089, involving principal amounts of \$6,243,450. Until the present administration took charge of the Farm Loan Department only one foreclosure had taken place. It was found that a large number of loans were delinquent for from one to six years and in a number of instances the security had materially depreciated. Prompt action was taken to remedy the condition with the result that at this time the State has acquired title through foreclosures and deeds to property representing a total investment of \$157,749.70. Of the property acquired by the State considerable has been resold with prospects pending which will probably result in the sale of a larger portion of such property.

It is believed that good business methods are now employed in handling the Farm Loan business of the State. Upon January 5, 1929, of the over six million dollars of loans outstanding only 2.86 percent were delinquent for more than sixty days and 2.25 percent were represented by title held in the Wyoming Farm Loan Board. The experiences of the past two years have demonstrated that the Farm Loan Act is well and wisely drawn, but a few amendments are necessary for the efficient operation thereof. Suggestions for such amendments have been set out in the Farm Loan Commissioner's report and should be carefully considered. Your attention is particularly directed to the fact that when the Farm Loan Act was passed by the Legislature no provision was made for the protection of the outstanding loans against taxes, insurance or other conditions.

In order that the State's interest in its Farm Loan business may be adequately protected a considerable increase has been recommended to finance the activities of the Department in order that proper assistance may be available and sound business principles continued.

Mining

An increase of interest has been shown during this two-year period in the development of the mineral resources of Wyoming. The coal mining industry has continued to operate with its usual force and the Sunrise Iron Mines have continued to furnish a large amount of ore for Pueblo smelters. A two and a half million dollar cement mill is nearing completion at Laramie, and will take advantage of the favorable clay and limestone of the vicinity to produce a high quality of cement. The development of other non-metallic minerals is also being undertaken in different parts of the State. Awakening interest has been evidenced in the mining of precious metals and at South Pass and Bonneville and in the Big Horn Mountains promising prospects have again commanded interest. The two Mining Congresses held under the sponsorship of the State Board of Commerce and Industry, the first at Casper, in October, 1927, and the second at Laramie in December, 1928, proved of much value in stim-

ulating interest in the development of mineral properties. The future holds much of promise for Wyoming in production from its great storehouses of minerals.

Oil

Although there was a very material decrease in oil production in 1927 the year 1928 as a whole has developed a more favorable situation. A slump in production was caused by the glut of the market for petroleum products by reason of the heavy production from the Seminole and other fields in Oklahoma and Texas. The over-production caused a cut of about fifty percent in price. By reason of the large decrease in both production and price the receipts of the State from federal oil royalties and from the production of oil upon the State Lands were almost cut in half. The trend is now upward again.

Early in the year 1928 a discovery was made in the Oregon Basin field in Park County that led to further exploration that has developed the fact that this field is probably one of the largest black oil fields now known. A discovery of black oil at Frannie and of a light oil at Alkali Dome furnish additional encouraging evidence of the continuation of the petroleum industry to the great advantage of Wyoming for many years to come.

Highways

The Nineteenth Legislature enacted a law providing a constructive program for the completion of our main system of highways. By this program a substantial system of surfaced roads was to be completed within a ten-year period. Two years have now elapsed and eight remain. The progress thus far has been a little more rapid than proposed by the program, and as far as now can be ascertained the system would be finally completed in a shorter time than proposed. While this plan for our primary or federal aid highway system is well conceived, it would be very desirable to speed up the work so that these important lines of transportation would be completed at an even earlier date than now planned. It is also desirable to extend the oiling process which appears to be proving most successful in the treatment of road surfaces. For these reasons additional funds for work upon the present established main highway system of the State would be most desirable.

I have also strongly in mind the advisability of a start upon a system of secondary highways. By a secondary highway I wish to convey the meaning of a substantial highway secondary only in importance to the present high standard federal aid or primary system. It has seemed to me that there is inequity existing in our highway scheme in its relation to a large group of our people. I refer to those who do not live near a main highway and who may be in position to make but little use of our primary road system at any time. These folks are entitled to a reasonable share of the benefits from automobile licenses, oil royalties and state gasoline tax, the receipts from which are being used in the construction of roads, if a logical plan can be adopted to accomplish the purpose.

As I think through the situation applying to highways over the State, I can easily visualize a series of secondary roads that would reach out in service to many areas of the State that are now quite

distant from a main highway. As illustration, I might suggest a road from Douglas to Gillette and call attention to the large area of developing country in southern Campbell County and northern Converse County, that, though now far distant from a substantial highway, would be well served by such a secondary highway as specified. A good highway between the towns of Upton and Sundance would also be of much advantage. A connection by highway between Kemmerer and Evanston in another corner of the State would be of value. A road leaving the Rocky Mountain highway near Lander and running over South Pass to a connection with the Rock Springs-Pinedale Highway, would afford an additional important link in our road system. From Pine Bluffs through the Albin territory and on to the Cheyenne-Torrington Highway, would be another valuable addition. A short strip from Menor's Ferry to Wilson on the west side of the Snake River in far Teton County would again be of value. From Sheridan up Big Goose Creek, and then a connection with the Forest Road near Steamboat Rock, would serve a worthy purpose. Guernsey to Sunrise is a short stretch of road but one that now serves many people. A connection from the Lincoln Highway in Carbon or Sweetwater County to the Colorado line is much to be desired. It would be easy to visualize the benefits of a good road between Powell and the Elk Basin Oil Field. Many other illustrations could be given to show the value of additional substantial highways to give service to people who are assisting in the development of our State, helping to pay its taxes, including the three cents on gasoline, and otherwise contributing to the State's welfare and progress.

Such a system of secondary roads as described can well embrace one thousand miles. This mileage would allow substantial lengths of roads in every county in the State. A very good type of road can be constructed at a cost of \$7,500 per mile as compared to an average cost of our present federal aid system of about \$10,000 per mile. The construction of one thousand miles of secondary highways at the specified cost would mean an investment of \$7,500,000. Means of making available such an amount of money is of course the problem. I believe the work is within our means under the following plan and that additional funds may also be made available for speeding up to some extent the present program applying to our primary or federal aid system.

