Message from the President: *Dr. David L. Whitman*

How quickly another year passes! Since my report last year we welcomed Shelley Macy, Jerry Jessen, and Skylar Wilson to the Board. They have all had a tremendous first year.

As you probably know, the Board tried, once again, to get our legislation changed in the 2012 legislative session. Despite it being a budget session, we were able to attain the 2/3 vote necessary to introduce the legislation. It was passed in the Senate with a couple of amendments, but failed to be heard in the House Corporations Committee before the deadline to be introduced on the House floor. The bill focused on key points that you will find outlined in Corky Stetson's article later in this Newsletter.



The Wyoming Board strongly believes that this is a good bill. It may not have every provision that is desired by every licensee, but it's an excellent compromise. The Board plans to re-introduce this bill in the 2013 legislative session and we will need all of you to help us get it passed by talking to the Senators and Representatives from your jurisdiction and letting them know that you support this bill.

On the national scene, NCEES is continuing the move of the FE and FS exams to Computer-Based Testing (CBT). Currently, the transition will take place in January 2014. At the upcoming NCEES Annual Meeting, there will be a motion to authorize NCEES to move any or all of the PE and PS exams to CBT, but no earlier than January 2015. Some PE exams should be able to transition to CBT rather quickly while others will remain in the paper and pencil mode for some time.

Wyoming Board members (both current and emeritus) continue to be active on national committees and task forces. The Board is also well represented by its membership at the NCEES Western Zone meeting and the NCEES annual meeting.

I hope that the Board is serving you well. We meet quarterly and you are certainly welcome to attend any and all meetings if you are interested. A typical meeting includes a budget report, any on-going business, reviewing CPC reports for renewal applications, approving new applicants (either to take the exams or comity licensure), acting on any complaints that are brought to the Board's attention, and examining disciplinary action on Wyoming licensees from another jurisdiction. If you know of any group around the State who would like to receive a presentation from the Board on its activities, please let me know and we'll be sure to make arrangements to make such a presentation.

A few final thoughts:

- I hope that moving to on-line renewal has been beneficial to you.
- The Board continues to work with the University of Wyoming on two fronts:
 - Attempting to increase faculty licensure and having PEs teach design-related courses. These efforts are directly related to a Memorandum of Understanding between the Board and the UW College of Engineering and Applied Science that was signed in February, 2011.
 - Enhancing the UW Surveying Certificate to make sure that it meets the Board's surveying requirements for candidates to take the LS exam.
- The Board is healthy financially and is currently proposing Rule changes this summer that will lower the licensure fees. Watch for more on this in the near future and please provide us any comments that you may have.
- The Board is currently examining the transition of its two-hour state-specific surveying exam to CBT.
- The Board has had discussions on creating a computer-based system to help you maintain a list of your CPC credits so that they are at your fingertips when it comes time to renew. This has been placed on hold as NCEES is considering a similar system to be implemented sometime in the future. The Wyoming Board will be at the forefront of helping NCEES with this effort.

PS to become closed-book exam in April 2013:

This change is a result of a motion NCEES passed at its 2011 annual meeting. The motion was presented by the NCEES Committee on Examination Policy and Procedures, which is responsible for reviewing the effectiveness of NCEES exams.

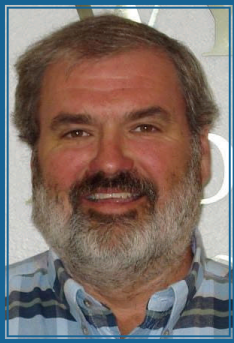
“There were two reasons to go to a closed-book exam: to increase the security of the exam and to prepare for the possibility of the PS transitioning to a computer-based format,” explained NCEES Director of Exam Services Tim Miller, P.E. “A closed-book exam will prevent candidates from copying exam content into their references or bringing in prohibited items. It will also make for an easier transition if the PS exam moves to a computer-based format at computer testing centers, where space for references is limited.”

We Need Your Support: *Conky Stetson*



As you all know, we have been trying to get our practice act updated. We have tried for several years. This has been a priority of mine since I have been on the board.

