FIRST DAY.

Hall of the House of Representatives,
Cheyenne, Wyoming, January 12, 1915.

At the hour of 12 o'clock noon, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of January, A. D. 1915, being the hour and day designated by the Constitution of the State of Wyoming for the assembling of the Legislature in regular biennial session, the members-elect of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Wyoming assembled in the Hall of the House in the Capitol, at Cheyenne, the seat of the State Government, and were called to order by Honorable Frank L. Houx, Secretary of State, who thereupon requested the Rev. George Van Winkle to deliver an invocation.

On motion of Mr. Crain, duly seconded, Mr. Charles D. Oviatt of Albany County was, by acclamation, elected Temporary Speaker, and Mrs. Wood and Mr. Graham were appointed a committee to escort Mr. Oviatt to the chair.

The Honorable Secretary of State then introduced Mr. Oviatt as Temporary Speaker, who thanked the members of the House for the honor conferred upon him.

On motion of Mr. Beck, Mr. James O. Marts of Weston County was unanimously chosen Temporary Chief Clerk, and was by Messrs. Allred and Johnstone escorted to the Clerk's desk.

On motion of Mr. Graham, duly made and unanimously carried, the roll of names as certified to by the Secretary of State as members of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth State Legislature, was adopted as the permanent and Official Roll of the House.

On motion of Mr. MacKay, the Temporary Speaker appointed Messrs. Beatty and Kimball a committee to wait upon the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and request his presence in the House of Representatives to administer the oath of office to the members-elect.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, Mr. McCoy of Natrona County was appointed Temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

The committee heretofore appointed to secure the attendance of the Chief Justice returned with the Honorable Charles N. Potter, who duly administered the oath of office as set forth in the Constitution of the State of Wyoming, and prescribed by law, to the following named members-elect of the House, each of whom subscribed his name thereto:

Whereupon the Chief Justice announced that the members-elect above named had duly qualified in the manner required by law as members of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth State Legislature of the State of Wyoming.

The Chair then declared the election of permanent officers of the House to be the next business in order.

Mr. Kimball thereupon placed in nomination for Speaker of the House, the Honorable James M. Graham of Fremont County, which nomination was seconded by Mr. McNally of Sheridan County.

There being no further nominations, on motion of Mr. Kimball, duly seconded by Mr. Hench, the Temporary Chief Clerk was instructed to cast the vote of the House for Mr. Graham as Speaker, which motion prevailed, and Mr. Graham was declared the unanimous choice of the House for said office.

The Temporary Speaker thereupon appointed Messrs. Hadsell of Carbon County and McNally of Sheridan County to escort the Speaker-elect to the platform.

The Temporary Speaker then presented Mr. Graham as Speaker-elect of the House of Representatives.

Mr. Graham addressed the House, thanking the members for the honor conferred upon him, requesting for himself the hearty support of the members during the session, and promising impartiality as presiding officer.

On motion, Messrs. Crain of Laramie County and Carter of Uinta County were appointed a committee to again request the presence of the Chief Justice, to administer the oath of office to the Speaker-elect, and upon his arrival the said oath, as required by the Constitution and law, was duly administered.

Mr. Beatty thereupon nominated Mr. B. F. Yoder of Laramie County for Speaker pro tempore, which nomination was duly seconded by Mr. Oviatt on behalf of the members of Albany County.

Whereupon Mr. Jones moved that nominations therefor be closed and the Temporary Chief Clerk be instructed to cast the vote of the House for Mr. Yoder as Speaker pro tem of the House, which motion prevailed, and Mr. Yoder was then declared the unanimous choice of the House for said office.

The Honorable Charles N. Potter, Chief Justice, being present, thereupon administered to Mr. Yoder, as Speaker pro tempore, the oath of office prescribed by law.

Mr. Yoder then addressed the House, thanking the members thereof for the honor conferred and assuring them of his appreciation therefor.

Addressing the minority members of the House, Mr. Oviatt stated that the persons to be named as officers of the House for the present session had been carefully selected with regard only to their efficiency and an equitable distribution among the several counties of the State, and then moved the election of the following named persons as such officers:

Mr. Marts moved that the Senate be notified that the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Wyoming is duly organized and ready for business. The motion was carried and the Speaker instructed the Chief Clerk to so notify the Honorable Senate.

Mr. Oviatt moved that the Speaker appoint a committee of three to act with a like committee of the Senate to notify the Governor that the Thirteenth State Legislature is duly organized and ready to receive any communication he desires to submit. The motion was carried and the Speaker thereupon appointed Mrs. Wood, Mr. Oviatt and Mr. Delfelder as such committee.

The Speaker declared a recess of fifteen minutes.

Mr. Speaker announced that a like committee had already been appointed, and therefore the House Committee might now retire.

Recess was declared, pending the report of the committee.

The House reconvened and the Chairman of the Special Committee mentioned above reported that the Committee was unable to reach the Governor, but by appointment with his Private Secretary the Committee would meet his Excellency, the Governor, at 1:30 p. m. today.

The House stood in recess until 2 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House reconvened at the hour of 2 o'clock p. m., the Speaker presiding.

The Special Committee of the House appointed to wait upon the Governor reported that they had performed the duty required of them, and that His Excellency, the Governor, would be pleased to meet with the House and Senate in Joint Session at the hour of 2:30 p. m. today.

His Excellency, Governor John B. Kendrick, being introduced by the Honorable President of the Senate, thereupon delivered the following message:

**MESSAGE OF JOHN B. KENDRICK, GOVERNOR OF WYOMING, TO
THE THIRTEENTH STATE LEGISLATURE, 1915.**

Members of the Senate and House of Representatives:

Observing the requirements of the Constitution that the Governor shall communicate with the Legislature by message, making such observations as to the condition of the state, its departments and institutions, and such recommendations as may seem advisable, I wish to not only call your attention to the official reports of the various departments, made to my predecessor in office, but to direct your careful consideration to legislation which, it seems to me, is of the greatest importance to our state at this time.

We are, in point of years, one of the youngest states in the Union. While in some ways this may seem a handicap, yet we are fortunate in thus having the opportunity to profit by the mistakes or successes of our sister states. We are enabled to view with a studious eye and an open mind, the effects of advanced legislation on the social and material problems that have arisen, and which may, in a great many instances be paralleled within our borders. We are, moreover, permitted the opportunity of comparing conditions, of rejecting such legislation as may not be consistent with our needs, or again of adopting, with more or less modification, other forms which may help in the safeguarding of our people and the development of their interests, insuring to them full rights and privileges. It is with this thought and this satisfaction, that I come to you today with my recommendations.

My information of the condition of our various state departments and the institutions under their control, must necessarily come from a hurried examination of these reports. Therefore, I do not find myself as well prepared to offer suggestions and recommendations as would have been the case had I been permitted to come in personal contact with the management of the several departments. However, I feel justified in congratulating you, and through you, as their representatives, the people of the state, upon the very satisfactory condition of the state's affairs in its various departments and the institutions under their supervision. I invite your careful study and earnest consideration of these reports and the recommendations contained therein.

Appropriations

In making appropriations of funds which must be drawn from the taxpayers of the state, we must not be unmindful of the fact that but a very limited portion of our lands has passed to private ownership from the federal government, and as such, are subject to taxation. Therefore our basis of taxable value is greatly restricted as compared to the vast area over which we are compelled to administer state government. Because of this fact, our rate of taxation is already more or less excessive.

We are a young state, and thousands of our people have but recently located among us, and have not yet well established themselves, in a financial way, to meet extraordinary burdens of taxation. They cannot hope to secure satisfactory financial returns until they have succeeded in reaching a certain period in the development of their farms or ranches, and during such period, they are compelled to practice the self-denial of pioneers. Consequently, any excess taxes upon them would be grievous injustice. In view of these facts, I am unwilling to believe that you would sanction either extravagant or ill-considered appropriation of the state's funds.

And yet the first requisite of a state department is good service; therefore sufficient appropriations should be made to insure this result,

under a strictly business and economical management. We should bear in mind the actual needs of the establishments under their control rather than the benefits to accrue to the localities in which they may be situated; and in reaching conclusions as to the amount of the appropriations required for each, the information to be obtained from the members of the boards having supervision and management thereof, is unquestionably more dependable than that coming from those not connected with the institution, but interested in its development for local or personal advantages only.

While I cannot discuss in detail these various reports, yet I desire to refer to some of them in particular.

State University.

From the report of the President of the Board of Trustees of the State University at Laramie and from general expressions voicing the sentiment of our people, the state is to be congratulated upon the progress made in the physical improvement and educational development; reflecting great credit upon its management. The increased confidence manifested by the people of the state in this, its chief educational plant, is very gratifying indeed. The report indicates the needs of the university, which should have your earnest consideration.

State Penitentiary.

The report of the warden of the state penitentiary indicates the satisfactory condition of that institution. I had the privilege recently of inspecting this place and the improvements constructed during the past year, and I was impressed, on that occasion, by the urgent need of additional improvements, which would include a dining room and kitchen; and in furtherance of such a plan, I recommend that you authorize for this purpose, the employment of such needed part of the unused portion of funds heretofore set aside for the improvement of the penitentiary, amounting, according to the report of the warden, to a substantial sum.

This report compels the conviction that the employment of the inmates of the penitentiary on our public highways has been an economical success and very beneficial to those so employed. I recommend the continuation of this plan and its extension in so far as consistent with the purposes of the institution and practical with the needs of the different counties of the state.

In confining men in the penitentiary, the state assumes a certain responsibility which should not be shirked. They must be kept healthy, in both mind and body. The necessity of keeping them employed is apparent to all. Such employment should not only be practical but educational—practical in a sense that the returns from their labor might prove a partial recompense to the state; and educational with a view to providing them with a trade and developing in them skill and knowledge that will enable them, at the expiration of their term of confinement, to earn an honest living. With this object in view, I recommend that you authorize the initiation of a fixed industrial plan that will furnish healthy employment to those confined. However restricted such a plan may be at the start, it should be formulated with the design of its enlargement or extension in the future, with a view to providing these men with instructive employment in accordance with the natural ability of each and conducive to their physical and moral development. Such a law should include a provision for a merit system, under which, at least a portion of the earnings of each individual shall accrue to the benefit of either himself or those dependent upon him.

Industrial Institute.

The Eleventh Legislature provided for the construction of an Industrial Institute for the care of juvenile offenders whose immature years rendered their confinement in our state penitentiary unwise and inhumane. The Twelfth Legislature provided for a tax levy for the construction of such an institute at Worland, and the main building is now practically completed. However, before the establishment is put into actual operation, it will be necessary to provide for the additional expense of properly furnishing the building now completed, and for the construction and equipment of outbuildings, particularly those needed for stabling and sheltering the live stock to be kept on the place. Since the inmates of this institution will naturally be limited in number at the contest, it would seem to me to be consistent that our outlay at this time be moderate and that it cover only such items as are imperative for the practical operation of the place. Subsequent growth of the institution may be met with further expenditures when the demand arises. In the course of a few years, under careful and conscientious management, this Industrial Farm, with its broad and fertile acres, should not only become self-sustaining, but what is more important, should prepare the inmates for worthy places among their fellow men after their term of probation.