The State now has outstanding highway bonds in the amount of about \$1,900,000. A sum of over \$300,000 is now held as a sinking fund in the State Treasury and is available for retirement of bonds. Thus the present highway bonded debt may be considered as in the amount of \$1,600,000. Under our one percent debt limit as now provided in the State Constitution, Wyoming could issue bonds to the extent of \$4,400,000. We could therefore at this time, by the favorable vote of the people, provide an issue of \$2,800,000 for highway work. It would be my proposal that, of this sum, \$2,000,000 be allocated for work upon a system of secondary highways and the remaining \$800,000 be used for connecting up certain important gaps which now exist upon our primary system.

The improvement of the road between Salt Creek and Kaycee, which is not possible at this time under the program applying to our federal aid system, would mean the practical completion of a surfaced highway from the Montana line south through Sheridan, Buffalo

and Casper to either Cheyenne or Rawlins upon the Lincoln Highway. A few gaps exist in the Lincoln Highway between Rawlins and Green River, in the Yellowstone Highway between Powder River and Shoshoni, and at points upon the Custer Battlefield Highway in the northeastern part of the State. The addition of \$800,000 to the other funds available under the ten-year plan would allow the closing of several of these important gaps. The \$2,000,000 proposed for the system of secondary highways would provide for the construction of nearly three hundred miles of road. Such a bond issue as proposed could be retired without any direct property tax through the payments that could be made upon the bonds after the funds that are now allocated to the ten-year main highway program would be released.

The present debt limit of one percent of the valuations of the State, as imposed by the Constitution, could be raised through the adoption of a constitutional amendment. It is my belief that the people of Wyoming are so favorable to a good roads program that they would gladly vote a raise in the debt limit to at least two percent of our valuations. This would make possible an additional bond issue of \$4,500,000 for further work. Any balance necessary to be provided for the completion of the secondary highway system could no doubt be raised through part of the proceeds from a reasonable gasoline tax.

Funds raised from the present three-cent state gasoline tax are used in the maintenance of our federal aid highways and well provide for the purpose. If a system of secondary highways were inaugurated and advanced in construction during the next two years, funds would need to be available for maintenance. I would propose that an additional cent be added to the gasoline tax for the purpose, the tax to go into effect about the first of the year 1930, and the proceeds to be used for the maintenance and construction of the secondary system.

It is believed than this plan would well adapt itself to the undertaking of a system of secondary roads, and that the work would be of much value to the State. I commend it to your consideration and trust that your action in regard to legislation to establish a system of secondary roads will be favorable to the undertaking.

Law Enforcement

The Department of Law Enforcement should be effectively maintained. The recommendation for the maintenance and operation of the Department has been made to cover the same appropriation as provided for the present biennial period. While there have been some disturbing factors in relation to the Department, upon the whole, a good record has been made during the present two-year period.

Labor

It is the duty of the State and it will be the pleasure of this administration to promote the health, safety, and general welfare of the large group of our citizens who perform the manual work of society. It is seldom that labor complains without some just cause, and its problems deserve our careful consideration.

Wyoming is fortunate in its laboring men, and I pay tribute to them. Only recently a settlement was reached through cooperation and friendly council between representatives of employer and employ-

ee, whereby a tie-up in our important coal mining industry that would have been most unfortunate and expensive to all concerned was prevented. It may be further related that the intelligent leadership of the local Unions of the United Mine Workers of America and the loyalty of the men of the organization prevented serious inroads of seditious labor into the mines of Wyoming when Colorado fields were only a short time ago subjected to a disastrous strike. Wyoming Legislatures have passed many constructive laws relating to the coal mining industry, but there are still improvements that can be made. Your thoughtful consideration is commended for any proposals that may be advanced for reasonable improvement of conditions in our mines and for additional safety of the men who give their services to this dangerous work.

Other classes of Wyoming labor are also giving their good efforts to the development of the State. They are also entitled to fair consideration of any reasonable legislation that may be presented in their behalf.

I am strongly in favor of a State Child Labor Law that will provide adequate safe-guards against any harmful employment of children. Certain reasonable amendments to our present statutes relating to child labor will place them in form to well protect the physical and moral welfare of our employed youth.

Recommendation

As main features of a constructive, forward-looking program designed to advance the best interests of the State and its people, I especially recommend your favorable consideration of legislation to accomplish the following purposes:

1. Establishment of a system of secondary highways and provision for additional funds for advancing the work upon the present main or federal aid system of highways.

Such legislation could well provide for:

- (a) Submission to the people for decision the question of a bond issue of \$2,800,000, the receipts therefrom to be divided for construction purposes between the present main system of highways and the proposed system of secondary highways.

- (b) Submission to the people for decision the question of an amendment to the Constitution that would raise the limit of bonded indebtedness of the State from one to two percent of the total valuation of all property in the State, the funds that could be made available by additional bond issues permissible under such an amendment to be also divided for construction purposes between the present main system of highways and the system of secondary highways.

- (c) A raise of one cent in the state gasoline tax, the higher rate of four cents to take effect as of January 1, 1930, and the proceeds therefrom to be used for the payment of interest upon any bond issues that may be outstanding for highway purposes and, thereafter, for the purposes of highway maintenance and construction with possible division between the present main system of highways and the proposed system of secondary highways.

2. Organization of the Department of Agriculture to combine the activities of the present Department, the State Board of Live-

stock Commissioners, the State Board of Sheep Commissioners, the State Veterinarian and the State Entomologist.

3. Incorporation of the office of Commissioner of Child and Animal Protection with the administrative office of the State Board of Charities and Reform in regard to child welfare and with the State Veterinarian in relation to protection from cruelty of animals.

4. Enactment of a law providing for the collection of property tax upon motor vehicles at the same time as registration and collection of license fees.

5. Enactment of a law regulating and equitably taxing trucks and busses.

6. Enactment of a law applying to the leasing of state and school lands so that the State may receive greater revenues therefrom and provide for more equitable administration of leases.

