2006 national public library statistics released

In 2006, there were 1.4 billion visits and 2.1 billion items circulated at the nation's 9,208 public libraries, according to the Institute of Museum and Library Service's (IMLS) recently published report, "Public Libraries in the United States: Fiscal Year 2006." Out of the 50 states plus D.C., Wyoming ranked 7th in library visits per capita (3.2 million), 8th in print materials per capita, 2nd in audio materials per 1,000 population, and 9th in operating expenditures per capita. 3.5 million visits to Wyoming public libraries during fiscal year 2008

Preliminary statistics gathered for fiscal year 2008 (July 1, 2007 to June 30, 2008) showed there were more than 3.5 million visits to Wyoming libraries. In FY08, the 23 county library systems circulated 4.7 million items, 1.6 million of those to children, and offered 13,000 programs for children, teens and adults. Wyoming libraries employed 655 people during FY08 for 436.08 full-time equivalent (40 hours weekly) positions. There were 712 public Internet-access computers available, and these were used nearly a million times. Final Wyoming FY08 public library statistics are expected to be released in January or early February. UW, State Library partner to provide electronic access

The Wyoming State Library and The University of Wyoming have partnered to provide electronic access to the Monthly Catalog of U.S. Government Publications to the residents of Wyoming.

This is part of the Wyoming libraries' vision to improve access to federal government information.

The Monthly Catalog of United States Government Publications was established by the Printing Act of January 12, 1895. It is issued each month by the Superintendent of Documents for the Government Printing Office, and catalogs all publications of the United States government, including those of the Congress and all executive departments (with the exception of administrative and confidential or restricted documents).

Records for all publications since July 1976 have been available online at the GPO's Web site, but earlier issues have generally only been available in print or on microfilm. This online version makes all issues of the Monthly Catalog from 1895 to June 1976 available online, both as keyed full text records and as page images of the original printed catalog.

Harness, Cheryl. Abe Lincoln Goes to Washington 1837-1863

Harness focuses on the Springfield years when Abe meets and marries Mary Todd and continues through the Civil War years. This book is beautifully illustrated and well written.

Herbert, Janis. Abe Lincoln for Kids: His Life and Times with 21 Activities

Janis Herbert gives historical information about events and facts of Abe Lincoln's life, then she cleverly describes crafts to be made in the classroom. Sproule, Anna. Abraham Lincoln: Leader of a Nation in Crisis

People Who Have Helped the World Excellent source of Abraham Lincoln's life with facts, dates, and quotes. Dates, glossary, and index are listed in the back. **Stevenson, Augusta. Abe Lincoln: The Great Emancipator** From the author:

Parin D'Aulaire, Ingri and Edgar. Abraham Lincoln

This Caldecott Medal winner is an inspiring story dealing with the life of Abe Lincoln starting with his birth in Kentucky in 1809 and ending with the Civil War. It does not mention his death.

Raatma, Lucia. Abraham Lincoln Compass Point Early Biographies

This book provides a brief biography of the sixteenth president, known as a wise and compassionate man and an eloquent speaker. His determination helped preserve the Union during the Civil War.

Reiss, Mike. The Boy Who Looked Like Lincoln

Summary: Silly book about a boy who goes to Camp What-chama-call-it, the camp for kids who look like things. No historical value but a fun read aloud.

St. George, Judith and David A. Adler. Stand Tall, Abe Lincoln. A Picture

Book of Abraham Lincoln

Historical fiction read aloud or early reader. Focuses on Abe's life from childhood to death. Important dates listed in back.

Turner, Ann. Abe Lincoln Remembers

Written in the first person. Stories Abe tells about his life with the last entry telling his wife Mary that it will be a good evening for a play.

Winters, Kay. Abe Lincoln The boy who loved books

This early reader, or read along is a historical fiction based on stories about Abe's love of books.

Van Steenwyk, Elizabeth. When Abraham Talked to the Trees

"... offers young readers an inspiring glimpse of a historical giant who at their own age had to struggle against the odds to learn the skills they, too, are working to develop. An anecdotal story reveals the character of a boy who grew up to be an American President..."

Train Books

Ambrose, Stephen E. Nothing Like it in the World: The Men Who Built the Transcontinental Railroad 1863-1869 "This is the story

of the men who built the transcontinental railroad, the investors who risked their businesses and their money; the enlightened politicians who understood its importance; the engineers and surveyors who risked and lost their lives: and the Irish and Chinese immigrants, the defeated Confederate soldiers, and the other laborers who did the backbreaking and dangerous jobs in the tracks."

Arnold, Bess. Union Pacific: Crossing Sherman Hill and Other Railroad Stories

The author interviewed 27 Union Pacific railroaders who shared their memories with her. Their careers ranged from 13 to 55 years and covered a time span from 1917 to 1988. The photographs alone are worth checking out this book.

Botkin, B.A. A Treasury of Railroad Folklore

This book is chalked full of all kinds of railroad information and would be a good book for teachers to read to the class. Just pick and choose what interests you. Most entries are just a few pages.

Fraser, Mary Ann. Ten-Mile Day and the Building of the

Transcontinental Railroad.

This picture book includes a narrative of the building of the railroad and a fact block on each page. The book includes a map from Omaha to Sacramento. Pictures of railroad tools and supplies, and a glossary are also included.

Gordon, Sarah H. Passage to Union: How the Railroads Transformed American Life, 1829-1929

Mrs. Gordon tells about the conflicts of interest at local, state, and regional levels, which were characteristic of the railroad growth at every stage. She used many primary sources such as diaries, memoirs, literature, newspapers and magazines to construct her narrative.

Klein, Maury. Union Pacific: The Birth of a Railroad 1862-1893

This is an excellent source for students to learn about the powerful personalities and dramatic events that led to the construction of the Union Pacific Railroad.

Larson, T. A. History of Wyoming Teacher resource

Meltzer, Milton. Hear That Train Whistle Blow How the Railroad Changed the World "Focusing on

American railroad his-

tory but also touching on other countries the author shows how something as ubiquitous as the railroad has been and still is one of the most vital forces in civilization-a force that changed the world."

Miller, Marilyn. The Transcontinental Railroad

This book outlines an overall view of the building of the railroad. Special focus is placed on "The Great Race" and Promontory Point.

Socorro, Craig and Randy Adams. Frontier Spirit The Story of Wyoming

Chapter six is devoted to the building of the transcontinental railroad across what was then Dakota Territory. It focuses on the railroad towns that sprang up along the way, giving descriptions of each town starting with Cheyenne in the East and ending with Evanston.

Wood, Snyder. Trains and Railroads

Starting with the railroad revolution and ending with the train of the future, this picture book is chucked full of information. Each page is arranged so the reader can learn about several aspects of travel.