Assessing and Equalizing Taxes.

Equality of taxation is a necessary principle of fair and impartial government. However heavy the burden may rest, the taxpayer is patient if he feels that he is but paying his just proportion. He only is grieved when he is compelled to pay more than his share. He then smarts under the stings of personal injury and real injustice.

Some of our counties have reduced their assessments and others have maintained theirs at what they should be, making the burden inequitable and unjust. It is quite patent, therefore, that there should be legislative enactment which will bring about an equalization of schedules among the counties, and a consequent uniformity of valuation on all classes of property throughout the state.

It is universally admitted that the expense of county government in our state is at present unwarranted, and the taxes collected in the different counties are proving burdensome on the people. I believe that steps should be taken and legislation provided for the correction of this condition. Because of these facts I would earnestly invite your attention to this situation, and would recommend that you enact legislation which will bring improvement along the lines so successfully employed in other states, notably Kansas.

Workman's Compensation Law.

At the last general election, an amendment to our constitution was carried by a majority vote of the electors of the state, providing for the enactment of legislation for a workman's compensation act. The vote on this amendment was duly canvassed and the proper proclamation of its adoption was made by my predecessor, Governor Carey. An amendment to the constitution is a direct mandate from the people, and it is therefore an obligation to be assumed by the legislature at its earliest opportunity.

I would recommend in framing such a law, that due care be exercised to fulfill every function contemplated, that every provision be included to render a just compensation to the injured, or, in case of death, to those dependent upon him. But, at the same time, such a law

should be calculated to avoid so far as possible, the working of a hardship on the industry that pays the tax.

I would recommend further, the incorporation of provisions which would result in an adjustment of claims by the injured or his family, speedily and with the extreme minimum of cost. In providing a tribunal for the settling of such claims, I am inclined to the belief that our district court judiciary might be utilized to great advantage, and with full justice, not only to the employee but to the employer. Such a provision is embraced in the compensation law in New Jersey, and is said to be very satisfactory.

Public Utilities Commission.

It is generally admitted that there will always be differences arising between public utility corporations and their patrons, and in view of this, advanced government is providing public utilities commissions to arbitrate between the two. The need of such a commission in Wyoming is quite apparent, and since such a commission is urged by all of our political parties, the demand may be said to be universal, and the legislature's responsibility is clear and conclusive.

An inexpensive adjustment of differences is the plain intent of such a law, and it should be passed with a view, not alone to safeguard the interests of the patrons, but the corporations as well. We must bear in mind that no greater injury could be done to the industrial life of our state at this time, than to enact a law that might be used in a spirit of hostility against the corporations.

The form of commission best adapted to the specific needs of Wyoming at her present stage of development is quite clear in my mind. I am aware that many of our sister states, in creating these commissions, have provided for salaried commissioners, either elective or appointive. But these states have much more public service business originating and terminating within their borders. The principal work of a commission of this nature is with the railroads, and is confined to intrastate traffic, both passenger and freight. Since such traffic is comparatively light in our state, it is my conviction that an expensive commission would be extremely inadvisable.

I would recommend therefore, the creation of a commission to be composed of three of the elective state officers, such commission to be provided with a salaried secretary or rate expert, whose duty would be to provide full information for the use of the commission; who would be competent to make adequate investigations and recommendations to the commission and would be able to initiate, with the approval of the commission, work of original inquiry. While this secretary should have unquestioned ability and integrity, he should not have a vote on the board.

In recommending a commission of this kind, I am not only mindful of economy but I am seeking to provide a tribunal whose personnel would be a thorough guarantee of efficiency and integrity.

Farm Loans.

The pressing need of the people who are developing our lands and building homes thereon, is for capital, secured for a long time, and at a reasonable rate of interest.

We have in our permanent state fund, uninvested, at present, \$341,980.00, and with the increase in land sales, this fund will be greatly augmented. Under present restrictions, these funds may only be employed in the purchase of certain kinds of bonds or deposited in banks at a very nominal rate of interest.

First class farm loans constitute one of the most reliable basis of security. There seems to be no reason why we should not, by legislative enactment, follow the precedent of other states, and provide a way through which these funds might be loaned on Wyoming agricultural lands of unquestioned value, and thus provide for the state a more satisfactory rate of interest, at the same time lending encouragement to the farmer and ranchman in the development of the land, and the founding of his home. Our agricultural enterprises are today in their infancy, and have not yet reached that period of development calculated to attract outside capital. We can partially bridge this lack of confidence by opening our permanent fund in this manner, and can thus demonstrate our faith in our own securities. Such action, I believe, might be taken under a plan that would provide ample security for our funds and at the same time greatly stimulate the development of our agricultural resources.

But in making this recommendation, I want to deeply and earnestly impress you with the admonition, that, as guardians of this heritage of future generations, it is imperative that we safeguard it with every precaution necessary to insure its integrity.

Experimental Farms.

Agriculture has become one of our leading industries, and in conjunction with stock-growing, is most important in the settlement and development of the state.

Soil and climatic conditions in Wyoming are very different from those in the sections from which most of our new settlers come. In fact, these conditions vary in different parts of the state itself. Thus, I deem it very important that the state provide and maintain an up-to-date system of experimental farms, under the direction of scientific agriculture experts.

It is a critical time with the dry farmers of Wyoming. If the men in this field in Kansas and Nebraska had been given the benefit of the scientific knowledge of today, they would have been spared much great hardship and discouragement. We, therefore, owe it to these agricultural pioneers in Wyoming, to see, so far as it is possible, that they are given the opportunity to apply to their work, the best advanced knowledge of the day.

We should have experimental farms available to our new settlers in different sections of the state, demonstrating the crops and method of culture, both with irrigation and without it, which are best adapted to their respective locations. These farms could also be managed so as to be convenient sources from which farmers may secure pure and approved varieties of seed.

The Wyoming State Farm Board has been working with five such farms, most of which, I am advised, have been doing valuable work in their several localities. There are one or two other sections of the state, remote from the above mentioned farms, that would be greatly aided by experimental stations.

I would therefore recommend, that you make appropriation for the maintenance of these experimental farms, and for the general promotion of agriculture throughout the state.

Conservation of Waters.

Under the conditions of her enabling act, Wyoming was given the full and exclusive use of the waters of the streams within her borders.

We are, however, confronted at this time by the extreme danger which arises from the application of the rights of priority of appropria-

tion of our waters after they have crossed into the neighboring states. Where such claims become effective, the use of the waters thus appropriated may forever be denied to us, and we who are higher up on the streams sustain an irreparable injury, without the users lower down receiving any increased benefits. In other words, those lower down on the streams are being permitted to take away something of immense value to us without adding to their own interests.

On the other hand, if we are permitted to employ the waters in irrigation near their source, we provide an increased capacity for storage during the season of greatest need, and the waters thus retained find their way by seepage back to the streams, thus serving to keep the volume at nearer the normal and at a more uniform flow.

Because of the lack of cheap capital, a very small area of the lands within our state, capable of irrigation, have been reclaimed. It is also true that the enterprise of this character that was impossible yesterday, easily becomes a reality today. Under ordinary conditions and without our interference, this would work itself out. Money would be available and the industry and enterprise of our people would finally result in the reclamation of all of our available lands.

We are even now threatened with irreparable losses along the lines indicated, and we should not by apparent neglect or indifference, invite further disaster along this line. Therefore we should authorize by legislation, the making of trial or experimental surveys, indicating all of our tracts or units of land that might be irrigated under such lines, at the same time defining the lines of the canals to be employed in such irrigation. We should provide further that the lines of such surveys and canals, when made, must be filed in the state engineer's office, and that he be instructed, when such filings are made, to at once appropriate for reclamation purposes, any of the unappropriated waters of such streams or lakes as shall be required for the use of these lands.

Such legislation should contain the further provision, that whenever these different enterprises are taken up by either individuals or corporations the latter should be required to refund to the state, every dollar of expense incurred in making preliminary surveys and the records of such appropriations, in connection with the unit or tract in which they are interested.

I earnestly recommend such legislation, together with the necessary appropriation to make such a law operative and to carry out its provisions.

Immigration.

Wyoming is today, of all the states in the Union, the greatest land of opportunities. It is the one state capable of supporting a large population, that is without that population. A vast area is unpeopled, largely because of lack of knowledge of the possibilities and conditions that obtain. In order to correct this state of affairs, thereby attracting capital to our undeveloped resources, and new citizens to our vacant lands, general and accurate knowledge of what we have to offer, should be spread broadcast.

An influx of new settlers would proportionately decrease the burdens we now have to bear, and new capital would quickly put us in our rightful place among the wealth producing states of the nation.

General knowledge of the state must be given wide publicity, and this is the duty of the state itself, and if it is thoroughly and conscientiously done, within a few years our population and wealth will be doubled.

I would earnestly recommend that you make an appropriation sufficient to carry on such work in an economical way under the direction of our Board of Immigration.

"Blue Sky" Law.

In a new and growing state, it is necessary to obtain outside capital to build up industrial enterprises and develop our great natural resources. To do this, every possible protection should be afforded the investor against fraudulent schemes. Other states have attempted to afford this protection through the enactment of so-called "Blue-Sky" laws, which have been held unconstitutional. I believe the desired result can be obtained through an amendment to our incorporation laws that would provide a more strict supervision over corporations organized in this state, and those foreign corporations seeking to do business with our people.

With the desire then, to protect our state against unworthy concerns whose sole assets are highly colored stock certificates or bonds, I would recommend the enactment of a law authorizing the Secretary of State to require corporations desiring to transact business within our state, to file verified statements of assets and liabilities, and to authorize the state bank examiner to make an examination of their financial condition. On such examination the examiner should file with the Secretary of State a detailed report showing all properties and liabilities of such corporations. In this way, prospective investors in securities of such corporations, can obtain official and reliable information of the financial condition of such company before investing their money. Such a law would not seriously handicap any legitimate promoter and would afford genuine protection to investors, at home and abroad. Further, it would lead to increased confidence, particularly on the part of those people from outside our state lines who are now compelled to rely on the representations of agents, rather than on official or personal knowledge.

Suspension of County Officers.

The Governor of this State is held responsible under the constitution for the faithful execution of the laws and the maintenance of peace. His duties along these lines are mandatory and he may go so far as to call on the state militia if he deems it necessary.

The constitution also provides that "all officers not liable to impeachment shall be subject to removal for misconduct or malfeasance in office in such manner as may be provided by law."