7. Amendment of the Farm Loan Act so as to provide better protection for the State's interest in relation to taxes, insurance, etc.

Conclusion

My definite recommendations have been made in relation to legislation that seems to me of outstanding importance. It is to be expected that there will be differences of opinion upon some of the subject matter discussed herein. Honest differences are always in order and only through friendly interchange of ideas are we able to reach the best solution of most of the problems that confront us.

You may be assured of my desire to heartily cooperate with the members of the Legislature in the diligent effort I am sure we will all make to see enacted into law a constructive program. I trust that partisanship will not assert itself to the detriment of good legislation but rather that we may seek a common ground upon which to base our action and work as a unit for the best interests of the people of Wyoming and the development of the State.

It is my sincere wish that the experience of the members of the Legislature at this session may prove enjoyable and that each and every one may return home with the conviction that the 20th Legislature was a real success.

My Dear President Horton:

The Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming has authorized me to extend a formal invitation to the Legislature and the State Officers of Wyoming and their staffs to visit Laramie for the purpose of inspecting the University. Your families are included in this invitation if any of them are interested, and special arrangements will be made for their entertainment.

Previous visits of the Legislature have proved very valuable to the members of the Legislature in acquainting them with the service of the institution. This knowledge of the institution has facilitated the consideration of University legislation and probably has saved time of the Legislature. No set program will be arranged but all visitors will be given an opportunity to inspect the portions of the University and its equipment which are of special interest to them individually. Some building additions have been made to the institution since the last session which will be of interest to everyone. Legislators can inspect the buildings, visit classes, confer with administrative officers, visit the farms and laboratories. sion Commission for their several Counties, Prescribing their Duties as such and Giving to said Old Age Pension Commission power to make such Rules and Regulations as shall be necessary to carry out the Provisions of this Act. Providing that certain persons over the age of sixty years may be granted Old Age Pensions, describing their qualifications therefor as to residence, character and property; Providing for the repayment to the several counties of all money paid in Old Age Pensions under certain conditions; Providing the requirements to be met by an applicant before an old age pension may be awarded; Providing for Old Age Pension certificates and renewal thereof; Providing for payment of Old Age Pensions; providing that old age pensions shall not be subject to assignment, sale, attachment or execution; providing for cancellation of Old Age Pension Certificates under certain conditions; Providing penalties for obtaining or aiding and abetting in obtaining old age pensions through false representation or fraud; Providing for the disqualification of applicants under certain conditions; Providing that Old Age Pensions are to be paid from the poor fund of the various counties; Providing for the reports of Old Age Commissions to the State Auditor, and repealing all Acts in conflict with this Act.

The amended as follows:

Sec. 24. This Act is being enacted into law for the purpose of permitting the Boards of County Commissioners within the various counties in the State to more economically and efficiently handle the care and maintenance of the poor who are residents within their respective counties, it being recognized that under the present system the cost of maintaining the dependent poor is greatly in excess of the amount which this act proposes to allot to each of such persons. Therefore nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize the County Commissioners or the Old Age Pension Commission to pay out during any one calendar year an amount of money for old age pension which shall be in excess of an amount of money represented by a levy of one-quarter mill on the total assessed valuation of the property within the particular County paying out said old age pension.

That following sections be renumbered accordingly.

In subdivision "C", Section 5, line 22 following the word "pension" the following words be inserted: "Five years thereof immediately preceding the time of the making of the said application in the County where application is made".

Page 3 of the printed bill that all of lines 5, 6 and 7 be stricken.

Section 13, page 6, line 11, add: "In case the recipient of a pension under the provisions of this act shall be required, by reason of illness or other justifiable cause, to remove from the county paying such pension to another county within this state, the county paying such pension at the time of such removal, shall continue to pay such pension until such time as said pensioner shall have qualified to receive a pension from the new county in which he has located. The provisions of this act, however, shall not apply in case of the permanent removal of the pensioner from the state".

The Governor shall have power to remove said State Rate Commissioner for inefficiency, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. Section 2. A member of the Public Service Commission of Wyoming shall be appointed State Rate Commissioner; and he is hereby authorized to perform the duties of said State Rate Commissioner in addition to his duties as a member of the Public Service Commission of Wyoming.

Section 3. The person appointed to the office of State Rate Commissioner shall, before entering on the discharge of his duties, file with the Secretary of State the oath of office prescribed by the Constitution of this State.

Section 4 It shall be the duty of the State Rate Commissioner and he shall have power and authority:

First, to investigate all existing or proposed rates for the transportation or conveyance of persons or property by any railroad company, express company, sleeping car company, private car company, motor bus company or trucking company or any other company, partnership or individual operating as a common carrier of persons and/or property within the State of Wyoming.

Second, to receive and consider complaints of all individuals, companies, corporations, chambers of commerce, or farm, livestock or industrial organizations and associations as to the unlawfulness of any of the rates charged by companies, partnerships or individuals named in Section one of this act, where any act under such rate or charge shall apply or take place within this State.

Third, when any such rate or rates are, in the opinion of the commissioner, unjust, unreasonable, unjustly discriminatory, unduly preferential, or in any respect in violation of the provisions of the act to regulate Interstate Commerce or of any other act of Congress, or in conflict with the rules and orders of the Interstate Commerce Commission or in conflict with the laws of the State of Wyoming,

pertaining to the regulation of rates of common carriers or in conflict with the rules and orders of the Public Service Commission of the State of Wyoming, the Commissioner shall apply for relief by petition or otherwise to the Interstate Commerce Commission, or to the Public Service Commission of Wyoming, and said Rate Commissioner is hereby authorized to appear before the Interstate Commerce Commission on behalf of complainants, who have filed complaints with said State Rate Commissioner, referred to in Section 4, paragraph 2 of this Act, when in the judgment of said Commissioner such complaints show undue discrimination or undue preference or are unreasonable as referred to in Section 3 of this Act. The Rate Commissioner shall make such rules and regulations as he deems necessary with regard to expense to be borne by individuals, companies, corporations, chambers of commerce, farm, livestock or industrial organizations and associations on whose behalf complaint is filed, which rules shall be approved by the Public Service Commission of the State of Wyoming.

