

RECORD NUMBER OF DEMANDS TO CENSOR LIBRARY MATERIALS IN 2022

In March, the American Library Association (ALA) <u>released new data</u> documenting 1,269 demands to censor library books and resources in 2022, the highest number of attempted book bans since ALA began compiling data about censorship in libraries more than 20 years ago. This nearly doubles the 729 challenges reported in 2021. A record 2,571 unique titles were targeted for censorship.

Of those titles, the vast majority were written by or about members of the LGBTQIA+ community and people of color.

ALA will announce its annual list of the top 10 most challenged books in the U.S. on Monday, April 24 during <u>National Library Week</u>, along with its full State of America's Libraries Report. This day has also been designated as the inaugural <u>Right to Read Day</u>.

This was a difficult decision because we each desire to continue to support and develop leaders in our state and to share the experience we enjoyed and benefited from as attendees. We will continue working toward a retreat in 2024, and look forward to making it a wonderful experience for all who attend."



CELEBRATE NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK APRIL 23-29

National Library Week will be held April 23-29, 2023 with the theme, "There's More to the Story." Libraries support communities by providing more than just books and access to information. Communities can take advantage of internet and technology access, literacy and skill-building tools, professional development courses, job training, and so much more.

New York Times best-selling and award-winning author, Kelly Yang, will serve as this year's honorary chair. Yang authored many books for young readers, including the Front Desk series, as well as standalone titles, "New from Here" and "Finally Seen."

During National Library Week, the American Library Association invites communities to observe the following:

- Monday, April 24: <u>Right to Read Day</u>, an inaugural celebration to acknowledge and promote the right to read and mark the one-year anniversary of ALA's Unite Against Book Bans campaign. The 2023 State of America's Libraries Report and Top Ten Frequently Challenged Books of 2022 will also be released on this day.
- **Tuesday, April 25**: <u>National Library</u> <u>Workers Day</u>, a day for library staff, users, administrators, and friends groups to recognize the valuable contributions made by all library workers.
- Wednesday, April 26: <u>National</u> <u>Library Outreach Day</u>, a day to celebrate library outreach and the dedicated library professionals who are meeting their patrons where they are.
- Thursday, April 27: <u>Take Action for</u> <u>Libraries Day</u>, a day to rally advocates to support libraries.

April is also <u>School Library Month</u>, sponsored by the American Association of School Librarians, an ALA division.

PRESERVATION WEEK 2023: BUILDING RESILIENT COMMUNITIES

It's an opportunity to inspire action to preserve collections — in libraries, archives, and museums, of course — but especially items held and loved by individuals, families, and communities. Grants & Awards

Bound to Stay Bound Inc. "My First AASL National Conference" Travel Grant DEADLINE: April 24, 2023

Thirty travel grants are available to school library professionals wishing to attend the American Association of School Librarians (AASL) National Conference for the first time. The \$750 grants for first-time attendees of the conference are sponsored by Bound to Stay Bound Books. Applicants must be must be ALA/AASL personal members at the time of application.

Dollar General Youth Literacy Grants DEADLINE: April 27, 2023, 9:00 p.m. MDT

All types of schools, public libraries, and nonprofit organizations that help K-12 students who are below grade level or having trouble reading are eligible to apply. The maximum grant amount is \$4,000. Grants will be announced on August 17, 2023. The applicant organization must be located within 15 miles of a Dollar General store. Grant funding is provided to implement new or expanding existing literacy programs, purchase new technology or equipment to support literacy initiatives, and/ or purchase books, materials, or software for literacy programs.

National Endowment for the Arts Challenge America Grants DEADLINE: April 27, 2023

Offers support primarily to small organizations for projects in all artistic disciplines that extend the reach of the arts to groups/communities with rich and dynamic artistic and cultural contributions to share that are underserved. Challenge America features an abbreviated application, a robust structure of technical assistance, and grants for a set amount of \$10,000. Grants require a cost share/match of \$10,000 cash and/or in-kind contributions.

Voya Unsung Heroes

DEADLINE: April 28, 2023

The Voya Unsung Heroes program seeks to reward excellence in U.S. schools by funding innovative K-12 classroom projects. Each year, 50 educators are selected to receive \$2,000 to help fund their innovative class projects that improve student learning. Three of those are chosen to receive the top awards of an additional \$5,000, \$10,000, and \$25,000.

Toshiba America Foundation DEADLINE: May 1, 2023

Grants for grade 6-12 teachers for innovative science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) projects. At least \$5,000 will be awarded to support innovative project-based learning with measurable outcomes. Note: the foundation typically supports project-based learning and does not consider requests for computers, laptops, or tablets.

Association for Rural and Small Libraries (ARSL) Conference Scholarships DEADLINE: May 2, 2023

Each year the ARSL Grants, Awards & Scholarships (GAS) Committee accepts applications for competitive scholarships to facilitate attendance to the ARSL Conference. New this year is the Empowering Library Workers of Color Conference Scholarship. Scholarships also available for LIS students, early-career professionals, and ARSL members attending the conference for the first time.