At present, there is no law in Wyoming which gives to the Governor the power to remove or suspend a county officer, under any conditions.

There may come a time, in almost any section of the state, when it is necessary to supersede the authority of the constituted county officers, as in time of riot or other breach of peace, or any instance when the county officers are unable or unwilling to enforce the laws, or to maintain order. Under such conditions, it may be necessary for the Governor to resort to the most drastic force at his command in order to compel obedience and maintain the dignity of the law.

With lack of summary authority on the part of the Governor, over county officers, difficulties might arise through conflict of authority between the militia and local officers, and a bad condition might be rendered most deplorable.

It is inconceivable that the chief executive would interfere in sectional matters when there is no occasion, yet the presence of such a law on our statute books would be a compelling moral force. If the offending officer knew that authority was vested in the Governor to suspend him for

inability or neglect of duty, occasions for the exercise of that duty on the part of the Governor, would be rare.

It would seem, therefore, that a law should be enacted which would give the chief executive of the state power to remove or suspend county officers as he may find it necessary in upholding the law and thus remove any possibility of conflict in peace-keeping authority whenever the exigencies arise. Provision should be made, however, that such suspended officer be given a speedy and just hearing before the courts.

I would earnestly recommend the enactment of a law along these definite lines.

Remedial Legislation for Women.

The first state legislature that recognized the political rights of women, was the initial legislature of the territory of Wyoming. In 1869 an act was passed giving to women the right of suffrage and to hold office. This principal of equal political rights, which was our contribution to the science of government, has since been wisely and widely recognized in states whose jurisdiction now extends over more than one-third of the territorial extent of our country.

But I feel it my duty to call your attention to the humiliating fact that our laws have lagged behind the laws of our sister states in the adoption of remedial legislation giving woman control over the custody of her children, and those rights of property which must lie at the basis of every true American home. We took from her the right of dower and gave her nothing in return. We have given her no custody over her own children, no matter how tender their age might be, as against her husband, no matter how worthless. Her homestead exemption not only falls below the amount awarded in all states which join our borders, but it is uncertain and indefinite.

I am told by lawyers that the rights of a married woman as to her individual contracts is not beyond all question. And finally when death dissolves the marriage relation, it is within the power of a husband to will away from his wife, practically everything except the beggarly allowances which are exempt from creditors. Colorado, Montana, Idaho, Utah and Nebraska all provide dower rights for the wife, and a much larger homestead exemption.

From these existing facts, I am sincerely convinced that through our legislature, we should at once take the necessary steps to place our state abreast others with the best and safest legislation in this direction which has stood the test of experience elsewhere. I would recommend the enactment of legislation which will place the mother on a par with the father as to the right of custody of her minor children; that a married woman be given the unquestioned right to make contracts, as if she were single; that the homestead exemption be increased; that neither husband nor wife shall have the power to will away more than half the property possessed at the time of death without the written consent of the other. The necessity of providing such legislation as I have here suggested, insuring to woman her just rights under the law, and giving to her the equitable standing to which she is fully entitled, will no doubt be quite apparent to you without further comment.

The Game Laws.

The splendid wild life of Wyoming, embracing as it does great numbers and many species of game birds and animals and the fish which fill our streams and lakes, constitute the most unique, the most characteristic, as well as one of the most valuable of her assets. It behooves us at this time to surround this resource with every safeguard necessary to

secure its protection, not only as a benefit to the people of today, for the pleasure of the sport, and its utility as a food supply, but for the equally important necessity of perpetuating the different species for the benefit and enjoyment of coming generations.

I would, in view of this, bespeak thoughtful consideration for the report of the State Game Warden, especially those recommendations providing for necessary changes in existing laws, as they refer to licenses and license fees, and the needs of a readjustment of the present outlines of the game reserves. I would also suggest some attention to the requirement for authorized guides to furnish bonds. There are many changes and revisions of our present laws which might very properly be made, and our state and its people would be the gainer thereby.

Primary Election Law.

I want to make a brief allusion to our direct primary law as it is at present constituted. In general effect, this law is most excellent. But it seems to me that the method by which the aspirant secures a place on the ballot is somewhat cumbersome, and tends to defeat the aims for which the law was created. Other states have a much simpler and more direct method, and it occurs to me that we might well profit by them. This is but one of several features which might be improved, and I recommend a careful scrutiny of the existing law with a view to eliminating some of the objectionable features.

Extension of the Capitol Building.

Governor Carey said in his last biennial message: "The question of obtaining sufficient room to do the work that is required under the direction of the state officers, has become a serious one. Every portion of the capitol is now occupied. Some of the space used is not at all adapted for the work for which it has been assigned. Some rooms have been secured outside of the capitol, but this is not satisfactory, for the business done by the state should be concentrated."

The congested condition of the capitol building, as suggested by Governor Carey at that time as a serious and urgent need, has today become an absolute and imperative necessity, and it is extremely important that prompt measures should be taken to relieve this condition.

The State Departments.

I trust that in scrutinizing the reports of our department heads which are before you, you will observe the uniform excellence of the work accomplished along the different lines, and the very evident desire to improve and facilitate future service and benefits to the people as evidenced by the fact that many recommendations are made. While not all those suggestions may be practical, nor well considered, yet they indicate study and a laudable desire to improve each department along the lines indicated.

The report of our State Librarian contains an appeal for more room, for proper insurance protection, and other thoughtful recommendations.

Our State Land Commissioner calls attention to many needed amendments to existing land laws.

The Attorney General urges that an assistant be appointed for his office, a recommendation which should be carefully considered. He also makes other recommendations in his very excellent report.

The Adjutant General, nominal head of our state militia, makes recommendations which call for careful consideration. The State Board

of Health suggests advanced legislation now in effect in other states; our State Fish Commissioner deems it advisable that additional fish hatcheries be established; the State Geologist has valuable suggestions relating to field work and refers to the need of a method for curbing fraudulent oil and mining companies, a subject which I have already spoken of. Pertinent matters are also brought up by the Pure Food Commissioner, the State Engineer, the State Veterinarian and other state officials.

Particular attention should be paid to the recommendations of the State Auditor, who, among other things, asks for the passage of a uniform law relative to the capital stock of insurance companies, and that domestic and foreign companies be required to have a certain fixed capital stock; also to the report of the Secretary of State, who points out the necessity for remedial legislation for our corporation laws, an amendment to the primary law, the creation of a Bureau of Labor and Statistics and other vital matters. The Superintendent of Public Instruction has valuable suggestions for the betterment of our school laws, the increasing of county superintendents' salaries, uniformity of text books, etc. The State Treasurer thinks it advisable to amend the constitution so that our permanent school fund may enter a new avenue of investment, and has a suggestion as to the appropriation of contingent funds.

I would again commend all these various reports to your thoughtful consideration, and ask that you familiarize yourselves with them.

Necrology.

It is my painful duty to call your attention to the death of Verling K. Hart, Adjutant General of the State, which is, I believe, the only death among our state officers since the last meeting of the Legislature.

Captain Hart was essentially an army man, having been born and brought up in military posts, his father being an officer in the United States Army. Captain Hart was a graduate of West Point and served his country in many places, being retired finally because of ill health. He became identified with the Wyoming National Guard and succeeded to the office of Adjutant General. He was a man of splendid character, of attractive personality, and was held in high esteem by the men of the National Guard, and his wide circle of friends. The state and its military establishment suffered a grievous loss in his death.

The State of Wyoming suffered a distinct loss a few weeks ago in the death of Judge Gibson Clark, who passed away at his home after many years of activity in the affairs of the state. Judge Clark was a power for good in Wyoming. He was able as a jurist, of splendid worth as a citizen, and of the highest type as a man. A member at one time of our Supreme Court and, at the time of his death, a member of the University of Wyoming Board of Trustees, he was of distinct service to his fellow citizens, and his loyal devotion to his chosen state has left the indelible stamp of his rare personality for the rising generation.

Conclusion.

In conclusion, I want to suggest frankly to you, and without reservation of any sort, that co-operation be our common keynote throughout the sessions of this Thirteenth Legislature. I want to earnestly impress upon you, not only my willingness, but my anxiety, to work in thorough accord with you, holding in view the single purpose of securing genuine results. I shall deem it a privilege, in so far as it is possible, to render every aid I can, in harmonizing the natural differences which may arise,

so that we all may give to our state the very best service of which we are capable.

We should bear in mind at all times that, though we may have been chosen from different parts of the state and are in a sense the direct agents of separate communities, our duties and interests should be in no wise selfish or sectional. The moment we assume the obligations of legislators and governor, we become in a larger measure the representatives of all the people, and are in duty bound to give undivided and unprejudiced service to the entire state.

I am constrained further, to admonish you at this time, from the depths of my own experience, that the opportunity to render full service is not confined solely to the enactment of wise laws, but it is as much the duty of legislators to prevent unwise legislation. We had better have a few well considered laws than many ill-digested ones, which might not only be burdensome upon our statutes, but vicious in their application. Every measure should be considered upon its own merits, and should stand or fall upon the wisdom of its provisions and the benefits to accrue to the entire state.

The possibilities of growth and development in our state at present are unbounded. The vast areas of undeveloped and unoccupied lands, together with our great stores of well known and as yet unopened mineral wealth, afford us opportunities measured only by the strength of our faith and the limitations of our energy.

Inspired by such an outlook, let us apply ourselves with unusual diligence in securing needed legislation, bearing in mind that, under the circumstances, it is a great privilege in the lives of each of us to share in such state building.

I have suggested that you let your keynote be Co-operation. I now urge you to make your watchword Progress.

Upon the conclusion of the Governor's Message Honorable Patrick Sullivan, Senator from Natrona County, moved that a vote of thanks be extended by this Joint Body, to His Excellency, the Governor, for his masterly and eloquent address, which motion was carried unanimously.

Senator Holliday, of Albany County, moved that the Joint Session be now dissolved. Carried.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

House called to order at 2 o'clock p. m., Mr. Speaker presiding.

Mr. Oviatt announced that the Board of Trustees' invitation to the dedicatory exercises of the Agricultural Building of the University of Wyoming was intended to include the employees of the House.

Mr. Oviatt called for the reading of the report of the Adjutant General on the Speaker's desk, and the same being read, Mr. Oviatt moved that the report be incorporated in the Journal of the House, and the motion was carried.

Sir:—I have the honor to submit my annual report, and enclose the report of the Chief Quartermaster, and also the report of Lieutenant E. Z. Steever, U. S. A. Inspector Instructor, National Guard, Wyoming.

The report of the Adjutant General is made while en route through the State, for the purpose of giving instruction in drills and target practice.