Mr. Austin:—Mr. President, I move that the report of the Committee of the Whole be adopted. Motion carried.

The unanimous consent of the Senate was granted to have the following speech of Mr. Thomas Cooper incorporated into the minutes:

“Wyoming should withdraw from the Six-State Colorado Compact, and arrange for a conference between the States of the upper basin for an equitable allocation of the waters of the upper basin States.

“The existing Seven-State Compact will prove adequate to protect our interests against the application of the doctrine of priority of appropriations. Our greatest danger is the powerful State of California. For the past six years, California has maintained an insidious and powerful lobby at Washington.

"They have been successful in securing the enactment of Boulder Dam Bill.

"They have presented arguments to show that the cities of Southern California are without an adequate available water supply. California insists they desire the silt laden alkaline waters of the Colorado, for **potable** use.

"The successful diversion of water from the lower Colorado some years ago, has brought to the people of California a keen realization of the wealth producing possibilities of this fertile region.

"Water intelligently applied to the land has transformed what was formerly a desert into the richest and the most marvelous agricultural region in the world.

"California has kept continually before the eyes of Congress, and the nation, the gruesome picture of the Colorado River, swollen by spring floods, pouring into the fertile Imperial Valley.

"Flood control has been stressed a great deal, particularly since the Mississippi flood. While there is a remote possibility of a very unusual high water that might endanger the Imperial Valley, it is not imminent. In that connection, I desire to quote from a statement made by Governor Frank C. Emerson of Wyoming, before the Committee on Irrigation and Reclamation, of the United States Senate, 70th Congress, January 17th to 21st, 1928:

"The Colorado River has been taking its present course for centuries. The flood menace is there. It should be relieved, just as soon as the way is reasonably clear for that relief. However, there has not been a break from the river into the Imperial Valley in years of recent history, except as the way was opened for it by tapping the river for the benefit of irrigation within that valley."

"It seems to me, that Governor Emerson's statement before the Senate Committee indicates an apprehension on his part, that California has over-played and over-advertised the possibility of damage by floods, and California has been severely criticised from other sources for trying to scare the people of the United States into believing that the Imperial Valley is facing almost destruction, pending the building of the Boulder Dam Project.

"I am unable to agree with Governor Emerson that the withdrawal of Wyoming from the Six-State Compact would cause the collapse of the whole Compact matter.

"The Federal Power Commission, in my opinion, would refuse power permits until the four states of the upper basin ratified a compact.

"Colorado and California's interests would be concentrated upon the four upper states to hasten an allocation of the water between the states of the upper basin and a re-ratification of a new Compact.

"Wyoming has nothing to fear and nothing to lose by withdrawing from the Compact of 1925. Our rights are just as securely protected under the 1923 compact, as they are under the 1925 compact.

"To argue otherwise is to admit that the Compacts afford us no protection and that our rights to any just portion of the water of Green River is not in any way secured by those Compacts. The Colorado River Compact is simply an allocation between the upper and lower basins of the Colorado River watershed.

"Congress has seen fit to make an allocation of the 7,500,000 acre feet of water by apportioning to each state of the lower basin the definite and specific amount each State is to receive.

"I am unable to see where development will be beset by litigation if fair treatment is accorded the States of the upper basin. The problem of apportionment between the two basins has been solved. It is true that by Act of Congress authorization has been given to the States of Arizona, California and Nevada, to enter into an agreement which shall provide for a division of water between these three States, of the amount of water allocated to the lower basin under the terms of the Colorado River Compact.

"I am not prepared to admit that the limitation placed upon the use of water by California came through the insistence of the States of the upper basin.

"My opinion, based upon a rather close observation of the debates in Congress leads me to believe that the limitations were only made to appease Arizona.

"What protection has been written into the Bill is due solely to the determined and effective opposition of Arizona's Congressional Delegation. Arizona and the West have a right to be proud of and grateful to these able, courageous men.

"I am unable to understand why there should be any opposition to an allocation or agreement between the States of the upper basin.

"Section 19 of the Boulder Dam Bill provides for this very thing. I am of the opinion that few people have really taken the time to read this Bill. The press has given the Colorado Compact and the Boulder Dam Bill a great deal of publicity, which is proper, but a great deal of misinformation has also been disseminated. The Boulder Dam Bill provides for just such compacts and allocation of water between the States of the upper basin as we advocate. I am going to read Section 19 to you and I have had this Section placed on your desks in order to bring it to your attention.

"Provision has been made in the Bill, looking to the allocation of the waters of the lower basin States.

"The lands susceptible of irrigation have been, or will be, withdrawn from entry and remain segregated until such time as it is advisable for settlers to go upon these lands.

"The waters of the upper basin should be allocated between the four states of Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico. The lands susceptible of irrigation should be withdrawn from entry and tied in perpetuity to the water so allocated. This should be done before construction starts on the Boulder Dam.

"If the lands are not withdrawn, practically all of them will pass into private ownership in the near future, this will so complicate the situation that reclamation, either State or Federal, will be extremely difficult. The only light we have to guide us, as to the future, is by the experience of the past. Let us not depend upon topographical contours or vague indefinite agreements. Our States rights, both present and future, must be guarded by airtight iron clad contracts that States and Federal Government shall obey and respect.

"If this allocation of the waters between the upper States is not consummated before the Boulder Dam is built, we have kissed good-bye to another of our State's valuable resources.

"After ten years of successful cultivation, of the Imperial Valley Country, this vast empire, with its rich alluvial soil and tropical climate will be the richest and most populous area in America.

"By the provisions of the Boulder Dam Bill the consent of Congress is necessary before any ratification of any compact between

the States is valid. What chance will Wyoming have against the richest and most populous State in the country? Practically all of the water of the Colorado River will be appropriated to beneficial use, in the State of California.