ALA's Great Stories Club

DEADLINE: May 10, 2023

The American Library Association (ALA) invites library workers to apply for "Imagining Tomorrow: Building Inclusive Futures." This brand-new series in ALA's Great Stories Club (GSC) will feature science fiction books that explore questions of equity, identity, and alternate futures. 35 selected libraries will receive 11 paperback copies of theme-related books to use in the reading and discussion groups as well as a \$500 programming stipend, online training, an array of program resources, and support.

McMurry Library Endowment Individual Grants for Continuing Education DEADLINE: May 31, 2023

Want to attend a conference or workshop to build your library skills? Take an online course? Start working toward that library media specialist endorsement or master's degree in library science? Funds are available to those working or volunteering in Wyoming libraries through the Carol McMurry Library Endowment Individual Grants for Continuing Education. Applications are accepted six times during the year. The next deadline is May 31, 2023, for continuing education events starting no earlier than July 1, 2023.

<u>Union Pacific Foundation: Community</u> <u>Ties Giving Program</u> DEADLINE: May 31, 2023

Program aims to build safe, prosperous, vibrant, and inclusive communities where Union Pacific

Railroad operates. Funding is provided for direct services and efforts that build the capacity of organizations focused on the following causes: safety, workforce development, community spaces, environmental sustainability, and local needs. Within each focus area, the aim is to support programs and organizations working to advance the diversity, equity, and inclusion of underrepresented populations. Grant awards typically range from \$2,500 to \$25,000.

News in Brief

Science Literacy: It's Not Just for Kids

April is <u>Citizen Science Month</u>, a celebration of public participation in science. As citizens and voters, adults are asked to make decisions that increasingly involve complex science. Check out this webinar recording from WebJunction to learn about expanding adult learning to include identifying environmental issues, applying science-based strategies, and working together to find solutions and take action.

Association for Rural and Small Libraries Call for Conference Proposals

The Association for Rural and Small Libraries (ARSL) has put out a call for workshop proposals for its 2023 conference in Wichita, Kansas, to be held September 20-23. This year's conference theme is "Unite & Ignite." They're seeking proposals on all topics relevant to small and rural libraries, from practical how-to sessions to broader explorations of the changing library landscape. All program proposals are due April 25, 2023 at 4:00 p.m. MDT.

<u>Network of the National Library of</u> <u>Medicine Traveling Exhibitions</u>

The Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) has opened its Call for Requests for NLM Traveling Exhibitions. The deadline to submit requests is May 2, 2023 at noon MDT. Seven titles are available for requests.

Scholarships for Rural Health Summit

The American Heart Association SouthWest, representing Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, and Wyoming is hosting the inaugural Rural Health Summit on May 12, in Dallas, Texas. Leaders and champions of rural health from all sectors of the community are welcome, including educators, librarians, healthcare providers, county extension agents, small business owners, and corporate leaders. A limited number of scholarships for travel expenses are available.

Libraries and Veterans Toolkit Available

In an effort to help librarians just getting started working with veterans, as well as those looking for new ideas to bring to their libraries, an online toolkit was created to collect the shared knowledge of librarians working with the veteran community. It contains lesson plans, program outlines, collection development policies, best practice documents, and more to help ease the way for those just getting started in this work – and to make it easier for those already engaged to find new ideas and new strategies to increase the success of their programs.

<u>Library of Congress Adds Major League</u> <u>Baseball History Online</u>

To celebrate the start of the 2023 Major League Baseball season, the Library of Congress has announced a new digital collection: <u>Early</u> <u>Baseball Publications</u>. The collection, which will grow over time, provides full-text digitized access to more than 120 early baseball publications. The initial release includes a large selection of 19thand early 20th-century annual baseball guides.

Hunger-Free Libraries: Food Pantries and Fridges

Food insecurity is a problem that has drawn increasing attention in recent years. Libraries have a long, rich history of partnering with government and nonprofit agencies to help improve food access, and lately they have been helping in new and creative ways. One way libraries are doing this work is by creating community pantries, fridges, and blessing boxes. In <u>this article</u>, WebJunction has put together resources for libraries addressing hunger.

Stories Beyond Borders: A Chinese American and Diasporic Reading List

The Chinese American Librarians Association partnered with YALSA and collaborated with ALSC's Quicklists Consulting Committee to create a reading list for youth centering Chinese American voices. Stories Beyond Borders: A Chinese American and Diasporic Reading List features Chinese American and diasporic creators and stories for children, middle grade, and teens.

<u>Report Explores How Pandemic</u> <u>Reshaped Libraries</u>

This March marks three years since COVID- 19 brought the country to a standstill. With this <u>special report</u>, American Libraries looks at some libraries' behind-the-scenes decisions to keep communities connected and missions fulfilled.