This State has heretofore attempted to maintain a Regiment of Infantry. When it is taken into consideration that the whole United States maintained but about 120,000 militia, it can be readily seen that we are attempting to do much more than our share. The law requires that we must maintain not less than three hundred. Five hundred I think should be the maximum attempted. The rules of the War Department are becoming more stringent every year. Under a recent circular the minimum for a company is sixty-five men and three officers—an increase of seven. A Company of Militia should, with very few exceptions, be organized only in towns of two thousand or more inhabitants. A year ago a company was organized at Burns, Wyoming, and, as might be expected, was a failure from its creation.

I would recommend that Chapter 88, Session Laws, 1913, be amended as follows:

Section 1, by providing that the organization shall conform with the United States Militia Regulations.

Section 2, to conform to Chapter I.

Sections 4 and 5 should be repealed.

Section 22 should be amended so that the title would read "Quartermaster" instead of "Chief of the Quartermaster Corps."

Section 26 should be repealed and re-enacted to read: "Commanding Officers of Companies, Troops, Batteries or similar organizations, shall receive a compensation of \$100 per year, payable semi-annually, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Military Board."

It is thought that enough property would be saved under this system to more than make up for the expenditure.

Section 8 should be changed so that the title would read "Quartermaster."

Section 29 should be repealed. The Commander-in-Chief has ample authority under the present law to order inspections by officers detailed for that purpose.

Section 30 should be repealed.

I concur in the recommendation of the Chief Quartermaster, and of the Inspector Instructor regarding a store-house. The present store-house is undesirable for military purposes. It consists of some shacks

and a large residence containing about twenty small rooms, and could with the block of ground on which it stands be disposed of to good advantage. I would advise that it be turned over to some board or committee with the object of making suitable disposition of it.

Attention is invited to Paragraphs 5 and 6 of Circular 15, War Department, copy of which is hereto attached, which shows that the requirements of the War Department are becoming stricter from year to year.

Armories: I would recommend that the State provide for the erection of one or more Armories every two years, until a total of six are constructed.

Lockers: I would recommend a special appropriation to purchase Steel Lockers, recommended by the Chief Quartermaster. I attribute a great deal of the shortage of property that has occurred in the past to the lack of proper storage facilities.

I am reluctant to recommend an increase of appropriations for the support of Militia, nor do I favor the creation of any new offices. I believe with proper economy, such as a business man would use in his personal affairs, the Guard can be maintained during the next two years for the same amount as appropriated by the last Legislature (except the Lockers above referred to).

When I assumed charge of this office, June 1st, 1914, the Adjutant General's contingent expense available for the seven months ending December 1st, 1914, was \$274.86, instead of \$2,041.62.

There was due and remaining unpaid bills for transportation amounting to \$2,840.36.

This amount, with about \$2,200 paid for lost property, had to be deducted from the current federal appropriations.

On my written demand, the bonding company had for the first time in the history of the State agreed to pay for property lost by company commanderies on whose surety bonds they happened to be.

Heretofore it has been customary for the Adjutant General to loan the United States property to private parties. This is a strict violation of the law, and has and will be discouraged by the present Adjutant General. Perhaps sixty per cent of the \$10,000 shortage has been lost in this manner.

Subject: Biennial Report.

This report is made in accordance with Sections 22 and 29, Chapter 88, Laws of Wyoming, 1913. This office was created by the 1913 Legislature. Previous to that time, the duties had been performed by the Adjutant General as Acting Quartermaster General, etc.

PROPERTY.

Upon taking charge of the office March 1, 1913, I found the following conditions existed: The State of Wyoming was short over \$10,000 worth of U. S. Military property. This property was being carried on the annual returns of the Governor to the War Department, as actually on hand. I believe that our property was received about 1903. The loss of Government property has thus averaged about \$1,000 a year. This was caused by the ignorance and carelessness of the responsible officers, and also by the fact that no proper survey proceedings had been ren-

dered to cover the loss of property worn out in the service by fair wear and tear. In many cases, where the survey proceedings had been sent to the War Department and approved, the property had not been taken credit for on the Governor's annual return.

Another cause for this shortage is that the Adjutant General's office has usually been short of help, and the Adjutant General tried to perform the duties of two or three men. The present shortage of the State, I should say, is about \$6,000. Last year Colonel Hart, then Adjutant General, advertised in all the counties of the State for military property in unauthorized hands. A great many people turned in property in response to these advertisements. Company commanders over the State collected a great deal of the Government property, which was in the possession of unauthorized people, in their respective towns. Reports of survey were made up in the Adjutant General's office and forwarded to the War Department for approval. In this way about \$2,000 of the shortage has been made up. In September, this year, we paid for \$2,000 worth of property from our annual allotment from the Government for "Arms, Equipment, and Camp Purposes." About half of the \$6,000 shortage remaining, will have to be paid for by the State of Wyoming. The other half can in time, I believe, be recovered. This \$10,000 property shortage existing prior to Colonel Hart's administration, is all the worse when it is remembered that the State must pay twice for every article of Government property lost by the State Militia. In other words, when the Governor draws military property from the War Department on annual requisition, the value thereof is deducted from the State's allotment for "Arms, Equipment, and Camp Purposes," and unless it is returned to the proper officials, or accounted for in some authorized manner, the State must pay for it a second time, from State funds or from Government money allotted to the State.

There is no store-house in this State suitable to care for the large amount of Government property on hand, and up to the present time, there have been no armories for the companies, and no individual lockers for the arms, equipment, and clothing issued to the enlisted men. On every requisition signed by the Governor for Military property for the troops of the State, the Governor certifies "That the State has adequate and suitable facilities for the safe keeping and preservation of the property." The time has arrived when this certificate can no longer be truthfully signed by the Governor of this State. The buildings at present used as store-houses for the Militia have been used by the State as a State Deaf, Dumb, and Blind Asylum, and for other purposes. Some of the property is now being kept in sheds and barns that leak and are wholly unsuitable for the storage of military property, and other property is left out of doors, where it is soon ruined by the elements. The main building is sadly in need of repairs. The house should be painted and a heating system installed, which I am informed by experts would cost more than a thousand dollars. Scarcely any repairs have been made on the building since it was turned over to the Militia. A store-house for a regiment of Infantry of Militia must necessarily be larger than for a regiment of regular troops, because it is necessary to muster out companies once in a while, and in that case all of the property of the company of every kind and description must be stored at headquarters. I have the property of two companies now at the store-house, and more than half of it is outside, where it could be stolen, or in case of a bad storm, ruined. Many of the company armories are wholly inadequate for the storing of Government property. They are usually, however, the best building in the town where the company is located. For

this reason, it is necessary to give them a minimum amount of property and keep a maximum of the equipment in the state store-house.

I am informed by Captain Pearson, the Quartermaster at Fort Russell, that a suitable building to store the Government property for the Militia of this State would cost \$20,000. I have attached to this report a rough plan of such a building as approved by the War Department. The building should be erected on the railroad tracks at a convenient place. The difference in cost between the construction of the building with and without a basement under the entire building is shown. It is only a matter of a short time until the basement will be needed for the storage of machine guns and other new equipment required by the War Department to be on hand in the State, so I believe it will be in the interests of economy to construct the basement at once, if a large enough appropriation is available. If the ground cannot be obtained in Cheyenne, I believe the Government will let the State erect the building at a suitable place at Fort Russell. It might be better there, because the War Department has designated Fort Russell as a mobilization point for the troops of this State, and it will probably never be changed. Regardless of where the Capitol of the State is located, the store-house must necessarily always be at or near the mobilization point for the troops of the State.

By adding a few thousand dollars to the cost of the building, a second story could be put on it which would make a fine armory for the organizations stationed in Cheyenne. To be used for this purpose, the building would have to be close in to the center of the city. This would save the State an expenditure of from \$300 to \$600 per year.

During the past two years we have paid out over \$1,000 for drayage of military property to and from the store-house at 600 East Twenty-fifth street, Cheyenne. This expenditure would be eliminated if the store-house were on the railroad tracks. The present office used by the Adjutant General in the State House is only about half large enough. Unless this building is erected, it will be necessary to move the office down town again, as soon as money is available to pay rent. The Chief Quartermaster's office should properly be in the store-house. The building is so far out of town that it is impracticable for an office of any kind, and the rooms in the present building are so cold that it is impossible to use them in the winter. Taking these things into consideration, it is evident that it will be better to leave the location of the building to be determined by the "State Military Board" after taking into consideration the amount appropriated.

In the future, laws providing for the construction of buildings for the use of the Militia should provide that the building "will be constructed by the Chief Quartermaster under the direction of the Military Board of the State." This would give the State all the protection that is necessary. "The Board of Control" that constructed the Newcastle Armory is both cumbersome and useless. That building was in fact constructed under the direction of the Adjutant General on the approval of the Governor. The Military Board of the State (provided for in Section 31, Chapter 88, Laws of Wyoming, 1913) is just the right size for efficiency. It consists of the Governor and Adjutant General.

I believe that the lack of individual lockers for enlisted men is responsible for the loss and theft of more clothing than any other one thing. The War Department rules are: that military property will not be loaned to civilians or carried home by members of the Militia or used for non-military purposes. Each man should have a large steel locker, capable of holding all his equipment. I am informed that we could get

these lockers for the Militia of this State, and install them in the different armories of the companies for \$5,000. I believe we would save enough on our clothing allowance in two years to more than pay this back to the State.

There is a great amount of work to be done at the State Store-house, and Arsenal, which is now left undone. There is a large quantity of Government property which should be cleaned and repaired. I have now over 200 rifles in the store-house, which should be cleaned, as they are rusty and dirty and unserviceable. Some of these rifles have been there in that same condition for several years. If the War Department knew of the condition of military property in this State, I believe that all Federal aid would be withdrawn from the State of Wyoming. The Store Keeper should be a permanent office. He should have an adequate salary for his work, and should be under bond, and make property returns to the Chief Quartermaster, the same as the company commanders. Some of our store keepers have received \$25 per month, and some of them have received only their quarters, fuel, and light, for staying there and looking after the place. This is not a job for an old soldier, but should be given to a man who is capable and efficient. This man's salary should be paid from a special appropriation, or from the Chief Quartermaster's contingent, and not from the Adjutant General's contingent, because when the Adjutant General's contingent is nearly exhausted, the store keeper is usually the first man to be discharged, notwithstanding the fact that he is (from the Quartermaster's standpoint) the most important man in the Militia.

