

Board approves State Library budget cuts

When the State Library, Archives, Museums, and Historical Board members met in Cheyenne recently, they approved the proposed budget for the next biennium.

The budget is 14.29 percent less than what was appropriated for the current biennium.

A 6.29 percent reduction was made at the end of Gov. Herschler's term and another one percent reduction was made by Gov. Sullivan when he took office. He has since asked for another seven percent for the next biennium.

In discussing the upcoming budget Johnson said, "Luckily we didn't have to cut a program and we will have to if there are any further cuts. Each program we offer has a special clientele or it would have ceased to exist and when we start cutting those programs we are bound to have some unhappy librarians."

Cuts were made in the areas of equipment repair, telephone and postage, dues and memberships, in-state travel, printing and the book budget. Johnson also noted the State Library has three fewer full time positions this biennium. That means the agency is experiencing a 10 percent cut instead of the five percent requested by the governor.

Wayne Johnson also said the Library returned \$7.5 million which had been appropriated for a new building along with \$400,000 for architects' fees.

Library Services and Construction Act grants to public libraries will be continued.

Johnson requested that the Board restore the Title I funds of \$46,000 to the budget although he had been considering eliminating them.

In related action the SLAMH board moved that \$20,000 be set aside to augment county library systems' book budgets. These funds would be distributed in amounts according to the board's discretion.

The Board also approved a motion to recommend to the State Library Advisory Council that the grant priorities be reconsidered in light

of the economic hardships the state is experiencing and the priorities move toward providing services to the consumers.

Board members also approved the concept of providing American Library Association accredited courses in Wyoming. Corky Walters will provide a timetable at the next meeting for their consideration.

WSL circulation goes online

On September 1 the State Library began circulating all of its materials on the automated circulation system.

For several months
the large print book
collection had been
circulating via the
system and other components have been in
use. Electronic mail
and interlibrary loan
have been handled through
the system previously.

The State Library joined Platte County, Laramie County, Laramie County Community College and Casper College libraries for online circulation.

The Laramie County Community College Library has some materials to give any library that can use them. Recipient library must agree to pay postage or shipping costs. Materials are: National Union Catalog 1958-61; 1963-66; 1968-71; 1972-82; Cumulative Index to Nursing and Allied Health 1979-86; Applied Science and Technology Index 1958-1977; New York Times Index 1973-79.

Linda Hollingsworth is the new library technician for serials and interlibrary loan. Linda has been at the library on a temporary, part-time basis for the past year. She previously worked at the Wyoming State Library and the Laramie County Library. Kathy Darcy resigned from the LCCC staff in July. She accepted a position as librarian at Donnelly College in Kansas City, Kan.

William C. Edwards, biology instructor at LCCC, has prepared a slide program featuring selected species of wildlife with captions and background information. The 50 wildlife slides are aimed at the elementary school level and maybe be expanded to the junior and senior high level.