"Wyoming will not be protected by the Compact because even if the four States of the upper basin can come to an agreement as to the allocation of the waters, California's financial and political influence will prevent the ratification of the Compact. The allocation must be made before the construction of the Boulder Dam and diversion of water is made. If we delay, and if we refuse to take this our last opportunity to secure to our posterity Wyoming's rights in the Green River, future generations are going to look back to the Session of the Twentieth State Legislature, as the men that gave the State's most valuable water resource to enrich the great State of California. It is humiliating to me to hear some of our citizens contend that development in Wyoming must necessarily be slow. They speak of our altitudes in the Green River Basin, being so high that these lands are not susceptible of economic reclamations. Is it their intention that our development must be retarded until erosion has lowered the mountains and plateaus of Wyoming, and raised the Delta of the Colorado so they are of an equable altitude?

"Unless the allocation is made now, the preceding statement is not so far fetched as it may sound. Extensive reclamation projects in Colorado are certain to be constructed in the near future. Colorado is awake to the future interests and welfare of the State. Wyoming people must not be permitted to be lulled into a false sense of security.

"Instead of Wyoming being last on the Calendar for Federal Reclamation Development, I contend Wyoming should be first. Wyoming has contributed more money to the reclamation fund than any other State. To date the reclamation fund has received from Wyoming approximately \$28,000,000.00; from California, about \$10,000,000.00. Why should Wyoming funds be used to further develop older and richer states while our lands remain barren and unproductive? Is the progress and prosperity of California so important to us that we are willing that the material advancement and future development of our State is to be indefinitely postponed, that California may enjoy unprecedented prosperity?

"I attended a conference recently in Governor Emerson's office to discuss the advisability of Wyoming withdrawing from the Six State Compact.

"I asked Governor Emerson as to the probability of reclamation in Arizona from the Colorado River. He replied that it was impractical because it would necessitate a pump lift of about 450 feet.

"It is rather a singular thing that the California project is feasible although a pump lift of some 1,500 feet is necessary to divert a part of the water to the west side of the San Bernardino Mountains.

"Our relations with Colorado in adjudication of water difficulties have not been such as to inspire a confidence in the mind of any one familiar with the differences that exist.

"All the water used by Colorado and Utah will be diverted from the tributaries of the Colorado River and will diminish the flow of the main Colorado to considerable extent. They may use practically all their share of the water, thus leaving Wyoming to furnish the bulk of 7,500,000 acre feet guaranteed to deliver at Lee's Ferry.

"According to the terms of the Colorado River Compact, the lower basin States may increase their beneficial consumptive use of water by one million acre feet per year. The Compact, however, does not state specifically the source of this water or make a definite provision for its allocation or distribution.

"Let us suppose that for the first ten years, after the Boulder Dam has been put into operation, that the lower basin States take this extra one million acre feet of water from the surplus water to the river, and appropriate it to beneficial use, then later on when the supply shall diminish, and the lower basin States are not to able get a sufficient amount of water from return flow to supply their needs, they will demand from the Reclamation Service that their needs be furnished by the upper basin states. It is obvious that when this situation arises, that Southern California, and sections similarly situated in the other lower basin states, will have become highly developed from an agricultural standpoint, and they will be able to exert great pressure on the Federal Government and the United States Reclamation Service, alleging that unless they are furnished with this water, that there will be a likelihood of destroying very valuable crops, and jeopardizing the interests of an established business in the growing of food stuffs. Is it not possible that under such circumstances that sufficient pressure could be brought so that Wyoming might be compelled to supply a part of that water, and thus jeopardize her own agricultural interests?

"Section Six of the Colorado Compact, provides in part as follows: 'The Governors of the States affected, upon the request of one of them, shall forthwith appoint commissioners with power to consider and adjust such claim or controversy, subject to ratification by the Legislature of the States so affected.'

"You will note that the language is always the same, relative to proposed compacts. It is specifically provided, that the Compacts must be ratified by the Legislature of the respective States. Suppose Colorado and Utah try to force Wyoming to accept unfair conditions, and an unreasonable allocation of water. What would be the situation if the Wyoming Legislature, or the Legislature of one of the other States should refuse to ratify the provisions and conditions of a Four State Compact? Surely those who favor the Boulder Dam Project will not contend that everything would remain in statue quo, during the period that there is no compact in existence—between the four States or between Colorado, Wyoming and Utah.

"The wording of the compact pre-supposes that there will be differences of opinion, and disagreements as between the States. Is it not then safe to assume that Wyoming being on the head waters of the extreme source of the Colorado River—definitely committed to supply its proportionate share of the 7,500,000 acre feet of water for delivery at Lee's Ferry, is likely to be the loser, in the event that we do not arrive at a satisfactory agreement with Colorado and Utah?

"Is it not imperative then, that we should stand on our rights and insist that the Four State Compact be entered into and ratified before construction of the Boulder Dam is initiated?

"Bear in mind now, the Boulder Dam Act, Section 19, provides that in case of any compact being entered into between any of the seven states, supplemental to and in conformity with the Colorado River Compact, that it shall not be binding or obligatory upon any

such States until it has been approved by the Legislature of each interested State and by the Congress of the United States.

"Suppose that we wait until after the Boulder Dam is completed to bind the negotiations, with Colorado, Utah and New Mexico, relative to allocation of the waters of the river, and then find out that it is necessary to carry on negotiations for years before a compact can be consummated. In the meantime, are the citizens of the Green River Valley in Wyoming, to be permitted to increase their irrigable area as the need arises, or will their lands remain in statue quo, during all that time?

"What assurance do we have that lands in Colorado and Utah will remain in statue quo during compact negotiations or pending such negotiations?

"In Article VII it is provided that 'nothing in this Compact shall be construed as affecting the obligations of the United States of America to Indian tribes'. While the full effect of this article is not easy to discern, it seems probable that the upper division might be called upon to furnish at least its proportion of the water for Indian lands, and that this proportion in times of shortage might have to come from the apportionment to it in subdivision (a) of Article III. In effect this would probably result in an additional apportionment to the lower division since there are some ten or twelve Indian reservations situated upon the streams of that division, while there are none upon the streams in the upper division except the Southern Ute Reservation on the San Juan River and a part of the Navajo Reservation near the junction of the San Juan with the Colorado, and none whatever in Wyoming. Apparently the needs of the Indian lands may be very large, and it seems to me another compelling reason why we should have an allocation of the waters of the Green River before the Boulder Dam is built.