For a number of years, our legislation passed through the House, and it failed in the Senate. Two years ago we met with the Senate leaders. They told us if we removed the two year education requirement for surveying, and required a four year degree, they would not consider it. So the Board elected to leave the two year survey education in the legislation. Since we made that change for the last two legislative sessions, we have gotten our practice act through the Senate, but it has failed to come out of committee in the House. Our bill gets hung up on the survey education requirement each year. We need to get this issue resolved within our organization. There is much more in our new legislation that we need to get changed.

The main points of the legislation are:

- 1-Increasing the Board size from seven (7) members to nine (9) members, of which one (1) would be an additional land surveyor position. This is necessary in order to have larger subcommittees for review of applications, review of complaints, etc, and to protect against insufficiency for a quorum in the event contested cases come forward. In such an event, Board members involved in such cases cannot rule in any part of any appeal, so two additional members ensures fair and uninvolved members hear such an appeal. Because the Board is self-funding, and because the number of licensees is growing, the board anticipates no increase in cost, at this time, from either the state or our registrants, for supporting the additional members. In general this change helps us be better positioned to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the Wyoming public.
- 2-Remove "discipline-specific" engineering licensure. Wyoming is one of a small handful of states that still licenses by discipline. That is, the area in which an applicant passed the PE exam is placed on their seal. Since PEs are already allowed to practice in any area where they have competence via education and experience, having discipline-specific licensure doesn't make much sense.
- 3-Ability to adopt Rules to allow for engineering or surveying licensure of:
 - International candidates
 - Comity applicants who have at least twenty (20) years of discipline free practice
 - Candidates who have an earned doctorate degree in engineering or land surveying

To evolve with the times, the Board seeks the ability to at least review, and license, if applicable, candidates from other countries, or with significant and appropriate domestic experience, that our current statutory model does not address. Oftentimes, Wyoming faces turning down candidates that other states will license simply because our statutes do not allow such licensure, even though the individual may be determined competent in all other ways. This change opens the door for such qualified applicants.

- 4-Employees of the State of Wyoming, performing regulatory reviews within the scope of their authority and employment, would be exempt from licensure under the proposed bill.
- 5-Remove reference to BS degrees being ABET/EAC accredited, and replace it with education approved by the Board. While ABET/EAC accredited degrees will automatically meet the definition of "approved by the Board," other educational pathways exist for applicants to meet the technical rigor provided by an ABET/EAC degree. For example, a candidate might have a BS degree in Geology and an MS degree in Environmental Engineering. The candidate's combined education might be acceptable to the Board. Our current statutes limit the flexibility of the Board. ***Continued on following page.***

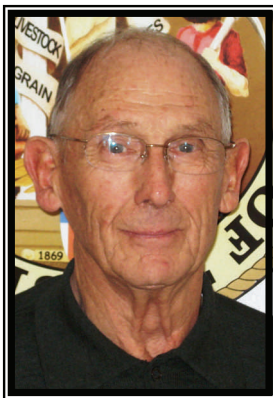
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6-Include additional educational paths for the licensure of surveyors, particularly, a 4-year degree in surveying, a 4-year degree related to surveying (e.g. engineering), and a 4-year degree not related to surveying. In each case, the last two degrees would need to contain at least 30 semester credit hours of surveying.

- The 2-year degree for surveying licensure will be maintained as currently written. In the past, sunseting this provision has met with opposition, and this year the board has elected not to pursue such a change.

We intend to take our bill state wide this fall and present it to the engineering and surveying community at professional meetings. We would like to get everyone on board to support the changes in our practice act.

The Board Meetings: *Jerry L. Jessen & Skylar V. Wilson*



With a little over a year's experience under our belts, we now have a better understanding of the duties and responsibilities it takes to be a Board Member. Our duties may seem a bit obscure, but some of what we do entails reviewing all surveying applications (LSIT, Professional License, and Comity), complaint reviews and recommendations, assist in proposed legislation and Rules and Regulations wording, attend NCEES meetings and Attorney General workshops, and of course attend quarterly Board meetings. Three of the Board meetings are held in Cheyenne and one is held in a different town somewhere in the state.