Company commanders receive nothing for their work, and heretofore have never been held accountable for their property. Since the Government Inspection in April, 1913, at which time I accompanied the inspecting officer, I have kept careful books against each company commander and required them to pay for every article of property lost. Only three captains refused to pay for their shortage, which in one case amounted to over \$300. They were reported to the bonding company, and I am informed by its agents that that company will settle with the State at once for this shortage. For the first time in the history of the State, company commanders have been required to take up on their returns and properly account for property purchased from State funds. All these things have caused company commanders a great deal more work and responsibility, and the War Department rules are becoming so rigid that we have great difficulty in securing men willing to be captains of the companies in the several towns. The least amount the State could pay them for the services they render, is \$25 per month. This would necessitate an appropriation of \$7,200 for the biennial period. It would then not be necessary to put company commanders under bond, but the value of property they were short could be deducted from their salary. The last legislature passed a law that Quartermaster Sergeants should be paid \$15 per month, but no appropriation was made for the same. It would be much better to pay the responsible officer in each case, and let him pay his own Quartermaster Sergeant for doing the work, if he sees fit.

At present each company is allotted \$600 per year for their incidental expenses, but it would be better if the Chief Quartermaster would rent armories in the name of the State and then pay each company \$300 per year (\$25 per month) as incidental expenses. This would be fair in every way, as one company now has an armory belonging to the State and the rent varies in different localities, for the buildings used. If the company is efficient in all respects, it would be better to pay the \$25

per month into their company fund, without requiring the company commander to submit an itemized voucher of expenses, as is now done, but requiring him only to report his company fund on an account current monthly to the Adjutant General's Office. The money in each case could be expended by the company commander for the various interests of the company, and the account audited, as is done in the Regular Army, by the company counsel and administration.

The last appropriation for the Militia Expense Fund (for the incidental expenses of companies) provided that this money should be paid out by the Auditor on vouchers "Audited by the Adjutant General and Approved by the Governor." There is absolutely no reason for having the Governor approve these vouchers. The Governor is so busy now that he cannot give his attention to auditing the accounts of the Militia. If the approval of two men is necessary on these vouchers the law could provide that they be audited by the Chief Quartermaster and approved by the Adjutant General. The Governor is Commander-in-Chief of the Militia, and he authorizes all expenditures before they can be made in any event.

It is customary in most states to appoint the Quartermaster General U. S. Disbursing Officer for the State, and I was appointed to this office on July 1, 1914. As such, it is my duty to disburse annually about \$40,000 Government money, for the Organized Militia of Wyoming. I am under \$10,000 bond to the Government. I am also under a \$5,000 bond to the State for the accountability of all State and Government military property. For these reasons, I believe that the salary of the Chief Quartermaster should be increased to at least \$2,500 per year. The present salary is only \$1,200, and is not in keeping with his responsibility. Many clerks and other office employees who have no responsibility whatever, receive a larger salary than this. The Chief Quartermaster should have a Contingent Fund of at least \$7,000 for the biennial period, for the care of property, and his traveling expenses as Inspector General. During a part of the term of my office, I have had to act as stenographer for the Adjutant General, and I hardly think this was the intention of the Legislature when it created the office. It was, however, unavoidable, owing to the shortage of funds in the Adjutant General's Office.

Inspections in this State should be more frequent. It is the only means of telling whether or not our Militia companies are efficient. There should be some kind of an inspection every 60 days, and company commanders should not have notice of these inspections, except, of course, the Annual Government Inspection. As it is now, we hardly know what the companies are doing from one year to the next, except by their monthly returns. The cost would not be great, as Battalion Commanders could make the inspection at least twice a year. The Chief Quartermaster should make his inspection and take an inventory of property at least twice a year, (one of these to be with the Government Inspector) and the Adjutant General could make inspections twice a year. The Regular Army Inspector Instructor could be present at part of these inspections with the inspecting officer, as his services might be required.

DISCIPLINE AND TRAINING.

The discipline of the National Guard lies largely with the Governor and the Adjutant General. The officers of this State and also the men would welcome a more rigid enforcement of the regulations. Many of them have seen service in the Regular Army, and nearly all of them are serving in the Militia purely for the love of the service, and they want to see the game played as it should be played. I have never believed the

oft repeated assertion that the National Guard cannot be disciplined as strictly as the Regular Army. I know it is not true in this State. Perhaps this is because we have so many ex-regulars in our Guard.

There has been no General Court convened in this State for the trial of a commissioned officer since 1910 and, I believe, for some years prior to that date. This has had its effect on the discipline of the Guard. Whenever an officer does something he should not do, I believe it to be for the best interests of the service to have him tried promptly by a General Court and punished for his misbehavior. This would give not only the officers and men in the National Guard a more wholesome respect for the service, but civilians as well. When an officer is asked to resign or is summarily dismissed from the service for misconduct, he leaves the service, as a general rule, with a desire for vengeance on the officers who dismissed him, and always he becomes a "knocker" against the National Guard in the community in which he lives. If he were tried, found guilty, and promptly punished for his misconduct before being dismissed, I do not believe he would have the same feeling. If he did, the publicity of his trial would cause his statements to have no effect in his community.

I believe that the law should be changed so that no officer can be dismissed from the service without a conviction after a fair and impartial trial by General Court Martial. There is a standing order in this State, as there always has been in the Regular Army, that no officer or enlisted man can interview the Governor (or Commander-in-Chief) on military matters, without first gaining the permission of the Adjutant General. This order also provides that any officer or enlisted man who violates this rule shall be tried and punished by General Court Martial. It would certainly be for the best interests of the discipline of the Militia if this order were rigidly enforced by the Governor.

In order to take the National Guard out of politics as much as possible, I recommend that the law be so changed as to make our commissions in the National Guard during good behavior of the officer, or until the age limit of 64 years is reached, instead of for the term of three years following the custom of the Regular Army; and that the Adjutant General and other Staff Officers be detailed from the line officers above the grade of Captain, who have had five years or more continuous service in the Guard. The rank of our Staff Officers should be reduced to appropriate grade for the forces of the State. An exception could be made in the law to the Aides-de-Camp on the Governor's staff. This is a purely political appointment, and it is right that it should be. They do the Militia no harm in any way, and are usually good "boosters" for the companies in their respective towns. They have the rank of Major by law, and their period of service is from the time appointed by the Governor and during his term of office.

When a civilian is appointed to the office of Adjutant General, the discipline, instruction, and efficiency of the Militia suffers. If the law was so that a line officer who has five years or more service, must be detailed to that office, this would not be the case. Surely the Governor could find among the officers above the grade of Captain, a man of his own political party, who would be capable to fill this office. It is not an office that can be filled by any man unless he has had several years of military training. Military affairs are so different from anything a man comes in contact with in civil life, and it takes from three to five years for a man to learn the regulations of the War Department and the customs of the service.

The law should be changed so that promotions in the Guard will be according to lineal rank. We may not be fortunate enough to always

have a Governor who enforces this rule, and in order to make service in the National Guard worth while, an officer should know that promotion is coming to him if he serves the State honestly and faithfully as a subordinate. In some states, I am told, that even the company commanders are changed when a new Governor takes office, and it is a noticeable fact that those states have the poorest military organizations. It is now a good time to change our law before this is ever done in Wyoming.

Under the subject of property, I mentioned the desirability of more frequent inspections. This is desirable, also, from the standpoint of a better discipline of the Militia. If company commanders knew that the Major of their Battalion or the Adjutant General might drop in on them any time, they would be more inclined to keep their property and records in proper condition.

Owing to a shortage of help in the Adjutant General's Office, which has existed for a number of years, the following work is left undone:

No records are kept of discharges of enlisted men.

Only a partial record is kept of enlistments.

Monthly returns and accounts current from the companies are not checked and verified.

The last record kept of commissions issued was in 1903, when Frank A. Stitzer of Laramie, was Adjutant General. The record was not started again until 1912, when Colonel V. K. Hart took charge of the office.

The Adjutant General's Office is supposed to be a place where the record of any man now serving, or who at any time served in the Militia, can be obtained. When Colonel Hart took charge of the office in 1912 there were no records of any kind or description. Since that time conditions have been better to some extent.

The Adjutant General's salary is at present only \$1,200 per year. His salary should be increased in proportion to his duties and responsibilities. In case of riot, insurrection or rebellion, he might become the most important man in the State. I believe that \$3,000 per year is the least the State can pay the Adjutant General and expect efficiency in that office.

The present Contingent Fund of the Adjutant General is \$7,000 for the biennial period. I believe that this is sufficient if the Inspector-General and Chief Quartermaster is given enough money for his traveling expenses and the care and transportation of property, so that the Adjutant General will not have to pay out his contingent for these purposes.

In this report I have only touched on the more important things which have come up in the past two years. And I have called attention to the defects of our State troops as they have appeared to me, rather than the things for which they deserve credit. If I had time I could quote statistics, published by the Government, which show that we have more enrolled militiamen for the population, than any other state in the Union. They are exceptionally well uniformed, armed and equipped. Their training is excellent. A very large per cent of them have seen service in the Regular Army and in the Volunteers. Upon the few occasions they have been called upon to protect life and property or quell a threatened riot, they have answered the call promptly and in a manner which proved their value to the State.

The following is a summary of the recommendations in the foregoing report. This calls for an increase of appropriations for the maintenance of the militia, but in many cases it will prove a saving of property and money to the State. In times past we have been given more money by the Government for our militia (for the population of the State) than any other state in the Union. The State owes a duty to the nation to

maintain its Organized Militia up to that standard of efficiency which is set by the War Department and which would render our National Guard a unit to be relied upon by the Regular Army Officers as part of the first line of defense, rather than a hindrance to their operations, in case of war. The time will surely come in this State, as it has in all other states, when the National Guard will be needed to protect the life and property of our citizens. At such a time the training and equipment of the miliamen will make their services of value or of no value to the State, according to whether it has been good or bad. If the State cannot appropriate enough money to properly train and equip the militia, their services in case of need will be worse than nothing and the Governor will be forced to the humiliation of calling on the Federal Government for aid.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS.

That the State erect a military Storehouse at a cost of \$20,000.

A special appropriation of \$5,000 for the purchase of steel individual lockers.

That the Store Keeper be paid a permanent salary and for this purpose an appropriation of \$1,800 for the biennial period.

That company commanders be paid \$300 per year. For this purpose an appropriation of \$7,200 for the biennial period.

That the Chief Quartermaster's salary be increased to \$2,500 per year and that he be given a Contingent Fund for the care and transportation of property, of \$7,000 for the biennial period.

That the Adjutant General's salary be increased to \$3,000 per year.

That the Chief Quartermaster be required to rent all armories in the name of the State.

That the Governor be not required to approve vouchers for the expenses of the Militia.

More rigid discipline.

More frequent inspections.

That no officer be dismissed from the service without a trial and conviction by a General Court Martial.

That the period of commissions be similar to those in the Regular Army, during good behavior or until the age limit of 64 years is reached.

That all Staff Officers, except the Aides-de-Camp, be detailed from the line.

That unless the Legislature appropriates enough money to properly train the Militia and care for United States and State Military property that the National Guard of Wyoming be mustered out of the service.

Subject: State Armories; Store Houses, etc.