"As between the States of the upper division and those of the lower division, the upper states seem to be made endorsers for one another. Without any attempt at apportionment of responsibility they jointly agree to assure certain results to the lower division in respect to the flow of the stream. It is quite conceivable that embarrassing questions may arise between the upper states as to the proportions and extent to which they may severally be called upon to perform these obligations, and how far each may be responsible for the others."

Mr. Lazear:—Mr. President, I move that the Senate adjourn until 9:30 A. M., tomorrow morning. Motion adopted.

State Department of Law Enforcement and by said Commissioner of such department and by each of his deputies; the State Game and Fish Commissioner of the State of Wyoming is hereby required to pay into the State Treasury, for the benefit of the Wyoming Peace Officers Indemnity Fund, a sum of money equal to one and one-half per cent ($1\frac{1}{2}\%$) of the moneys earned by said State Game and Fish Commissioner and by each of his assistants and deputies and by each of the State Game Wardens. Such payments shall be so made on or before the 15th day of the month following the month for which such payments are computed and paid. The State Treasurer shall keep a separate account for each county and said board and for said Commissioner of Law Enforcement and the said State Game and Fish Commissioner, so contributing to said fund, and shall charge against the account of each county and of said Board and of said Commissioner of Law Enforcement and of said Game and Fish Commissioner, all warrants paid on their behalf respectively from the Wyoming Peace Officers Indemnity Fund;

- (a) As awards for injuries to the above named peace officers;***
- (b) In payment of medical or hospital attendance of such peace officers;***
- (c) In payment for the investigations of injuries of such peace officers or in payment of investigations into the manner in which such injuries were received;
- (d) In payment of witness fees in cases wherein an order of award is granted to such peace officers;***

Each county and said Board and said State Commissioner of Law Enforcement and said State Game and Fish Commissioner, shall continue to make said monthly contributions as above provided respectively unless the account of any said county or of said Board, or of the State Commissioner of Law Enforcement or of the said State Game and Fish Commissioner, after making the above deductions therefrom, shall be overdrawn, in which event any county whose account is so overdrawn, or the said Board, or the said State Commissioner of Law Enforcement, or the State Game and Fish Commissioner, if their accounts shall be respectively overdrawn, shall be required to pay monthly a sum of money (including the said one and one-half per cent ($1\frac{1}{2}\%$) equal to four per cent (4%) of the moneys earned by each of such peace officers respectively during each calendar month of such employment until such overdrafts shall be paid."

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Select Committee Report

The following report from a Select Committee was received and read:

The Honorable President of the Senate:

Your select committee appointed pursuant to a Senate Resolution directing an investigation of the Department of Law Enforcement, begs leave to submit its report as follows:

Upon organizing, your committee proceeded to investigate, pursuant to said resolution, its authority, responsibility and possible scope of action. We found,

That the Resolution did not provide the Committee with funds upon which to proceed, and that by reason of lack of funds, that portion of the resolution which authorizes the committee to subpoena and require the attendance of witnesses, and to take testimony, etc., was inoperative.

Your committee alleges that interviews were had with the Chief Executive of this State; an examination made of the office of the Department of Law Enforcement of this State, and with certain State officials, as well as with several private citizens, and from these interviews and examinations made of the Law Enforcement Department, we find:

(a) That prior to April 1st, 1923, there appears to be no information or records in the office of the Law Enforcement Department, as to the number of arrests made, convictions had, or other material matters pertaining to said office, and therefore, no report of the Law Enforcement Department of this State is offered or made prior to the first day of April, 1923.

(b) Your committee did find a report in the office of said department, dated May 8th, 1925, relating to the business of this Department, for a period commencing April 1st, 1923, to and including March 31st, 1925, being the time that the Law Enforcement Department was handled by Commissioner Wachtel. This report, as aforesaid, gives the following criminal cases prosecuted during the two years period by said department, as follows:

The said report last mentioned states that the results of the disposition of the cases aforesaid, were as follows:

(c) This report also states that the prosecution of said cases aforesaid, and the fines and penalties paid were accomplished at the cost to the State of \$60,000.00, which sum of \$60,000.00 was the total contingent appropriated for the said two year period.

(d) Our investigation of the Department of Law Enforcement further shows, there was a report dated February 18th, 1927, prepared by Commissioner A. S. Roach of said Department, covering the period from January 1st, 1926, to January 3rd, 1927. Mr. Roach states that during this period, there were 326 arrests made by the Department; there were fines collected from 128 cases, amounting in all to the sum of \$10,125.75, and that of the cases first mentioned, and in the report last mentioned, there were 198 cases pending in the District Courts throughout this State, and at the time of the report, the results of the cases pending could not be positively ascertained; but that in the judgment of Commissioner Roach, the same would amount to approximately the sum of \$25,000.00, in fines, and that, in the opinion of Mr. Roach, the fines and revenues from the prosecution of the Department, during his administration and during said period, would more than cover the cost of administering the Department.

(e) The last official report available of said Department, is dated January 8th, 1929, and is signed by George G. Smith, Acting Commissioner. This report made by the said George G. Smith, covers the years of 1927 and 1928. During the period of time last mentioned, the office of the Department of Law Enforcement was administered by A. S. Roach, from January 3rd, 1927, to November 1st, 1927; that from the date last mentioned, Mr. W. C. Irving was commissioner of said Department from the said 1st day of November, 1927, to and including the first day of December, 1928, at which date

last mentioned, the said W. C. Irving did resign. That from the 1st day of December, 1928, Mr. George G. Smith, Acting Commissioner of said Department, acted as such Commissioner from the date last mentioned to the date of said report. This last report above mentioned shows, that during the year 1927, the Department handled a total of 341 criminal cases of a different character, and that during the year 1928, the department handled a total of 431 cases of a criminal nature. This last report covering the said years 1927 and 1928, shows a total amount of fines and penalties collected from the prosecution of criminal cases above mentioned, in the sum of \$62,235.90. That according to said report during the said period last mentioned, the same shows that the amount of the operating expenses of said department for the year 1927 and 1928 as aforesaid, being the sum of \$42,770.26.