Board meetings are generally divided between open meeting items (which the public can sit in on) and closed meeting items (which are not open to the public). Some open meeting items from the past year include: Treasurer/Budget Reports, Upgrade On-Line Renewal Process, Attorney General Board Member Training, Letter to Building Officials, 2012 Legislation Update, NCEES Annual Meeting, Application Review Process, NCEES Western/Central Zone Meeting, Letter from WY Oil & Gas Commission, Professional Land Surveyor Curriculum Update, FE Results for UW Students, CPC Audit Report, and implementing Computer Based Testing.



Closed meeting items are almost always discussions about the status of complaints and voting on who gets to sit for the various exams. Although these two topics are probably the most serious of the Board's business, it is encouraging to report that we don't have a lot of complaints and most applicants are qualified.

With regard to the University of Wyoming's Land Surveying Certificate program, Mark Rehwaldt and Skylar Wilson are coordinating on updating required hours and courses to better meet the Board's education requirements.

We have found working with the Board, its attorneys, and the staff to be a rewarding experience. They are all intelligent professionals who take the job seriously. And as always, if you have any suggestions on how the Board can better serve you, please let us know.

Disciplinary Actions: *Robert J. Walters, Senior Assistant Attorney General*



Earlier this year, I was assigned to represent the Wyoming Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors [Board], and specifically involving matters that may result in action by the Investigative Board Member(s) [IBM] when a complaint has been made against a Professional Engineer or Professional Land Surveyor, referred to in this article as "Registrant." Some of these complaints could result in fairly significant disciplinary sanctions related to the professional license of an engineer or surveyor. Accordingly, it is my role to assist the IBM in evaluating the evidence and the legal basis for disciplinary action, as the possible impact to an engineer's or surveyor's license status is no small thing.

The process of investigation of complaints submitted to the Board is not entirely dissimilar to the process that is in place for most professional licensing boards in Wyoming. Once a complaint is received by Board, the Chairman selects an IBM from among the other Board members, who assists the investigator on technical issues depending on the issues in the complaint. The Complaint is then turned over to the IBM and the investigator. Concurrently, the Executive Director sends letter to Registrant, advising him or her that the Board has received a complaint. This letter also advises the Registrant of the identity of the investigator, that the investigator will be contacting the Registrant and a voluntary response to the complaint may be requested. Although the Registrant is under no obligation to speak with the investigator, either with or without legal counsel, this initial response can be helpful in gathering information related to the complaint and possibly resolving the matter at an early stage. The investigator also is tasked to gather information and interview witnesses if necessary.

Once the investigator has completed the investigation, the investigator drafts and submits a written report to the IBM summarizing the investigation and information obtained. The IBM then assesses the collected information and reviews the applicable statutes, rules and regulations of the Board to determine what course of action should be recommended to the Board, with assistance by assigned prosecuting attorney from the Attorney General's Office. The possible courses of action include a recommendation for dismissal if there is no legal basis to act further or insufficient evidence to recommending formal hearing for formal discipline, including an administrative penalty, restrictions on scope of practice, probation, suspension or revocation. If the IBM recommends dismissal and the Board approves such recommendation, letters will go out to the Complainant and the Registrant advising them of the dismissal of the complaint.

On the other hand, if the IBM determines that formal disciplinary action should be recommended, following completion of and notification of the findings of the investigation, the Board's Rules and Regulations [Board's Rules] also provide for an opportunity for an informal conference between the Registrant, the IBM(s), and the assigned prosecuting attorney. The Registrant also may choose to have his or her legal counsel present for the informal compliance conference. The express purpose of the informal compliance conference is "to discuss formal or informal settlement of the investigative matter." Board's Rules, Chapter 7, Section 7(a). Theoretically, an informal conference may involve more than one meeting if additional information is needed or to work out settlement terms.