1. Pursuant to your verbal request this date, the undersigned submits the following recommendations for your information and approval.

2. Your attention is invited to the deplorable condition of the military property of the United States, issued to this State and housed at present in the wooden shacks on the property called, "Soldiers' Home," at Cheyenne, Wyoming. I take the liberty of recommending that a suitable warehouse for the storing of this property be forthwith constructed

at the very earliest convenience of the State Authorities. I only need point out the fact that the deterioration of this military property would, in the course of a few years, more than repay the original cost of the warehouse.

3. The Inspector-Instructor desires to invite your attention to the fact that it would pay the State to give a certain small but sufficient sum to each company commander in payment for his services, and to cover any shortage in property that may fall to him.

4. It is believed that the State would save a large annual rental charge by the construction of armories at the various company stations. The Inspector-Instructor desires to heartily commend the start that was made along this line at Newcastle. He recommends the continuance of this policy.

5. The Military Organization of this State does not conform strictly to that laid down in the Federal Statutes, providing for the Army of the United States. The various offices of Surgeon-General, Chief of the Quartermaster Corps, and Inspector-General, should conform to General Order No. 8, War Department, 1914.

6. The Inspector-Instructor has observed the fairness and impartiality with which you have administered the National Guard of this State. It is a fact that politics have not been allowed to creep into the Guard. If this policy is as rigidly adhered to in the future as in the past, the National Guard of Wyoming may look forward to many years of progress toward the highest efficiency.

Provided, that any such defunct corporation may at any time within one year after the forfeiture of its franchise, rights and privileges, in the manner herein provided, be revived and reinstated, by filing the required certificate of agency and paying the prescribed fee, together with a penalty of twenty-five dollars."

The premises, utensils, wagons, and all appliances used in connection with the business of peddling and hawking fresh meat will be subject to inspection, at any time, by the State Dairy, Food and Oil Commissioner or his deputy; and whenever the State Dairy, Food and Oil Commissioner or his deputy shall find, upon a hearing to be held after not less than three days' notice to any such licensee, that the provisions of the act regulating slaughter houses and the regulations adopted thereunder or the regulations governing the care of such meat adopted under the provisions of this act have been violated, he shall have the authority to cancel said license.

"Section 5. It shall be the duty of every sheriff, deputy sheriff,

constable, marshal or policeman of the State of Wyoming to require every one engaged in the business of peddling or hawking fresh meat to produce the license granted to them by the State Dairy, Food and Oil Commissioner. Upon the failure of the peddler to produce such license, said sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable, marshal or policeman shall notify at once the State Dairy, Food and Oil Commissioner of the fact, who will take such action as the law directs in cases arising under this act."

House Joint Resolution No. 3. Introduced by Committee No. 14.
Be It Resolved:

Whereas, the State in August, 1906, by its State Engineer, under a contract containing terms and conditions identical with the requirements of the statutes regulating Carey Act projects, granted to Wyoming Central Irrigation Company, a corporation, water right permits for the irrigation of 350,000 acres of land within the arid portion of the Wind River Indian Reservation in Fremont County; and,

Whereas, said company has entirely failed to fulfill the conditions of said contract, but did construct under a temporary permit only a small canal for the irrigation of about seven thousand acres of said land and has sold and contracted to sell to the settlers thereon perpetual water rights and a perpetual interest in the entire proposed irrigation system for all of said 350,000 acres of said land; and,

Whereas, said company has placed itself in such condition that it cannot fulfill its said contracts either with the State or said settlers; and,

Whereas, a serious question has arisen as to what if any right or title said settlers have to the waters used by them through and by means of said temporary permit and the action of the State Engineer relative thereto; and,

Whereas, said settlers were induced to purchase and contract to purchase said water rights upon the representations of the State and the conditions of said contract between the State and said company and the

State is at least nominally obligated to protect said settlers in the acquisition of good and valid water rights.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, That a joint committee of the House and Senate, to consist of three members of the House and two members of the Senate, be appointed, to investigate and ascertain and report what the exact situation and statute is relative to said water rights and to recommend what, if any, action should be taken on the part of the State for the protection of said settlers relative to said water rights.

Be it Further Resolved, That said committee be and they are hereby empowered to call and examine witnesses and to compel the production of any and all papers, records and documents by them deemed to be necessary in conducting said investigation; and,

Be it Resolved, That said committee be and they are hereby authorized to employ an attorney to assist them in making such investigation and for this purpose there is hereby appropriated from the general tax of the State Treasury the sum of one hundred dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary.

This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Message from the Governor.

The following message was received from His Excellency, the Governor:

The State of Wyoming,
Executive Department,
5 February, 1915.

To the Honorable Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives, and

To the Honorable President and Members of the Senate.

Gentlemen:—I desire to call your attention to a real crisis which is at hand in the development and progress of the State of Wyoming—a condition of affairs brought about by an unequal distribution of the burden of taxes, as between the vast area of unoccupied federal land and the comparatively restricted area of lands that are taxable.

During the year 1914 there was collected from the taxable property of the State of Wyoming for the construction and maintenance of the roads and highways, the sum of \$450,000.00. This represented a per capita expenditure for every man, woman and child, of \$3.00, and in most of our counties constitutes one-fourth of the tax income. Approximately only ten per cent of the available domain within our borders is settled up and consequently taxable, while the other nine-tenths is under the ownership and control of the federal government and contributes absolutely nothing to the support of the State government, yet partakes of all the benefits. Under such conditions the basis of taxation is so narrow that it is a difficult matter to raise funds with which to enforce civil government over the vast area of unoccupied territory, to say nothing of the expense of building highways across it.

Hence, the question arises: Should the federal government with its ninety per cent of non-contributing lands ask the State with its ten per cent of taxable land to spend nine-tenths of its road income for the benefit of the government? That is what we are doing today and each year the burden grows heavier. It is fast approaching the point where many of our counties will be threatened with bankruptcy.

The sixty-six million acres, or ninety-six thousand square miles of land in Wyoming, is inhabited by approximately one hundred and fifty thousand people and these are grouped in widely separated localities. Much of our territory is mountainous and heavy expense is entailed in building and maintaining roads. These great bodies of federal lands do not lie in a few portions of the State, but are to be found everywhere. With the double purpose in view of securing better roads and of attracting settlers to the public lands within our State, I would suggest and recommend that the Congress of the United States be memorialized to pass the bill, introduced before the United States Senate by Senator Warren, which provides for a grant of a million acres of land to the

State, the proceeds from the sale or leasing of which shall be employed in the building and maintenance of the public roads within our State.

There is not a single reason which can be advanced why the government should refuse this much needed assistance. On the other hand, there will be disclosed many powerful reasons in favor of it. The building of these highways will not only add to the value of the lands but will operate to compel the settlement and occupation by home builders and greatly reduce the responsibility and expense of the national government.

The terms of such a grant could be so restricted as to compel the employment of funds, derived from the sale or rental of this land, in the specific purpose for which intended and it might even fix arbitrarily the sized tracts to be sold or leased to single individuals. This would in fact make the State an active agent for the federal government in the construction of such highways through its unoccupied territory.

With these facts in mind, therefore, it seems to me that it is not only the privilege of the government to afford us relief in the construction and upkeep of our roads and to assist in the settling up of the vacant lands of the state, but it is its clear obligation to do so.

Where two or more applicants claim preference by reason of holding title to lands nearest to the lands applied for, the boards shall grant leases upon a basis as nearly equitable as possible. Applicants claiming the preference right accorded by this section must set forth such claims at the time of making their applications, or subsequent thereto, and prior to the expiration of any prior lease on the lands covered by such application."

The receipts and disbursements through the Treasurer's Office were checked from January 31st, 1913, to the close of business on the date above indicated, thus covering the entire period since the last Legislative Audit.

The total receipts, as shown by the summary, were \$2,192,342.25.

The State Warrants paid during the time covered were \$2,264,138.69. There was interest paid on State Bonds in the amount of \$16,257.06; State Bonds were paid in the amount of \$3,000.00.

The statement submitted herewith also shows the receipts and disbursements of trust funds through the Treasurer's Office during the period covered by this report. The total amount received from this source as shown by the summary was \$195,500.53, while the amount disbursed was \$243,861.81.

The trust funds on hand at the close of business January 5th amount to \$159,917.28.

Next follows a trial balance of the books of the State Treasurer at the close of business January 5th, 1915, showing the amount of cash on hand, the amounts on deposit in the banks throughout the State and the amount of investments in each of the permanent funds. The trial balance also shows the amount remaining to the credit of each of the various funds at the close of business on the day above indicated.

You are advised that the amounts shown to be held by State Depositories were reconciled by your committee through certificates received from the various banks.

The last statement in the following is that of the bonds and securities held by the State Treasurer as investment of permanent land funds at the close of business on January 5th, 1915. These securities were all counted, listed and verified with the accounts as shown by the books of the State Treasurer.

The Treasurer and Auditor file their trial balances with each other after the first of each month and the accounts are reconciled by taking into consideration the warrants issued by the auditor that have not been presented to the Treasurer for payment. A monthly cash statement is filed with the State Examiner.

We find that a large amount of business transacted through these offices is handled in a thorough and excellent manner by the efficient and obliging officers of these departments.

Consideration of Bills on General File.

Mr. Hensinger moved that this order of business be passed for the present, which motion prevailed.

Bills on Second Reading.

House Bill No. 147.

A bill for an act providing compensation for injuries or death resulting from injuries of workmen from accident occurring in extra-hazardous employment; defining extra-hazardous employments and providing for the accumulation, maintenance and administration of funds in the State Treasury for the payment of such compensation and repealing Sections 3526, 4291 and 4292 of Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, and all other laws or parts of laws relating to damages for injuries or death from injuries, or in anywise in conflict with this act.

was read a second time, with amendments, and ordered engrossed for third reading.

Mr. Young read the following statement and requested that it be entered on the Journal. Mr. Marts moved that the request be granted, and there being no objections, it was so ordered.

Statement.

The workingmen of Wyoming want a workman's compensation law. They naturally want a law that carries the very highest possible benefits.

I want to say now that it is my honest conviction that the benefits specified in this act are too low.

It is true that we have no adequate figures at hand, that apply particularly to our State, that would let us accurately base a demand for higher rates with the certain knowledge that the fund accumulated would pay them.

It is because of this, and because of the fact that presenting a demand for higher rates of compensation would open the way for all sorts of amendments to the bill, that I make this statement.

The time for consideration of the bill is short; amendments here might encourage amendments elsewhere; opposition might be excited to the measure, and I want no act of mine to endanger the passage of the bill.

The rates are too low, I believe, and it is because of this belief that I want to see the present bill passed so that the rates therein, low as they are, will serve to gather complete and accurate data, as to the deaths, total disabilities and partial disabilities (and duration) to the end that at the expiration of two years the workmen of Wyoming will have had their stand for higher rates justified.