The said report last mentioned also shows that for the year 1927, there were fourteen cases still pending and that for the year 1928, there were seventy-six cases still pending, from which cases last mentioned, considerable fines and penalties were expected.

(f) Your committee further alleges that from said report so made as aforesaid, for the year 1927 and 1928, included in the total number of criminal cases prosecuted, there were many cases prosecuted by the Department other than cases of violations of the Prohibition Laws. These other cases, other than the prohibition violation cases, handled by the Department, include the following:

(g) Your committee found that there is at this time in the office of the Commissioner, an apparently efficient system of daily reports of Agents in the field. These reports are checked as they come in and are retained on file. Expense expenditures are checked against these reports, and items carefully scrutinized, to the end that expenditures made which do not accord with the particular work being done, are disapproved.

Acting Commissioner Smith states that the force available under appropriations made to the Department, to-wit, a Commissioner, one Deputy and three Field Agents, is insufficient for effective enforcement. Agents must work in pairs, or trios, as it has been the experience that evidence prepared and presented to the Court by one agent is generally insufficiently corroboratory to secure a conviction. Mr. Smith is of the opinion that a force of not less than seven field agents would be required to secure statewide and reasonably satisfactory results. He further states that his office is securing satisfactory co-operation in Law Enforcement on the part of local offices in about one-half of the counties of the State.

The committee found Acting Commissioner Smith willing and anxious to co-operate with the committee and did give to the committee all the information at his command.

Your committee further represents and shows that as to any malfeasance or misfeasance in office of any Commissioner of the Law Enforcement Department, no documentary or other sufficient evidence is available bearing upon the numerous rumors and charges that have been made from time to time against the Department. Your committee, therefore, is reluctant to specifically mention any of such rumored charges, based upon hearsay evidence, believing that if competent evidence is secured of such charges, the same should be submitted and prosecuted in the courts having jurisdiction thereof. Your committee alleges that for the purpose of attempting to secure direct evidence relative to violations of law in this Department, it has interviewed several people concerning the same, but that the statements of these people, at this time, is based upon hearsay evidence, and therefore, not competent evidence.

Notwithstanding, the fact that the committee lacks what is ordinarily considered competent evidence, the committee verily believes and therefore alleges, that there have been, in certain cases, grave irregularities in the conduct of the office of Commissioner of Law Enforcement. On the other hand, the committee believes it fair to state that from such men as Commissioners A. S. Roach and D. F. Hudson the State has had honest and faithful service.

Your committee is advised and verily believes that investigations of unlawful violations are now being conducted and will be conducted to the end that the Senate will be justified in a confidence that the matters will be pursued to a just and final conclusion by the proper authorities.

Your committee further states as its opinion that Governor Frank C. Emerson, is sincerely determined that the Department of Law Enforcement shall be honestly and cleanly conducted, and we are confident that he will continue his conscientious efforts to that end.

Sirs:

We, your joint committee heretofore appointed, pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution No. 1, to examine and report upon the State Highway Department and the administration of the State Highway Commission, beg leave to report as follows:

Section 3. Section 5, Chapter 73, Session Laws of Wyoming, 1923, as amended and re-enacted by Section 3, Chapter 89, Session Laws of Wyoming, 1925, is hereby amended and re-enacted to read as follows:

"Section 5. Seventy-five per centum of all funds received by the State Treasurer from the gasoline license tax provided in this Act, shall be placed to the credit of the State Highway Fund for maintenance, improvement and asphalt oil surfacing of state highways, and shall be apportioned between the several counties of the State in proportion to the number of miles of designated state highways therein; the remaining twenty-five per centum shall be apportioned by the State Treasurer between the several counties of the State on July 15th and quarterly thereafter, and paid to the respective county treasurers for the improvement of county roads, the apportionment between the counties to be on the basis of the ratio that the total number of automobile and truck licenses issued within the county as of June 15th of each year, bears to the total number of automobile licenses issued within the State; and said county treasurer, on July 15th, and quarterly thereafter, shall divide twenty-five per centum of said twenty-five per centum so received, among the chartered or incorporated cities and towns in their respective counties in proportion to their assessed valuations; provided, however, that no municipality shall receive a larger proportion of such funds than its assessed valuation bears to the total assessed valuation of the county; and provided further, that seventy-five per centum of all refunds or other expense paid by the State Treasurer, according to law, shall be charged to the State Highway Fund, and twenty-five per centum to the fund to be apportioned among the counties."

And now, to show my appreciation for your loyalty I am going to ask the page to pass these little old things around and see that every member gets one.

Senator Myers, thereupon, on behalf of the Senate, presented to Vice President Rosier a present to show the good-will of the members to him in the following well chosen words:

As I said this afternoon, I have always felt that there was a bond of sympathy between Carbon County and Uinta County. You have the penitentiary and I have the insane asylum. We have carried the odium of these institutions on our backs for years. We have fought for their appropriations and we have gone clear down the line, and every time anyone reached Rawlins or Evanston, they mentioned those institutions, and I think that because of this, they forget the splendid citizens that come from both counties. Sirs:

Your Conference Committee on House Bill No. 159 beg leave to report and recommend as follows:

That both the Senate and the House recede from their amendments to Section 5, of the printed bill and that the following be substituted therefor:

Section 5. Seventy-five per centum of all funds received by the State Treasurer from the gasoline license tax provided for in this Act shall be placed to the credit of the State Highway Fund for maintenance, improvement and asphalt oil surfacing for State Highways and shall be apportioned between the several counties of the State in proportion to the number of miles of designated state highways therein. The remaining twenty-five per centum shall be apportioned by the State Treasurer between the several counties of the State, thirty per centum in the ratio which the area of the county bears to the total area of the State, excepting areas included in National Parks; thirty per centum in the ratio which the rural population of the county bears to the total rural population of the State according to the last available State or Federal census, and forty per centum in the ratio which the assessed valuation of the county bears to the latest total assessed valuation of the State, and on July 15th, and quarterly thereafter he shall pay same to the respective county treasurers who shall credit the same to the county road fund; provided that seventy-five per centum of all refunds or other expense paid by the State Treasurer according to law, shall be charged to the State Highway Fund, and twenty-five per centum to the fund to be apportioned among the counties.