If there is a recommendation for settlement, such recommendation is presented to the Board, which may choose to accept or reject the proposed settlement. If the informal conference has not resulted in a proposed settlement, and the IBM is prepared to proceed to a hearing, the Board office will issue a "Letter of Intent" to the Registrant indicating the IBM's intent to proceed with formal disciplinary action. Generally, a proposed settlement agreement may be included with the "Letter of Intent" to promote a settlement in lieu of going to a contested case hearing. If the Registrant does not agree to settlement or wishes to go to hearing, the IBM and assigned prosecuting attorney will then serve a Petition and Complaint and Notice of Hearing on the Registrant. This starts the formal process leading to the contested case hearing.

Formal contested case hearings are trial-type hearings in which all of the Board members, minus the assigned IBM, hear the matter and make a determination on the facts presented at hearing, in much the same manner as a jury would in a jury trial, with the additional that Board members may ask questions of witnesses, including the Registrant. A hearing examiner from the Office of Administrative Hearings may also be present to make determinations on issues of law that arise during the hearing. Otherwise, regular legal procedures of litigation matters generally apply, including the option to be represented by counsel, the calling of witnesses, sworn testimony, a record of the proceedings, and the issuance of a decision and order. A decision adverse to the Registrant

A disciplinary matter obviously is a fairly involved process. The issues may require utilization of a consultant or possible expert witness to elaborate on deviations from acceptable professional practice. The IBM is responsible for determining whether such deviations are sufficiently egregious to warrant a formal disciplinary recommendation. In addition to recommendations for suspension, restrictions or probation, the applicable statutes authorize peer review and educational requirements. Although a proposed disciplinary sanction may seem punitive, the over-riding consideration is what is reasonably necessary to protect the public. As stated by the Wyoming Supreme Court: "licensure acts are passed for the express purpose of affording the public protection." *Allhusen v. State By and Through Wyoming Mental Health Professions Licensing Bd.*, 898 P.2d 878, 885 (Wyo. 1995).

Balanced against this important state interest, however, are the Registrant's constitutional rights to due process. It is well established in Wyoming law that a professional license is an important property right subject to strong constitutional protection. The Wyoming Supreme Court in *Devous v. Wyoming State Bd. of Medical Examiners*, 845 P.2d 408 (Wyo. 1993), held that the right to engage in a licensed profession – in the *Devous* case, the right to practice medicine – "is a conditional property right subject to the police power of the state, triggering the provisions of the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Wyoming requiring that due process of law be afforded prior to revocation or other adverse impact of such a property right." *Id.* at 415.

This means that the Registrant is entitled by law to being provided notice of the charges asserted against him or her that warrant disciplinary action **and** the opportunity to be heard. In other words, to "have his or her day in court." It should not be surprising that the opportunity to be heard requirement of due process itself involves a set of procedures to permit the orderly presentation of evidence and legal arguments, which is where the contested case hearing comes in. The Wyoming Administrative Procedure Act governs the procedures that must be followed in a contested case hearing matter.

An important lesson that also has emerged through published court opinions is that the Wyoming Supreme Court will not be deferential to a licensing board decision if the legal justification or basis for discipline is not supported by proper application of statutes or rules, if the applicable procedures have not been properly applied, if the evidence is insufficient to demonstrate violations justifying discipline, or if the ultimate decision is not reasonable. This implies that the process, from beginning to end, must reflect elements of fairness to the licensee, evidenced by compliance with procedural requirements, consideration substantiation of facts to support the violation of the applicable practice act and corresponding rules and regulations, and a recommendation as well as, rendering an ultimate decision that is reasonable under the all the relevant circumstances.

With all of these considerations, the disciplinary process may and should be fairly involved as important rights are present. Ultimately, the objective, as indicated above, is to achieve protection of the public – the confidence that Registrants regulated by the Board, like any other person holding a professional license, meets the minimally acceptable standards applicable to the profession.



Importance of the Fundamentals: *Shelley R. Macy*



I can still remember getting ready to take the FE or Fundamentals of Engineering Exam in Laramie, in April, just prior to graduating with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. My study partners and I had a couple of discussions regarding whether or not this was worth our time and effort.