We are aware of the deficiencies that are in the bill, and, like all of you who have had to have your proposed legislation amended or presented in a form not entirely satisfactory, can only take satisfaction out of the thought that it is, after all, providing for better net results to disabled workmen than they have gotten before.

I would rather see the present bill, with its present minor deficiencies, pass and become a law, than one with higher rates but so worded that it would be almost impossible to get the awards.

With the bill the next two years will be years of experience. Without any law on the subject the next session of the Legislature would be again put to the necessity of guessing on this very important subject.

Knowing the opposition that would develop if I advanced higher rates, and for the reasons explained in this statement, I refrain from proposing any change.

House Bill No. 188.

A bill for an act to provide for the construction of an addition to the building for male patients at the Wyoming State Hospital for the Insane at Evanston, Wyoming, and providing for a tax levy to provide funds therefor.

By inserting after Section 36 of the original and printed bill the following additional sections to be known as Sections 37 to 53, inclusive, and re-number Section 37 of the original and printed bill as Section 54, and re-number Section 38 of the original and printed bill as Section 55.

"Section 37. NEGOTIATION OF NEGOTIABLE RECEIPTS BY DELIVERY: A negotiable receipt may be negotiated by delivery

(a) Where, by the terms of the receipt, the warehouseman undertakes to deliver the goods to the bearer, or

(b) Where, by the terms of the receipt, the warehouseman undertakes to deliver the goods to the order of a specified person, and such person or a subsequent endorsee of the receipt has indorsed it in blank or to bearer.

Where, by the terms of a negotiable receipt, the goods are deliverable to bearer or where a negotiable receipt has been indorsed in blank or to bearer, any holder may endorse the same to himself or to any other specified person, and in such case the receipt shall thereafter be negotiated only by the indorsement of such endorsee.

"Section 38. NEGOTIATION OF NEGOTIABLE RECEIPTS BY INDORSEMENT: A negotiable receipt may be negotiated by the indorsement of the person to whose order the goods are, by the terms of the receipt, deliverable. Such indorsement may be in blank, to bearer or to a specified person. If indorsed to a specified person, it may be again negotiated by the indorsement of such person in blank, to bearer or to another specified person. Subsequent negotiation may be made in like manner.

"Section 39. TRANSFER OF RECEIPTS: A receipt which is not in such form that it can be negotiated by delivery may be transferred by the holder by delivery to a purchaser or donee.

A non-negotiable receipt cannot be negotiated, and the indorsement of such a receipt gives the transferee no additional right.

"Section 40. WHO MAY NEGOTIATE A RECEIPT: A negotiable receipt may be negotiated.

(a) By the owner thereof, or

(b) By any person to whom the possession or custody of the receipt has been intrusted by the owner, if, by the terms of the receipt, the warehouseman undertakes to deliver the goods to the order of the person to whom the possession or custody of the receipt has been intrusted, or if at the time of such intrusting the receipt is in such form that it may be negotiated by delivery.

"Section 41. RIGHTS OF PERSON TO WHOM A RECEIPT HAS BEEN NEGOTIATED: A person to whom a negotiable receipt has been duly negotiated acquires thereby

(a) Such title to the goods as the person negotiating the receipt to him had or had ability to convey to a purchaser in good faith for value, and also such title to the goods as the depositor or person to whose order the goods were to be delivered by the terms of the receipt had or had ability to convey to a purchaser in good faith for value, and

(b) The direct obligation of the warehouseman to hold possession of the goods for him according to the terms of the receipt as fully as if the warehouseman had contracted directly with him.

"Section 42. RIGHTS OF PERSON TO WHOM A RECEIPT HAS BEEN TRANSFERRED: A person to whom a receipt has been transferred but not negotiated, acquires thereby, as against the transferrer, the title of the goods, subject to the terms of any agreement with the transferrer.

If the receipt is non-negotiable such person also acquires the right to notify the warehouseman of the transfer to him of such receipt, and thereby acquires the direct obligation of the warehouseman to hold possession of the goods for him according to the terms of the receipt.

"Prior to the notification of the warehouseman by the transferrer or transferee of a non-negotiable receipt, the title of the transferee to the goods and the right to acquire the obligation of the warehouseman may be defeated by the levy of an attachment or execution upon the goods by a creditor of the transferrer, or by a notification to the warehouseman by the transferrer or a subsequent purchaser from the transferrer of a subsequent sale of the goods by the transferrer.

"Section 43. TRANSFER OF NEGOTIABLE RECEIPT WITHOUT INDORSEMENT: Where a negotiable receipt is transferred for value by delivery, and the indorsement of the transferrer is essential for negotiation, the transferee acquires a right against the transferrer to compel him to indorse the receipt unless a contrary intention appears. The negotiation shall take effect as of the time when the indorsement is actually made.

"Section 44. WARRANTIES ON SALE OF RECEIPT: A person who for value negotiates or transfers a receipt by indorsement or delivery, including one who assigns for value a claim secured by a receipt, unless a contrary intention appears, warrants

(a) That the receipt is genuine.

(b) That he has a legal right to negotiate or transfer it.

(c) That he has knowledge of no fact which would impair the validity or worth of the receipt, and

(d) That he has a right to transfer the title to the goods and that the goods are merchantable or fit for a particular purpose whenever such warranties would have been implied, if the contract of the parties had been to transfer without a receipt the goods represented thereby.

"Section 45. **INDORSER NOT GUARANTOR:** The indorsement of a receipt shall not make the indorser liable for any failure on the part of the warehouseman or previous indorsers of the receipt to fulfill their respective obligations.

"Section 46. **NO WARRANTY IMPLIED FROM ACCEPTING PAYMENT OF A DEBT:** A mortgagee, pledgee or holder for security of a receipt who in good faith demands or receives payment of the debt for which such receipt is security, whether from a party to a draft drawn for such debt or from any other person, shall not by so doing be deemed to represent or to warrant the genuineness of such receipt or the quantity or quality of the goods therein described.

"Section 47. **WHEN NEGOTIATION NOT IMPAIRED BY FRAUD, MISTAKE OR DURESS:** The validity of the negotiation of a receipt is not impaired by the fact that such negotiation was a breach of duty on the part of the person making the negotiation, or by the fact that the owner of the receipt was induced by fraud, mistake or duress to intrust the possession or custody of the receipt to such person, if the person to whom the receipt was negotiated, or a person to whom the receipt was subsequently negotiated, paid value therefor, without notice of the breach of duty, or fraud, mistake or duress.

"Section 48. **SUBSEQUENT NEGOTIATION:** Where a person having sold, mortgages, or pledged goods which are in a warehouse and for which a negotiable receipt has been issued, or having sold, mortgages or pledged the negotiable receipt representing such goods, continues in possession of the negotiable receipt, the subsequent negotiation thereof by that person under any sale, or other disposition thereof to any person receiving the same, in good faith, for value and without notice of the previous, sale, mortgage or pledge, shall have the same effect as if the first purchaser of the goods or receipt had expressly authorized the subsequent negotiation.

"Section 49. **NEGOTIATION DEFEATS VENDOR'S LIEN:** Where a negotiable receipt has been issued for goods, no seller's lien or right of stoppage in transitu shall defeat the rights of any purchaser for value in good faith to whom such receipt has been negotiated, whether such negotiation be prior or subsequent to the notification to the warehouseman who issued such receipt of the seller's claim to a lien or right of stoppage in transitu. Nor shall the warehouseman be obliged to deliver or justified in delivering the goods to an unpaid seller unless the receipt is first surrendered for cancellation.

"Section 50. **WHEN RULES OF COMMON LAW STILL APPLICABLE.** In any case not provided for in this act the rules of law and equity, including the law merchant, and in particular the rules relating to the law of principal and agent and to the effect of fraud, misrepresentation, duress, or coercion, mistake, bankruptcy, or other invalidating cause, shall govern.

"Section 51. **INTERPRETATION SHALL GIVE EFFECT TO PURPOSE OF UNIFORMITY:** This act shall be so interpreted and construed as to effectuate its general purpose to make uniform the law of those states which enact it.

"Section 52. **DEFINITIONS:** (1) In this act unless the context or subject matter otherwise requires

"Action" includes counter claim, set-off, and suit in equity.

"Delivery" means voluntary transfer of possession from one person to another.

"Fungible goods" means goods of which any unit is, from its nature or by mercantile custom, treated as the equivalent of any other unit.

"Goods" means chattels or merchandise in storage, or which has been or is about to be stored.

"Holder" of a receipt means a person who has both actual possession of such receipt and a right of property therein.

"Order" means an order by indorsement on the receipt.

"Owner" does not include mortgagee or pledgee.

"Person" includes a corporation or partnership or two or more persons having a joint or common interest.

To "Purchase" includes to take as mortgagee or as pledgee.

"Purchased" includes mortgagee and pledgee.

"Receipt" means a warehouse receipt.

"Value" is any consideration sufficient to support a simple contract. An antecedent or pre-existing obligation, whether for money or not, constitutes value where a receipt is taken either in satisfaction thereof or as security therefor.

"Warehouseman" means a person lawfully engaged in the business of storing goods for profit.

(2) A thing is done "in good faith" within the meaning of this act, when it is in fact done honestly, whether it be done negligently or not.

"Section 53. ACT DOES NOT APPLY TO EXISTING RECEIPTS: The provisions of this act do not apply to receipts made and delivered prior to the taking effect of this act."

"Provided, further, That the citizens of this State shall be permitted to fish with seine, with meshes not less than 1½ inches, in any of the waters of this State. Any citizen or citizens desiring to seine in any of the waters of this State shall make application to the assistant or deputy game warden of his district. If said application be approved by the warden of said district, he shall upon all occasions accompany any such citizen or citizens and shall return any and all trout, grayling, pike, bass or cat fish to said stream, and it is hereby made unlawful for any citizen seining in any of the waters of this State to retain any trout, grayling, pike, bass or cat fish. Any citizen or citizens so seining shall procure a license to do so from the warden of said district upon payment of \$3.00, which shall procure a license for one or more citizens for any one day, who may use but one seine only. Said license fee shall be recovered into the treasury in the same manner as all other fees provided for under the game and fish laws of this State;

"And further provided, that the superintendent of a fish hatchery district may, upon petition of fifty citizens of the county wherein is located any lake or lakes which have been stocked with food fish, such as lake trout, white fish and carp, and upon the recommendation of the Board of County Commissioners of said county, permit citizens of this State to fish for said lake trout, white fish and carp with a gill net with mesh not less than one and one-half inches, said net to be exhibited to said superintendent and by him approved; and it is further provided, that fish so lawfully taken shall not be shipped out of the State of Wyoming; and provided, further, that said superintendent may at any time

revoke said permission if in his judgment it is necessary in order to preserve the fish in lakes. Any person offending against this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than twenty dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or shall be imprisoned for a period of not more than three months or by both."