Closing Remarks of Governor

Mr. President and
Members of the Senate.

This is not the time for any extended remarks upon my part and I am sure that brevity will be appreciated above all things. What has been done is done, and anything that has been left undone cannot now be remedied.

I have enjoyed this session of the Legislature although it has afforded a most busy season for me. There have been times of stress for all of us, times of success for some of the things we have personally fostered, and again times of disappointment when matters in which we have evidenced particular interest have not had decision according to our individual ideas. You will no doubt realize that to me the failure of the Senate to approve of the plan proposed for expansion of our state highway program, whereby the State would be authorized to construct additional roads, has been a matter of much disappointment. I continue in the belief that the general welfare of the State would have been served by the adoption of the plan as suggested in my message to you at the opening of this session. Upon the other hand, my suggestions as to secondary highways have been carried out in one important feature through the allocation to the counties of the additional one cent in the gasoline sales tax. Other proposals upon my part have also had favorable consideration. However these particular matters may be, I feel that upon the whole this Legislature has enacted into law many constructive measures and your labors have been of good avail.

As the session closes it is evident that general good will prevails despite any strong differences of opinion that have been brought out during the prescribed forty days. This is as it should be and you can depart to your several homes in the thought that the Twentieth State

Legislature adjourns after a successful meeting. My hearty good wishes are extended to all of you. Good-by.

My Dear Mr. Clark:

I transmit to you herewith, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 31, Senate, Twentieth Legislature of the State of Wyoming (Original Senate File No. 31), entitled "An Act authorizing the Use of the Highways of this State by non-resident Motorists, and Providing that the Use of such Highways by Non-resident Motorists constitutes Appointment by said Non-resident Motorists of the Secretary of State as his Agent upon whom Service of Process may be made in any Action against him growing out of the Use of said Highways and Providing for notice to said Non-resident Motorists of the Filing Process with the Secretary of State."

This measure fails of my approval by reason of the fact that it would cause the State to lose revenue of a considerable amount by exempting from registration motor vehicles and trailers owned by non-residents, regardless of the extent of time over which such vehicles are operated upon the highways of this state. Under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 139, Session Laws of Wyoming, 1925, motor vehicles or trailers owned by non-residents are exempt from registration and fee payment only if they remain in the state for a period of less than ninety days in a calendar year. Such motor vehicles and trailers are subject to registration and fee payment if they remain in the state for a longer period. It is further provided by the same statute that the non-resident provision shall not apply to a motor vehicle, the owner or operator of which shall operate the same for the purpose of gain or profit to himself or to others.

The State has annually received during recent years a revenue of about \$3,000.00 per year for registration and fee payment from motor vehicles and trailers owned by non-residents. It seems entirely reasonable that motor vehicles and trailers remaining in the state for a period of more than ninety days should pay a registration fee. While it is recognized that the other provisions of the said Enrolled Act No. 31 are in themselves desirable as providing process of service upon non-resident motorists, the advantage to be gained by its provisions would not seem to warrant the loss of revenue that would be entailed if the Act were placed into effect and thereby entirely exempt from registration and fee payment all motor vehicles and trailers owned by non-residents. I therefore find myself unable to give approval to the said Enrolled Act No. 31 of the Senate.

Examination of the said statute reveals that the same refers to the requirement of bond upon the part of persons, firms, and corporations engaged principally in the business of the collection of accounts and no reference is had to collateral security such as is evidently contemplated by the said Enrolled Act No. 21 under consideration. The Act therefore appears to be of no effect and approval of same is therefore denied.

My Dear Mr. Clark:

I am transmitting to you herewith, with my approval endorsed thereon, Enrolled Act No. 24, Senate, Twentieth Legislature of the State of Wyoming, (Original Senate File No. 79), entitled "An Act to provide for the creation, care, and dispensation of certain grants, gifts and devises that have been made to the State of Wyoming by the late John E. Higgins."

This Act provides for a foundation in honor of the late John E. Higgins of Glenrock, Wyoming, to be designated as the Higgins Memorial Foundation. The foundation is to be financed through income from the bequest of the said John E. Higgins to the State of Wyoming. The foundation is declared to be established for the following purposes: "For purposes of investigation and research in fields and problems effecting the welfare of the State of Wyoming,

including agriculture, material resources, social, economic and educational problems. For aid and improvement of public education, including elementary, secondary, collegiate and adult education and aid to students."

I am writing this special message in relation to this Act by reason of two important questions which relate thereto. The first refers to the uses to which the monies which may accrue from the said bequest of the said John E. Higgins can be put in accordance with the terms of the Constitution of the State of Wyoming. From Article 7, Sections 2 and 3 of the Constitution, it may be deduced that any income from the said Higgins bequest would need to go into the common school fund. However, this is a question that I am content to let the courts pass upon and my approval is given to the Act in the thought that the question will be properly submitted to the courts for decision before any funds that might accrue under the provisions of this bill are used for the purposes proposed. The second important question which comes to my mind is that of the use of the funds that may be provided under the provisions of this Act in a way that would be to the advantage of the state and its people. The purposes intended will be noted as very broad in character. It may be that the Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming, in whom the administration of the foundation is placed, would be able to devise a definite and practical plan for the use of the funds that may become available. However, it may prove advisable to allow a future session of the Legislature to enact a law giving more definition to the particular purposes to which the funds accruing to the proposed foundation may apply.

Although I have deemed it proper to make these observations in relation to the said Enrolled Act No. 24, Senate, the Act is having my approval, as stated.