“Was it required to graduate? No. Did it cover subjects not specifically covered by our education? Yes. Was it relevant? We did not know for sure. Did it take a Saturday? Yes. Were we nervous? Yes. Were we tired of testing? Yes.”

In other words, we were ready to graduate and move on to the next stage of our lives. The problem was we really did not know what that next step was going to be for us. The economy was not doing well and finding employment was going to be difficult. Come that fateful day, we all sat for the exam and we all passed it. It was nice to be a college student with another reason to celebrate! After we graduated, one in our study group went back for more engineering education, another went to law school and I found a job. To be honest, it wasn't really the job I thought I wanted at the time. It was a job that took me six months of hard looking to even get a first interview. It was a job that took me to Denver, away from my family and everything familiar. It was a job that needed me to have passed the FE exam. It was a tough job and I had a lot to learn about practicing engineering versus studying engineering, not to mention the group dynamics of a mid-sized company. Today, of our original study group, I am the only one of us practicing as a licensed engineer. I did not understand as a 22 year old, the future implications of licensure, but my professors did. They understood that having more opportunities available to you, would mean that in hard times, more doors would be open than closed. They understood that passing an exam at 22, would be much easier than passing later in life, when family obligations took priority and academics exercises seemed more intimidating. They understood that they had prepared us for the exam and that we were ready. Today, I am so glad they were there to guide us.

As a Wyoming Board Member, I have the privilege of working behind the scenes to serve the NCEES. Below is an excerpt from their site describing who and what they are (<http://www.ncees.org/>):

NCEES (the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying) is a national nonprofit organization dedicated to advancing professional licensure for engineers and surveyors. It develops, administers, and scores the examinations used for engineering and surveying licensure in the United States. It also facilitates professional mobility and promotes uniformity of the U.S. licensure processes through services for its member licensing boards and licensees. These services include the records program, study materials, credentials evaluations, exam administration, and more.

The Council's members are the engineering and surveying licensure boards from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

It is an astounding collection of individuals from our country who donate their time and energy to the betterment of our profession. Many past Wyoming Board members have served as the group's President and continue to serve on committees. Take a minute and review this website. What you find may interest you. This group writes the exams for the FE, PE, FLS and PLS. NCEES is the group that is there to guide the practice of engineering and surveying.

NCEES announces changes to FE exam – January 2014:

The current specifications for the Fundamentals of Engineering (FE) exam will change in January 2014 in conjunction with the exam's transition to computer-based testing (CBT). At that time, the FE exam will be seven freestanding, discipline-specific exams: Chemical, Civil, Electrical and Computer, Environmental, Industrial, Mechanical, and Other Disciplines. NCEES has posted the major domains for these exams online, and the complete specifications will be available in 2013.

In 2010, NCEES announced a move toward CBT. The final pencil-and-paper exam will be offered in October 2013. All FE exams administered before CBT will use the exam specifications currently available on the Exams portion of the NCEES website.

This notice of new domains follows a previous call for volunteers to participate in a content review. The cross-section of participants included licensed professional engineers, academics teaching engineering courses, and engineer interns from all engineering disciplines. These individuals were surveyed about the fundamental knowledge and skills necessary for an engineer intern to work in a manner that protects the health, safety, and welfare of the public.

2012 NCEES Engineering Award Winners:



The Florida Atlantic University Department of Civil, Environmental, and Geomatics Engineering is the grand prize winner of the 2012 NCEES Engineering Award for Connecting Professional Practice and Education. The award jury met May 31, 2012, in Clemson, S.C., to select the \$25,000 grand prize winner.

The department received the prize for its submission, [*Dania Beach Nanofiltration Plant Expansion*](#). For the project, civil engineering students collaborated with faculty, professional engineers, and city officials to find innovative and cost-effective solutions to designing a new water treatment facility for the city, resulting in the construction of the world's first LEED Gold-certified water treatment plant.

The jury praised the project for incorporating many aspects of civil engineering and renewable energy, noting the student contributions from concept through construction and obtaining LEED Gold certification.