We, your Special Joint Committee, appointed under authority of House Joint Resolution No. 3, relative to the situation pertaining to settlers at and near Riverton, Fremont County, and the Wyoming Central Irrigation Company, herewith present our report.

Upon investigation, we find that there is contention between the Wyoming Central Irrigation Company and the settlers at and near Riverton, Fremont County, Wyoming, over the water taken from the Wind River by the Wyoming Central Irrigation Company.

If the State of Wyoming is not legally liable, we find it is at least morally responsible to the settlers to assist them in the acquisition of a good and sufficient water right, and to assist in the protection of said settlers against the threatened action of the Wyoming Central Irrigation Company and of the Trustees for the bondholders of the bonds of the Company.

We, therefore, recommend that the Ways and Means Committee be requested to include in the General Appropriation Bill an appropriation of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of paying the expenses incident to the employment of counsel to act with the Attorney General, to assist counsel employed by the settlers in the threatened action of the Wyoming Cen-

tral Irrigation Company, payments from said appropriation to be made upon the certificate of the Governor and Attorney General.

Dear Sir:—I hereby file with you, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 29, the same being original House Bill No. 82, entitled: "An Act to provide for the mortgaging and leasing the real estate of any estate by the executor or administrator thereof, or by the guardian of the estate of any minor or incompetent person."

This act allows the administrator or executor to mortgage an estate under and by virtue of an order of the Court, but in case of the sale under foreclosure of such property mortgaged by an administrator, executor, or guardian, this act does not provide that such sale shall be under the supervision and with the sanction of the court. In other words, this act would tend to remove one of the safeguards at present thrown around the administration of an estate when, as a matter of fact, safeguards and restrictions should be increased rather than diminished. For this reason I am unable to approve this measure.

Dear Sir:—I hereby file with you, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 122, the same being original House Bill No. 257, entitled: "An Act to provide for holding boxing and sparring exhibitions and contests within this State by incorporated athletic clubs, prescribing restrictions, rules, and regulations for the same, fixing a license therefor, and providing penalties for the violation of this act."

In withholding my approval from this measure I am actuated not so much by the question of the principle it violates but by a determination to balk the vicious influences and unworthy conditions which surround and characterize such contests. Our record for law and order in the State of Wyoming has, in the past, been unusually good and, in passing upon the merits of legislation, it is not always sufficient to take into account local effects but, as a young state, we must zealously guard our reputation abroad.

Our State is now expending one-fifth of the money raised by taxation for the education of its children along the lines of higher and better ideals and, in view of this fact alone, it would seem unfortunate to take any step calculated to nullify the influence of such teaching.

Our State does not now and has not for years countenanced professional boxing, but, considering this measure in the light of experience

had by our sister states in similar legislation of this character, I feel their experience has been of such a nature as would justify us, at this time, in rejecting it for our own state. There can be no question, in my mind, of the ultimate effect of such a measure in Wyoming, in setting us backward instead of forward and I feel it my duty, therefore, to prevent this measure from becoming a law.

The difficulty with this measure is its tendency to make less stringent the regulations providing for the approval of surety bonds required from guardians of minor children. Clearly the only object to be attained by such a measure would be to shift the responsibility of passing on the validity of the bond, from the Judge of the court, to a commissioner or clerk of the court. It would seem that a change in the law must necessarily tend to lessen the restrictions along this line and to increase the danger of accepting bonds that are invalid. Such changes as these, I cannot sanction.

Dear Sir:—I hereby file with you, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 85, the same being original House Bill No. 184, entitled: "An Act authorizing the leasing of the building and grounds owned by the State at or near the city of Casper, Natrona County, Wyoming, now occupied and used as a branch of the Wyoming General Hospital and providing for a suspension of the provisions of Chapter 200, Laws of 1909, and Sections 517 and 518, Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, relating to the administration of said branch hospital by the State if said premises be leased."

I cannot approve this Act for several good and sufficient reasons. First, I believe it to be inconsistent for the State of Wyoming to build and equip any kind of an institution for the purpose of leasing the same to be operated by individuals as a private institution. Sound business principles would not sanction such a step in connection with private interests and I am convinced that the same rule would apply in the management of the State's properties. To permit the control of material property to pass into the hands of any lessee, no matter how high the standing and experience of that lessee, would be to put into jeopardy possessions whose title and right is vested only in the Commonwealth

and that Commonwealth should not lay aside the responsibility until it is willing also to free itself from actual possession.

While such institutions are not supposed to be money making concerns and, at the present time, are operated at a cost seemingly expensive, yet it seems to me entirely consistent and advisable for the state to transfer the control and ownership to the counties in which they are located, in order that they might have local, or more direct, supervision and be of greater benefit to the communities which they were designed to serve. I want to state, at this time, that I should be glad to approve, some time in the future, of a plan by which these branch hospitals might be transferred to the control of the counties, to be operated by them for the advantage and benefit of the people in the community in which they are located.

This institution was primarily located at Casper by the request, and for the benefit, of all the people in the community and, in the face of the strong protests which have reached me from a large number of residents in that section, I am justified in my belief that its removal from State control would not receive anything like unanimous approval.

Dear Sir:—I hereby file with you, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 120, the same being original House Bill No. 244, entitled: "An Act to amend and re-enact Section 2144 of Chapter 47, Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, relating to registration and registration officers."

The principal safeguard against illegal voting is prior registration. This act proposes to amend Section 2144, Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, in such a manner as would tend to destroy the protection placed about the ballot as guaranteed by the law as it now stands. This change I cannot approve.

Dear Sir:—I hereby file with you, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 35, the same being original House Bill No. 56, entitled: "An Act to amend and re-enact Sections 942, 946, 947, and 948 of the Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, and repealing Section 945 of Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, relating to Official Court Reporters in the State of Wyoming."

I withhold my approval from this Act because of the fact that under the provisions of Chapter 77, Compiled Statutes, 1910, it is now the duty of the court reporter to remain in constant attendance on the Judge of said court at all times, for which he receives a compensation of \$1,800 per year together with his actual and necessary expenses ranging from

\$400 to \$750 a year. During the year, a certain amount of revenue comes from the services of these reporters, which is now paid into the State Treasury. Under this proposed Act the State is deprived of this revenue, which is yielded from the fulfillment of the duties of these offices, the salary and contingent expenses of which are provided for and paid from the General Fund of the State. There is some virtue in the effort to reduce the cost to litigants but this is lost sight of in an apparent effort to increase the salaries of these officers.

Dear Sir:—I hereby file with you, without my approval, Enrolled Act No. 78, the same being original House Bill No. 197, entitled: "An Act entitled, 'An Act to repeal Section 1712, Revised Statutes of 1910, relating to the liabilities of cities of the first class for damages for injuries suffered or sustained by reason of defective public ways or sidewalks within the limits thereof'".

The repeal of Section 1712, Revised Statutes, 1910, would remove what appears to be the only reasonable protection to cities of the first class against actions for damages claimed to have been the result of negligence on the part of the city and the removal of such restriction would tend to encourage unnecessary and unreasonable litigation.

Dear Sir:—I herewith file with you Enrolled Act No. 126, House of Representatives, the same being original House Bill No. 296, entitled: "An Act making appropriations for salaries and contingent expenses of State and District officers and employees" * * * etc., etc., said Act being what is known as the General Appropriations Act.

I have approved this Act except where specifically noted hereinafter.

Section 10a, the paragraph reading: "The sum of \$10,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, for improvements and additions at the Branch Wyoming Hospital at Casper, Wyoming; said amount to be expended under the supervision and direction of the State Board of Charities and Reform". I withhold my approval from this section for the reason that the report of the Superintendent of the hospital shows that as it now stands the space in the hospital is hardly ever fully occupied, and it does not appear as if any additional improvements for that institution were necessary at this time.

Section 46, the paragraph reading: "The sum of \$9,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of carry-

ing out the provisions of Senate File No. 5, as passed by the present legislature for the two years ending March 31, 1917." I approve of so much of this item as appropriates six thousand dollars and withhold by approval from three thousand dollars, leaving the appropriation six thousand dollars. This is the act known as the Public Utilities Bill and it is my conviction that the work of the Commission for the first two years will be more of a preliminary nature and not requiring any actually heavy outlay in the way of expenses. Therefore I am convinced that six thousand dollars will be sufficient to defray all the necessary expenses incurred.

Section 49, the paragraph reading: "The sum of \$10,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of purchasing the necessary tools, implements, supplies, and equipment necessary in connection with the employment of prisoners upon public highways under the provisions of Chapter 44 of the Session Laws of 1911, for the two years ending March 31, 1917."

I approve of so much of this item as appropriates \$5,000 and withhold my approval from \$5,000, leaving the appropriation \$5,000. It appears from the report that \$5,000 has been expended on this account during the past two years and it would seem highly improbable that a larger amount of equipment would be necessary for the coming two years. Certainly these tools would not be entirely worn out and destroyed in so short a space of time. At least most of such equipment ought to be available for further use and I am confident that \$5,000 should be enough.

Section 53, the paragraph reading: "The sum of \$70, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the relief of W. H. Dobson, in payment of expenses in connection with the election contest of I. C. Jefferis vs. Fred Schmidt, before the Elections Committees of the Senate of the 13th Legislature of the State of Wyoming". It has not been the custom of our state legislatures, in recent years, to appropriate money to pay expenses of election contests.

Section 63, the paragraph reading: "The sum of \$100, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to reimburse J. J. Cross for the loss of seventeen head of swine destroyed and burned by order of the Governor of Wyoming pursuant to law". From information obtainable, it would appear that the State has not the responsibility in this particular case. Therefore this section is disapproved.

Section 65a, the paragraph reading: "The sum of \$800, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for the relief of John Mortimore, Thomas J. Mortimore, and W. M. Mortimore, for four head of horses and one registered English shire stallion killed under direction of the State Veterinarian, said livestock prior to their killing having been appraised under the direction of said State Veterinarian by three duly appointed appraisers, the aggregate appraised value of said five head being \$1,200." These horses, on which damages were claimed, were not reported until five years after they were killed and then not in accordance with the law. They were killed in 1908 and no claim was made against the State until 1913. Section 200, Wyoming Compiled Statutes, 1910, provides that the right to indemnity shall not exist where the owner negligently omits to comply with the provisions of the law relating to the appraisal and submission thereof to the State Veterinarian.

Section 65b, the paragraph reading: "For the relief of Charles B. Padden, the sum of three hundred and twenty-five dollars, (\$325.00) for horses killed by order of the State Veterinarian". These horses were not killed nor appraised in compliance with the law and, for the same reasons as given in the foregoing case, to-wit: non-compliance with Section 200 of the Revised Statutes, this claim is likewise disapproved.
